



Memorial Race Here to Honor **Green Valley**

Famous Pacer and Trotter Died Here and is Buried in Infield at Fairgrounds

The Green Valley Memorial Race will honor the famed pacer and trotter, Green Valley, who died at Harrington June 8, 1948, \$1000. He was staked in 13 events and was buried in the infield of

Green Valley was bred by Bert Seden and was foaled in Indiana in 1931. The chestnut colt was named after "the green valleys" trotted to his record of 2:10.1.

He was the son of Single G, one of the nation's greatest harness horses, whose record was 1:58 1-2, made at the age of 13. The dam was Mary Todd, no


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
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
