M. A. Wilson, Chief Engineer Of Highway Board, Is Dead

M. Allan Wilson, 41-year-old chief engineer of the State Highway Department, died late Friday afternoon at his home on Rodney Road following an illness which began in early December. At that time he was stricken while attending the annual convention of the National Association of Highway officials in Miami, Fla., and was removed to Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, for treatment.

Mr. Wilson had been associated with the highway department since 1932. He was appointed chief engineer Dec. 29, 1949, succeeding Col. William A. McWilliams, and last July he was named head of the Civil Defense Highways Division in the state defense or-

Active in Civic Affairs Mr. Wilson, who also was active in civic affairs, was a civil engineer, a registered professional engineer, and a registered land surveyor in Delaware.
