Tractor Driving Contest to Feature 4-H Short Course

A tractor driving contest, for boys who have taken the 4-H tractor maintenance project will be a feature of the 4-H Short Course, to be held at the University of Delaware, June 12-15.

William A. Calvert, extension agricultural engineer, discloses that the contest will take place the afternoon of June 14, in the Wolf Hall parking lot on the University Campus. The contest will consist of an examination on tractor maintenance, a check on maintenance and operating procedure, demonstration of driving skill and a belting contest. The winner, who will be named state champion, will have the opportunity to become Northeast District Champion at a contest to be held in Massachusetts in September.

Approximately 250 4-H Club members are expected for the 28th annual Short Course. The program will begin Sunday afternoon with a tour of the College Farm, followed by softball, a picnic supper, a vesper service, and climaxed by an initiation ceremony for the Order of the Link, honorary 4-H organization.

Other activities lined up for the 4-Hers include talks on world affairs, daily classes in home economics and agricultural subjects, a tour of the General Motors Plant, a showing of the new movie on 4-H Club work, "The Green Promise", a friendship party, and an illustrated safety talk.

Miss Anne Green, the farm youth exchangee from Scotland, who is spending the month visiting farms in Delaware, will talk to the group on "Farm Life in Scotland". A softball tournament will be the final event on the 4-H program.

Fireworks July 4th?

The following is a reprint of the law of Delaware regarding the sale and use of fireworks. This article is being published by the Kent County Volunteer Firemen's Association in an extended effort to save life and property from the ravages of fire.

The Act specifically provides that on and after September 5, 1939, it was unlawful for any person to sell, offer or expose for sale or have in his possession with intent to sell or to use, discharge, or cause to be discharged, ignited or fired or otherwise set in action within the State of Delaware any fireworks, firecrackers, rockets, sparklers, torpedoes, roman candles, fire balloons or other fireworks except after having obtained a permit as later provided in the statute, and provided further that the section does not apply to any person, firm or corporation then established and manufacturing fireworks of any and all kinds in the State. The statute further provides that it is unlawful for any persons, association or company to fire or discharge on or into any street highway, alley or public place a rifle, gun, pistol, revolver, cane, cannon or other appliance projecting or exploding explosive substances, and excepts therefrom only police officers in the regular discharge of their duties and persons using explosives in quarrying or for blast-

ing or other industrial use. Section 3 of the Act provides that a permit may be obtained from the State Highway Department upon proper application. Section 4 gives the State Highway Department authority to confiscate fireworks or explosives illegally stored in the State, and Section 5 thereof provides for a punishment of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, within the discretion of the Court, and gives Justices of the Peace and the Municipal Court of the City of Wilmington plenary jurisdiction over any violations of the Act.

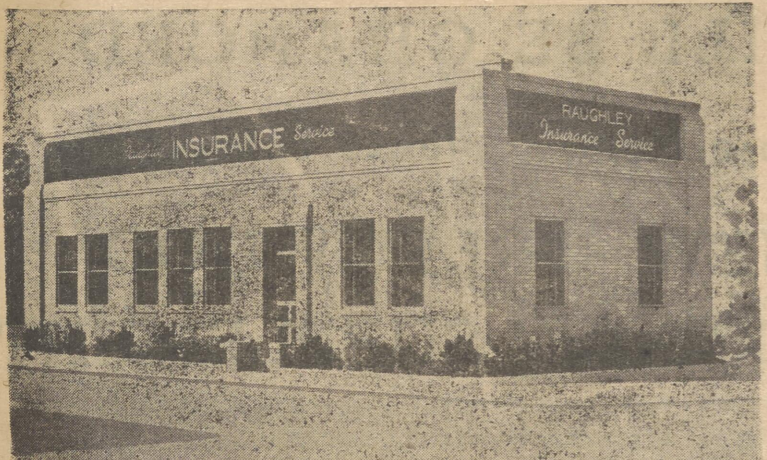

Social Security

Queries Answered

Questions relating to Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance will be answered in this paper or by mail. Address all queries to Social Security Administration, Old Customs House Building, 6th & King Streets, Wilmington, Del.

Q. I am 65 and have stopped working. However, I am too ill to leave my home to file an application for old-age insurance benefits. Must I appear at the social security office in person?

A. If you are too ill to call at the office, you can either write or telephone for an application blank. If you need help in completing the application, the social security office will send a representative to your home to assist you. There is no charge for this service. Do not delay, as you may lose some monthly benefits.

Q. Will working for my son entitle me to benefits under Old Age and Survivors Insurance?

A. No, the law does not cover certain family employment. Services performed for a son, daughter, or spouse, and service of a child up to age 21 for his parent are not included under Social Security.

Q. What is Old-Age and Survivors Insurance?

A. It is a Government insurance program to provide a monthly income for workers and their families when the worker retires at 65 or later and for his family when he dies.

