



As to meeting the emergency, Mr. Kahle said, "We feel that the poultry industry is in a position to meet easily all indicated requirements without an expansion of hatchery capacity, laying houses, or other facilities."

About possible ceiling prices, Kahle said, "Government action, if it should develop (with respect to be a limiting factor. We are mostly 28.00 each. encouraged by the fact that egg prices can increase relatively more than feed prices before they reach the minimum levels prescribed by law."

About Delaware, Kahle said, "Individual returns can be increased by careful marketing procedures.
