Mr. Firestone, reporting to the President on the reactivation of USO, said its new \$12,100,000 program calls for a total of 242 centers in the United States and overseas, continued financing of Veterans Hospital Camp Shows and organization of community participation in USO throughout the country. The funds, he said, will be raised in every county and town, either through Community Chest Red Feather campaigns or independent drives.

After the meeting at the White After the meeting at the White House President Truman expressed the need for USO in the following letter to Mr. Fire-

"Dear Mr. Firestone: I very much appreciated your report on the organization of the new peacetime USO. As I told you in our conference today, it will have the complete backing of the Government. It is good to know that the six reat voluntary agencies which ran USO through the war years, and which broad-

ly represent the three main religious groupings of our citizens, will again be chan-nels for the USO activities.

"For the most part, our armed forces are civilian volunteers. Most of them—six out of ten—are under 20 years of age. We can show them them our gratitude through our wholehearted support of the USO. Soon they will be returning to their homes. We want them to return as good citizens, proud of the treatment they have received.

Why Doesn't Harrington Have But Comparatively Few Industries?

Harrington has fewer industries today than in any period since its incorporation in 1869. Quoting from "The History at 7:45. of Harrington," (Harrington Journal, Dec. 24, 1948) one gets an idea of industry here in 1888:

"Among the . . . most important manufacturing interests sionaries in the British West Indies in the town of Harrington was that of E. Fleming. In 1872, Mr. Fleming started a large sawmill with a capacity of 600 feet of lumber a day. Next he added a spoke factory which rapidly achieved a reputation in large cities excellence of quality. A grist mill and wagon works were next added and, at that time, a business giving continual employment to sixty people was quite a venture.

"Of equal importance was the canning factory and evaporator of Jas. C. Reed. It was erected in 1877 by Sharp & Quillen and was under their management until 1882 when purchased by Mr. Reed. It was on the site of the residence of Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Roberts on Weiner Avenue.

"In 1879, the Franklin Brothers, William H. and Omar J. opened a basket factory and, with an invested capital of six thousand dollars, gave steady employment to forty people.

"Another important industry of the town at that period was the Harrington Chemical Works, conducted by S. S. Harrington, which manufactured a high grade of fertilizer.'

When J. H. Burgess acquired The Harrington Journal in 1917 Harrington had two flour mills, one at the end of Weiner Avenue, and the present Harrington Milling Company. The town had a shirt factory, the basket factory of A. C. Creadick, and four canneries.

Today Harrington has dress and sports apparel factoriesno sawmills, no flour mills, no basket factory. It has but one cannery and it operates but a few weeks a year. Railroad employment has been reduced. Why has Harrington such few industries? Women have little trouble getting work in the garment factories but what about the men?

Many Harringtonians are employed elsewhere. A number work in Dover for the state and county, for Kent General Hospital, the Bell Telephone Company and for retail stores, while a bus runs regularly between Harrington and the Plyaytex Plant in Dover.

Some Harringtonians are employed in Swift's chicken processing plant at Felton, while others work for Caulk at Milford. Two or three Harrington girls did work for the REA at Greenwood. A bus runs regularly between Harrington and the DuPont plant at Seaford. Some Harringtonians now live at Seaford to be close to their work.

It is only fair to say, however, that many out-of-town women work in Harrington garment factories.

What caused the decline of Harrington industry?

Why have other towns, with fewer natural advantages, ******************************* been successful in attracting industries? Milton, for example, has a number of industries-hosiery mills, canneries sawmills, feed mills, button factories, many of which came to the community because the businessmen went after them.

Many communities build and lease buildings to industries. Some communities dispense with civic taxes for a period of time.

What can Harrington do? Obviously, the community does not want a "fly-by-night" industry, operating on a shoe string. Yet some incentive must be made if industry is to come here. With this provision in mind, Samuel Short Jr., president of The Harrington Better Business Association, has prepared a questionnaire which suggests a method for the community to forge its own progress. 



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
