The safes in each place showed evidence of tampering and the one in the Milford Tractor Company had its handles and combination dial knocked off.

### HARRINGTON FACED WITH AN ACUTE SHORTAGE OF WATER

The City Council of Harrington. announced today that shortage of water and requests the immediate discontinuance of all illegal use of water such as sprinkling the lawns, gardens, flower plots, and washing automobiles in the street. Penalties are provided in the Water Code and must, of necessity, be invoked unless all citizens cooperate at once. The health of the citizens and visitors would be greatly jeopardized in the event of an acute shortage as the operation of the sewer system is entirely dependent on a full water supply as well as other household necessities, such as clothes washing, baths, drinking water, as well as the many other necessary uses of water.

The City Council has no alternative in the handling of this vital matter and urges full cooperation of all citizens. Penalties are provided in the Water Code for noncompliance and must be invoked unless the seriousness of the situation is realized and the citizens aid in every manner possible.

Information available indicates 'that a great deal of water is being used for garden purposes and this in conflict with the Water Code and this can and should be discontinued.





Section 14 reads as follows:


