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**GOVERNOR CARVEL ON THE RIGHT TRACK**

We like the way Governor Carvel is conducting the investigation of conditions at Delaware State College.

For a long time there has been considerable turmoil at that institution, and rumors have been flying thick and fast. Instead of following the usual procedure of appointing a legislative committee to investigate, Governor Carvel appointed a number of qualified men and sat in with them at the investigations. Many startling irregularities were discovered.

We have no confidence in the "inspections" or "investigations" of the state's institutions as conducted by members of the legislature every session—and this is no criticism of the members of the legislature. Many of them have had no particular training for that specific job, and they are not allotted time for an investigation. We believe it's a matter of record that they have "investigated" as many as three institutions in half a day.

It is astounding that when money matters are involved, skilled men are called in and allowed all the time necessary to make a thorough investigation, but when human lives are at stake, an hour or two by untrained men may be considered sufficient. Delaware State College has been visited by these legislative committees on many occasions—as have the other state institutions—and approval has been given.

Until this investigation by Governor Carvel, we recall but one investigation in recent years—that of the Ferris School, and this investigation was not the result of a legislative investigation. The story was broken by Publisher Joe Martin, of the Sunday Star, and Delaware's shame was on front pages all over the nation. Yet the legislative committee had visited the Ferris School time after time.

Brandywine Sanatorium on the average has more than one hundred patients. Delaware is in the tuberculosis belt, and the dread disease is on the increase here. What can a legislative committee learn about those unfortunates in a visit of an hour or so?

We believe a typographical error appeared in the newspapers when they quoted the manager at Brandywine as saying that the cost at that institution was more than \$5.00 per day per patient, mainly because tuberculosis patients require a good grade of food. That must have been a typographical error, because the main articles of food served there two or three years ago, and over a period of years, were bologna sausage, liverwurst and some stuff called spiced ham. We witnessed this fare served to patients hundreds of times. If the food served there was good, why did relatives and friends of the invalids bring in loads of food to the patients three and four times each week?

At the time of the Ferris School expose, there was a statewide clamor for an investigation of all the institutions—but it was "shushed."

By continuing the good work he has started at Delaware College, and making thorough investigations of all state institutions Governor Carvel can win his spurs not only as an excellent governor, but as an outstanding humanitarian.

**DISPENSE LAUGHTER—AND LIVE LONG.**

Much has been written about laughter being a healthful tonic—but what about the dispenser of laughter? Some of the boys who make other people laugh live to a ripe old age.

Oliver Wendell Holmes, the poet and humorist, lived to an advanced age, and his son, Chief Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, was a great story teller at ninety.

Strickland Gillilan is 79. Last spring we accompanied him to Georgetown, where he addressed a ladies' night dinner of the Tall Cedars. On our return to Harrington, he sat in our office until four o'clock in the morning, telling stories as he waited for a late train. For more than fifty years, audiences all over America have laughed with Strickland Gillilan.

Dr. Alexander Cairns is about Gillilan's age. Harrington people know of Cairns' mirth-provoking stories, for he has been here twelve times. Today he is as chipper as a chipmunk.

Some twelve or fourteen years ago, passengers in the smoking car of a train bound from Denver to Kansas City never went to bed. Not one person left the car that night. How could they leave when Optie Read was telling stories—Optie Read—at 88.

We heard E. J. Cattell deliver a commencement address when he was purported to be 92—and he

was convulsing audiences with laughter fully ten years later.

Gelett Burgess, of "Purple Cow" fame, still has the ability to make a defeated politician laugh—and Gelett is 82.

Here in Harrington, at the Friendship Dinner on Tuesday evening of last week, we had an example of what a wholesome sense of humor, coupled with a creed of trying to help others, can do for a man. Dr. Francis Harvey Green, eighty-seven years old, came back to Harrington as the speaker of the evening, after an absence of twenty years. He sacrificed by coming here to help out in the program, just as he did on that other occasion twenty years ago. Looking not a day over sixty, in buoyant health and bubbling over with humor, he gave that audience, within the space of sixty minutes, a university course in logic, philosophy and poetry.

An unselfish man always looks younger than his years—and such a man is Dr. Francis Harvey Green. By contrast, look at any selfish man. You see a grim, hard-visaged creature who doesn't know how to smile. His best attempt at a smile is the twitching of the corners of his lips, as muscles seldom used refuse to function. No trace of the smile ever reaches his eyes—and the tragedy of the whole affair is that during all the years he has cluttered up the earth, he hasn't really lived one second.

## BONDED BRAKE LINING

DETROIT—A new method of bonding the brake lining to the brake shoe that has already proved itself in more than 3,000,000 brake assemblies has been announced by W. F. Armstrong, general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division.

The statement included the disclosure that the development already has been installed on 1949 passenger cars. Chevrolet is the first major manufacturer to adopt for its full passenger line a type of brake construction that has been the object of laboratory research for several years.

According to Armstrong, the innovation marks a milestone in production techniques as well as an acting standards of cleanliness, engineering accomplishment. Ex-temperature control and test procedures assure a bond between brake shoe lining far stronger than any forces encountered in brake service. In addition, the process involves batteries of especially designed manufacturing equipment.

"The improvement represents a

definite and important contribution to automobile economy," said Armstrong. "To owners it means double life for brake linings and the elimination of rivet scoring of drums. In the case of conventional riveted linings, brakes are good only until the surfaces wear down to the heads of the countersunk rivets which attach linings to shoes. With the unitized lining, almost the entire lining thickness is usable."

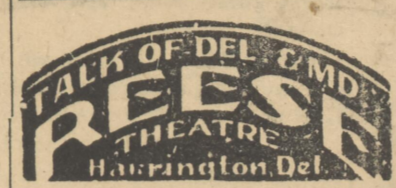
