Sussex County Dairymen Praise Results With Sudan Grass

The Sussex County Unit of the Delaware Artificial Breeders' Cooperative added 9 new members and contract users during September, according to Raymond M. Lank, president of the association. Mr. Lank stated that this brings the number of dairymen in the association to 209. New members added are: Grise McCabe, Selbyville; Draper's Food, Milford; Norman Baker, Milton; Willmer Flood, Bankford; Robert E. Short, Seaford; Thomas Lankford, Seaford; and Norman Neff, Milton.
New contract users are Clyde Yoder, Greenwood and Paul Yoder, Greenwood.
Mr. Lank also reported that a total of 126 first services were performed by the association during the month. This is the highest ever recorded by the unit.

Delaware Dairymen Make Highest Production Records

Delaware Dairy Herd Improvement Association members have broken two records during the 1949-50 testing year, according to Delmar J. Young, extension dairyman at the University of Delaware. More cows were being tested than in any other year and the average production of milk per cow was highest.
There were 1908 cows in the DHIA program, and their average production was 8548 pounds of milk and 354 pounds of butterfat. This represents an increase, over the past ten years, of 1000 pounds of milk and 50 pounds of butterfat average production.
Young points out that there are now 94 dairy herds in this testing program in Delaware. They are divided into five testing circuits covering the whole state.
The highest herd in the state this year was owned by W. Levis Phipps and Son of Wilmington. Their 34 cows averaged 12,328 pounds of milk. It was the only herd in Delaware to test over 500

Sussex Dairy Unit Adds New Members

Sussex County dairymen entered in the Delaware Greener Pastures Program praised the results they have obtained with sudan grass this year, according to William H. Henderson, county agent. Reporting on the results of the final inspection and judging of the pastures in the county, Henderson pointed out that almost every dairyman felt that sudan grass maintained milk production on their farms during the hot dry period of late July and August.
William T. Thompson of Lincoln says, "Sudan grass is the greatest dry weather pasture I have ever had. I would not have had my pasture during July and August if it had not been for my sudan grass."
Hammond Bennett of Milford said that, "I got an increase in milk production from my sudan grass. I would have been short of pasture without it, with emphasis on the word short."
Vernon Hill, farm manager of the Draper Foods Farm near Milford, said that, "sudan grass as a supplement to our regular pasture enabled us to maintain our milk production at a high level throughout the summer."
Other similar comments from farmers visited left little doubt that Sussex County dairymen insure summer pasture through the use of sudan grass in their pasture program.
