Four Enlist In Armed Forces

Four men from Kent County enlisted in the Regular Army and Air Force recently as announced by 1Sgt. Paul E. Peacher, Non-Commissioned Officer in charge of Recruiting for Kent County.

Donald Eliason, age 18, Felton,

enlisted for a period of three years in the Air Force. Eliason graduated from Felton High School in 1948 and until his enlistment had been employed at the duPont Plant in Seaford. Eliason will receive his basic training at the Lackland Air Force Base, located in San Antonio, Texas and then will either be assigned to a Regular Air Force Unit or be sent to one of the Air Force Technical Schools.

Lewis E. Denemoustier, age 22, Cheswold; Richard D. Hutchinson, age 18, Blackbird and Richard H. Evans, age 18, Pearsons Corner, all enlisted for a period of three years each in the Regular Army. All will receive their basic training with the Third Armored Division, located at Fort Knox, Ky.

Denemoustier, a graduate of Dover High School in past years and Hutchinson enlisted for assignment to the Corp of Engineers. Evans, who up until his enlistment was a member of Hq. & H. Battery, Delaware National Guard in Dover, Evans enlisted for assignment to the Armored Cavalry.

Sgt. Peacher stated that hundreds of job specialties and career fields are now being set up to enable alert young men to progress rapidly in pay, rank and technical knowledge. The soldier advances within a selected career field on a promotion system tied in directly with his skills, his efficiency, his knowledge, as well as time in grade.

Sgt. Peacher also stated that there will be a Recruiting Sgt. on duty in Milford Post Office from 1

to 2 P. M. each Monday, Harrington Post Office on Tuesday, and Smyrna Post Office on Thursday, also from 1 to 2 P. M. and one on full time duty at the Recruiting Station, located in the American Legion Building in Dover.

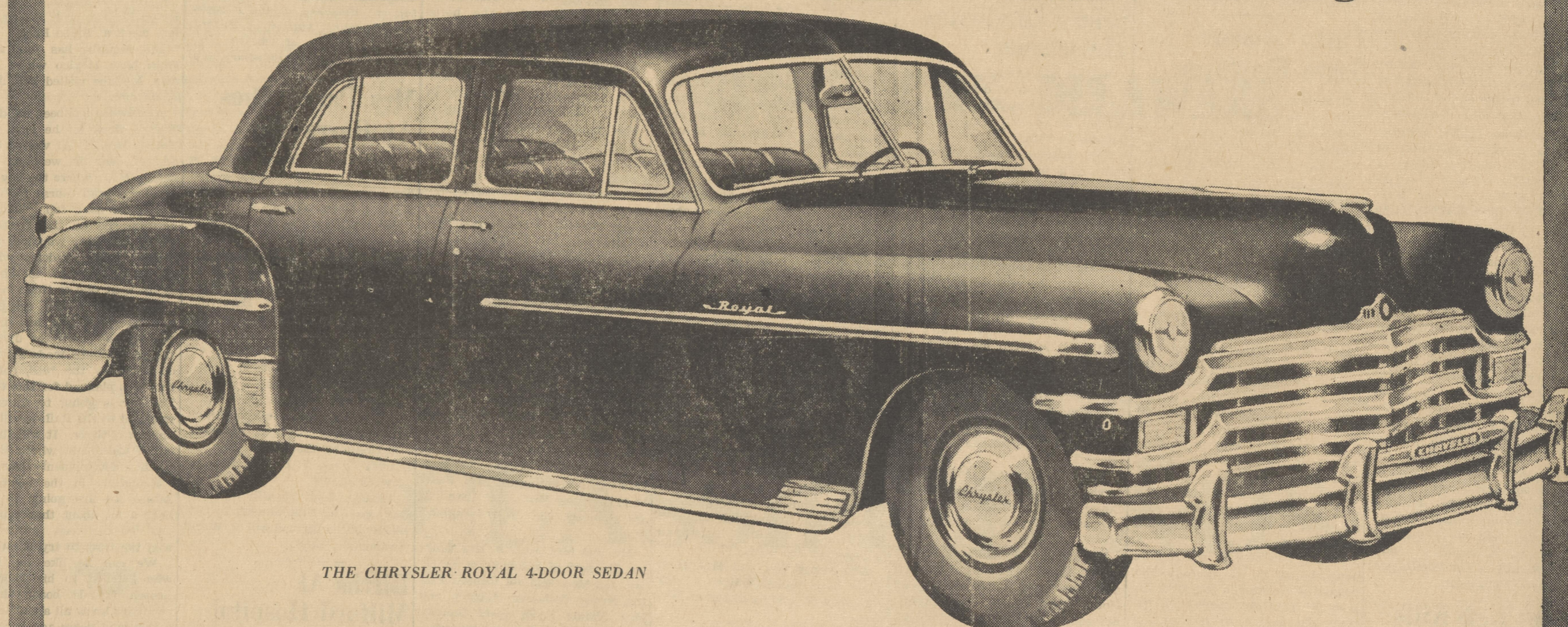
Now, lots of normally considerate folks have their "blind spots."

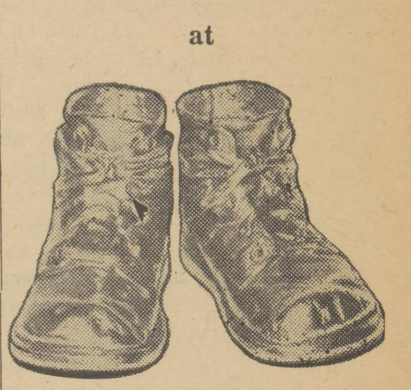
Y. M. C. A. SCHEDULES ART CLASSES

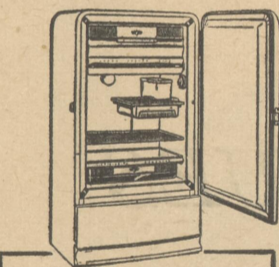

SOYBEAN SUPPORT PRICE ANNOUNCED

Price support of \$2.11 a bushel for 1949-crop green and yellow soybeans grading U. S. No. 2 and containing not more than 14 per cent moisture has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Brown, black, and mixed soybeans will be supported at \$1.91 per bushel. Premiums and discounts will apply to other grades.

The price support says, Ernest S. Mattford, acting director of the Delaware Production and Marketing Administration, is based on 90 per cent of the comparable price for all soybeans on Sept. 1, 1949. To be eligible for loan or purchase agreements, the soybean must grade U. S. No. 4 or better, and must not contain more than 14 per cent moisture.

Loans and purchase agreements will be available to producers from time of harvest through January 31, 1950. Loans will mature May 31, 1950, or earlier on demand. Producers desiring to deliver soybeans under a purchase agreement must declare their intention within a 30-day period ending May 31, 1950, or ending on such earlier date as may be determined by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

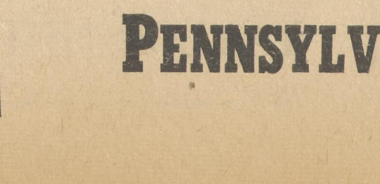

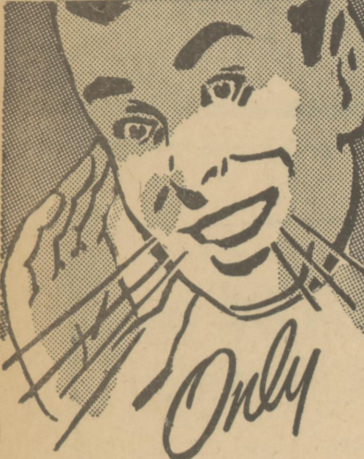