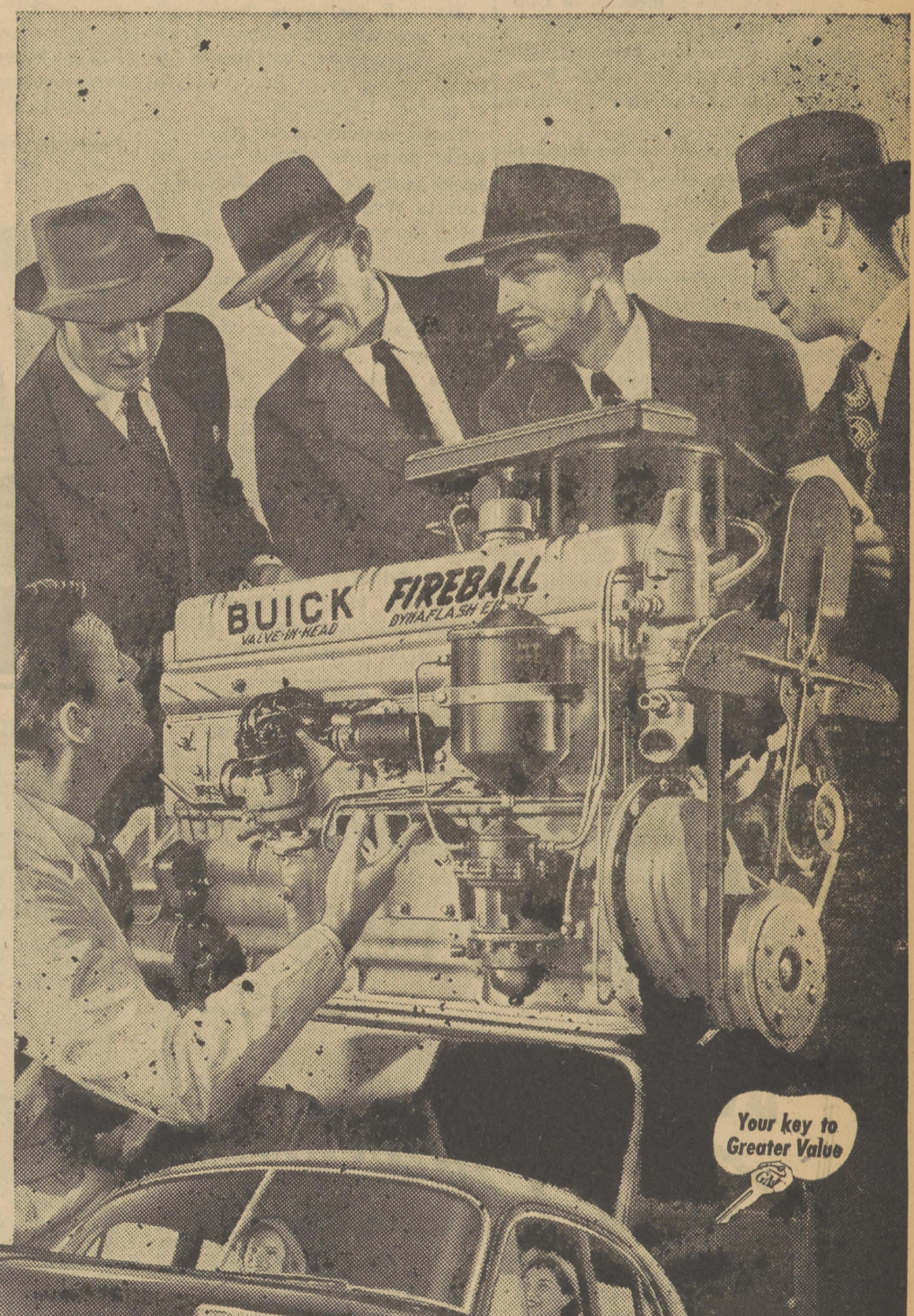

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS Q. If I renounce my disability compensation from VA to enter inactive reserve of the U. S. Navy, will I be eligible to enter training under Public Law 16 because of my World War II service?

A. The determination of eligibility and need for vocational rehabilitation is not affected by renunciation of your compensation. Q. I suffer from a disability that was aggravated by my service in the Army during peacetime. Am I eligible for compensation?

A. If your injury was aggravated by service or you were disabled by injury or disease incurred in service, you may qualify for disability compensation at peacetime rates, provided your discharge was under other than dishonorable conditions. Q. As a peacetime veteran, am I entitled to hospitalization? A. You may be entitled to hospitalization, provided you were discharged under other than dishonorable conditions for a disability incurred in line of duty or if you are receiving compensation for a service-connected disability.

Q. Is the widow of a peacetime veteran entitled to compensation if her husband's death was due to service? A. The widow, children and dependent parents of a deceased peacetime veteran may qualify for compensation where the veteran's death was due to service.
