The Industrial Division of the Chamber will endeavor to secure stock subscriptions in the total of \$50,000, and there seems to be very little doubt that that sum will be quickly obtained.

"With that capital the Laurel Industries, Inc., plans to aid prospective industry as, and when, they need it with an inducement to locate and operate in Laurel. At this writing we have two or three excellent prospects, and when this matter takes definite form I will be glad to advise you.

"In following the plan which I have outlined, the local Chamber of Commerce is following a program that was very successfully initiated by the Chamber of Commerce of Culpepper, Virginia. We obtained our data during a visit made to that Virginia community by five Chamber members."

Questions and Answers Q. If I renounce my disability compensation from VA to enter inactive reserve of the U.S. Navy, will I be eligible to enter training under Public Law 16 because of my World War II service?

A. The determination of eligibility and need for vocational rehabilitation is not affected by renuciation of your compensation.

Q. I suffer from a disability that was aggravated by my service in the Army during peacetime. Am I eligible for compensation? A. If your injury was aggravated

by service or you were disabled by injury or disease incurred in service, you may qualify for disability compensation at peacetime rates, provided your discharge was under other than dishonorable conditions. Q. As a peacetime veteran, am I entitled to hospitalization?

A. You may be entitled to hos-
