JUNIOR CHICKEN CONTEST REPORTS EXCELLENT PROGRESS

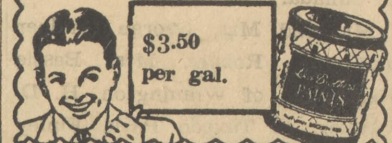
Nearly one hundred Delaware boys and girls are busily engaged caring for their broiler chicks entered in the Junior Division of the Chicken-of-Tomorrow Contest. The committee in charge reports much interest on the part of both contestants and those hatcherymen and hatching egg flock owners whose contributions made it possible for every boy and girl desiring chicks to obtain them free. Twenty hatcheries and about 40 flock owners cooperated with this state-wide activity. Chicks and eggs were from Pullorum clean flocks and the eggs donated were hatched in machines at the University Farm near Newark.
 Progress reports of results of the first two weeks of the 12-week growing period of the contest have been received from nearly all boys and girls enrolled. The average mortality for the first two weeks of the approximately 5,000 chicks started was 4.2 per cent. Aside from a few instances where rats, weasels, and other predatory animals broke into the flocks, the mortality was under two per cent which is an exceedingly fine livability record.
 The committee reports that in addition to the conventional brooder stoves of oil, coal, electric, and gas, other sources of heat used included lantern, mother hen, ordinary electric bulb and an infra red lamp.

September 29 is the date of the finals of the contest, at which time \$100 in prizes will be awarded owners of the birds receiving the ten highest scores. In addition to these cash awards, an attractive trophy, appropriately engraved, will be donated by the Delaware Poultry Improvement Association.
