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

To remove old paint from golf a permit to operate harness balls, dip the balls for a few minutes in a warm solution of lye, made by combining about a fifth of a can of lye with a quart of water. Add the lye to the water and use a glass or iron container-not an aluminum or tin one. Stir occasionally with a wooden stick. Follow the paint removal by rinsing, scrubbing and drying.
