Authorities in the U.S. Department of Agriculture say farmers can produce just as much milk with little or no grain if they feed better roughage. This nutritive value of hay depends largely upon how it is made. Cutting at the time when protein content of grass is highest, raking to avoid excessive wiltin, and harvesting quickly but gently are most important. Farm engineers at New Holland, Pa., recommend mowing and raking only the amount of hay you can bale or chop in one day. Balers and harvesters work best on even, straight windrows.
