## Senate Rescinds Some of Bacon's Appointments

### That of Dr. W. T. Chipman to Industrial Accident Board Is Among Those Affected

The appointment of Dr. W. T. Chipman, of Harrington, as a member of the Industrial Accident Board, was among the six appointments of former Gov. Bacon rescinded by the State Senate in an executive session Tuesday.

The Senate also turned down a number of others, including appointees to the Department of Elections of New Castle County.

A rebellious Republican member of the Senate, E. R. Powell, of Ocean View, joined eight Democrats in the action.

Dr. Chipman, Speaker of the House in the last term, had been appointed to succeed the late D. D. Wharton of Dover.

The result of the rescission, with another vacancy on the three-member board due in May, indicated that the Accident Board will move into Democratic control since the successors to Mr. Wharton and to John G. Lynch, of Wilmington, whose term will expire, will be made by Gov. Carvel.

Under the rules of an executive session no official disclosure was made of the nature of the debate which occurred after some 200 persons, waiting for the inaugural, had been asked to leave.

But from remarks dropped by senators after the session there was no question but that Senator Powell had lined up at least temporarily with the eight Democrats.

There was additional evidence in the fact that when the Republican senators returned to the chamber after the inauguration they revamped their seating plan to leave Senator Powell by himself in the third row.

The delay caused by the Senate action was so long that the still lieutenant governor, Mr. Carvel, opened the joint session for the swearing in of the new lieutenant governor, Alexis I. duPont Bayard, apologized.

"We regret the delay that the executive session has caused. We hope it has not been too much of an inconvenience. It is the responsibility of the minority party together with one member of the majority party," said Mr. Carvel.

Other previously confirmed appointments which were rescinded under a rule permitting reconsideration within three legislative days of such matters were those of four Sussex County justices of the peace, William J. Elzey, Edward C. Morris, Theodore R. Dick, and George Morrison, and that of Edward C. Morris as a member of the Department of Elections for Sussex County.

The action on rescission together with that of the Senate in refusing to confirm the second list of appointments sent down by Governor Bacon on Wednesday indicates that the departments of elections in all three counties will become Democratic rule within a few months.

Senator Powell had stated emphatically on Monday that we would not vote for any "lame duck" appointments or legislation.

In the House meanwhile there was little action. Approval was given to senate resolutions authorizing the joint session and to adjourning until Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

#### Agency Survey Urged

Create a commission to study the need for reorganization and consolidation of administrative and executive branches of the state government for efficiency and economy.

Create a four-member state liquor commission, replacing the present one man commission.

Enact minimum wage legislation. Create a state department of labor and industrial relations.

Increase benefits under the Workmen's Compensation Law. Repeat the state's Labor Relations Act.

Authorize a public poll on a veteran's bonus with an immediate cash bonus the goal if vote is favorable.

Rebuild and repair highways and secondary roads which he described as important to the agricultural industry of the state.

Provide that the state supported teachers' salaries scheduled be revised to include the new maxima and minima set forth in a Senate bill and also to reach the peak in 10 rather than 16 annual increments.

Provide new school buildings at once where they are needed.

Provide for the election of all members of school boards throughout the state.

Governor Carvel was emphatic also about the need for changes in the present election laws. He deplored the multiple ballot and the law which permits the distribution of ballots before election.

He asked for four-year registration to replace the present permanent registration act.

The new Governor proposed three amendments to the state constitution. One of these would make it impossible for any paid state, county or municipal employe to be a member of the legislature.

The second would require the Governor to make public at least ten days before submitting to the Senate for approval the names of appointees to state judgeships. The third would provide for a separate and independent Supreme Court.

Escorted By Bacon

As Governor Carvel — still the lieutenant governor — walked forward on the special platform built on the steps in front of Legislative Hall he was escorted by Governor Bacon whom he was to succeed a few minutes later.

The weather that the weatherman had reluctantly promised — colder, cloudy, occasional showers — was becoming a fact. Leading the procession to the front of the platform was the new lieutenant governor, Alexis duPont Bayard, who had been sworn in 25 minutes earlier. Mr. Bayard introduced Bishop Arthur R. McKinstry of the Episcopal Diocese of Delaware, who invoked the Lord's blessing on the new administration.

Then Mr. Carvel and Chancellor Harrington stepped forward and the former, with his hand on a Bible printed in Paris in 1532, took the oath.

As he finished the Delaware National Guard under the direction of Warrant Officer Donald Ramos played "Our Delaware."

