Price support of \$2.11 a bushe for 1949-crop green and yellow soybeans grading U.S. No. 2 and containing not more than 14 per cent the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Brown, black, and mixed soybeans will be supported at \$1.91 per bushel. Premiums and discounts will apply to other grades.

The price support says, Ernest S. Mattiford, acting director of the Delaware Production and Marketing Administration, is based on 90 per cent of the comparable price for all soybeans on Sept. 1, 1949. 