Governor Carvel then began his speech at 1:12 p. m.

When he had concluded, receiving a rattling round of applause from the crowd which held on despite the light rain, the Governor stepped aside so that the new Secretary of State, Harris B. McDowell, of Middletown, could be sworn in by Associate Supreme Court Justice Charles L. Terry, Jr.

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## History of Harrington

The wheels of time move swiftly and surely. Men come and go and are forgotten. But few of the many make such an impression as to leave behind them a record that is remembered.

Just one hundred and two years ago Samuel White was appointed United States Senator by Governor Richard Bassett, to succeed Dr. Henry Latimer, who had resigned the office; and after the lapse of a century it is with difficulty that enough information can be gotten together to make a respectable biography of this man who held the exalted position of United States Senator from Delaware.

Investigation establishes the fact that Samuel White was a son of Thomas White, and that he was born in 1770, on the farm of his father in Missillon Hundred, Kent County, Delaware, a few miles from the village of Whiteleysburg. The father, Thomas White, was known as Judge White, having from 1777 until 1792 served as one of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas and Orphans' Court of Kent County; during the last two years of that time as Chief Justice. This Court existed under the first constitution of the State, adopted in 1776, but was abolished by the constitution of 1792. Judge White, at the time of his death, was Register of Wills for Kent County. He was one of the large land owners in Kent County and an influential citizen.

### SAMUEL WHITE AND HIS FATHER

In 1777 when Francis Asbury made his advent into Delaware as the pioneer preacher of Methodism, Judge White, and his brother Dr. Edward White became much interested in him and in the cause which he represented, and in time both became converts, and afterwards warm adherents of his faith. Asbury spent much time at the home of the two White brothers, but he became particularly attached to Thomas White, and in his journal speaks of him as his "dearest friend in America," and says that Judge White's home was the only home that he ever had. Asbury never married, and being in the Methodist itinerancy from his early days, had no permanent place of abode. Most of the Methodist preachers were English-born and one of their tenets was a refusal to bear arms. Denounced by other sects as "noisy, pestiferous fellows" and suspected by the authorities of emity to the patriotic cause, the Methodists fell into great disfavor during the Revolution. Judge White, because of his adherence to the Methodist cause and his close friendship for Asbury, was suspected, of being at least lukewarm towards the independence of the colonies and so strong did the sentiment become against him that in the autumn of 1777 he was arrested and imprisoned as a Tory.

After being separated from his family some weeks, which was a source of great concern and distress to them, he was exonerated and discharged.

This was while Asbury was sheltered and cared for on the White plantation. On the death of Asbury in 1816, Rev. Ezekiel Cooper one of the earliest Methodist preachers from the peninsula, preached a funeral discourse on Asbury in St. George's Church in Philadelphia in the course of which, referring to this period, he said, "Asbury found an asylum, as his castle of safety in the house and with the hospitable family of his fast and firm friend, Thomas White, Esq., one of the Judges of the Court in Kent County, Delaware. He was a pious man and his wife one of the holiest of women; they were great friends to the cause of religion and to preachers generally. From this place of retreat and protection, as in a castle of repose and safety, he could correspond with his suffering in different parts. He could also, occasionally travel about, visiting the societies and sometimes preaching to the people. In some of their movements they had to be very cautious and circumspect, for they were watched as the wolves watch the sheep of the pasture and the lambs of the flock." The fact that subsequently Judge White was honored with important public station would indicate that he continued in favor with the populace as well as with those in authority. One of the earliest Methodist Churches on the peninsula was "White's Chapel," named for the Judge, and situated near Judge White's residence. A church bearing the same name still stands a few miles from the old site. The original White's Chapel falling in disuse, went to decay, but years afterwards, the frame work that remained, was removed a mile or more westward, across the State line into Maryland and there it was used as part of the super-structure of what was called Lee's Chapel, and for many years was regularly used for Methodist services. In course of time it was supplanted by Shepherd's Chapel and the building, still in a good state of preservation, is used as a barn or storehouse on the Carter farm, adjoining the old location of Lee's Chapel.

It was at Judge White's house that the first conference of the Methodist preachers was held on April 28th 1777, and it was here that the important and significant step was taken of appointing Francis Asbury, the general assistant or superintendent in America, with the right of determining questions in conference after due consideration. From this time Asbury became the recognized centre of Methodism in America and in Judge White's house was born the idea of Episcopal Supervision.
