Vice-President Barkley To Speak Tomorrow On Georgetown Green

Vice President Alben W. Barkley will make a brief visit to "QUEEN OF THE ICE" Delaware for a farm - policy speech tomorrow afternoon at a Democratic rally on the Georgetown Green.

The Veep is due to arrive at the Dover Air Force Base at 1:30 p. m., the state campaign committee anounced, and will be escorted to Georgetown by a motorcade led by Gov. Elbert N. Carvel and other candidates. The 3 p. m. speech will be broadcast by Station WDOV at Dover.

From Georgetown, the Veep will go to Baltimore for an ad-

dress that night. Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Alexis I. duPont Bayard Sunday night declared that the Republican Party doesn't believe it is time to change its historic stand that the "cheaper labor can be obtained, the better it is for business."

The Democratic nominee for U. S. senator, appearing on a television show of the party, asserted that the GOP has consistently "fought against" the organization of labor.

He said that what the GOP overlooked-and what the Democrats saw—is that when "you cut labor down to a bare subsistence level, you cut down your market for the products labor produces; the Republicans don't seem to understand that you can't have mass production without mass distribution."

It is useless to produce millions of automobiles, television and radio sets, and automatic washers, the candidate contented, if the greater part of the poulation earn salaries so meager that they can afford only the minimum standard of living amounting to "bad food, ramshackle shelter, and poor quality clothing."

In a statement today, Mr. Bay ard hit Senator Williams' remarks at last night's Pulaski Day dinner here as "pure nonsense."

He said he noted with "distress my opponent's crocodile tears," at the dinner, adding:

"Senator Williams professed great sympathy for Poland and the Polish people, but he failed to mention his congressional activities that were against their interest, and the best interests of America.

"Either Senator Williams has forgotten his votes or chooses to ignore them.

"For a man who has voted against increasing the number of displayed persons permitted to enter this country, and then later against admitting any displayed persons at all; and for one who has voted for the discriminatory McCarren act, as well as to deny or cut back military aid to those who are holding out against Communist tyranny and enslavement-for a man who has done all these things to stand up and profess great friendship and sup-

port. is pure nonsense. "My opponent can not live down his isolationist record. He has voted consistently to destroy the instruments of collective security against the world threat of communism. Had his votes prevailed, Soviet troops would be not only in Poland, but in all of western Europe."



Don't get mad at your corn picker if it clogs, breaks or needs adjustments in the field. It sounds ridiculous, but anyone who has had it happen to them knows it's easy to do, says Guy W. Gienger, extension agricultural long time on improved varieties engineer at the University of Maryland.

"When you're tired and irritated is when an accident is likely to happen, so play it safe. major areas. These new varieties Gienger advises. Here are his suggestions for a safe corn harvest—they'll make corn picking easier as well as safer:

> before taking it into the field. Heavy Infestations Find and replace worn parts. Get a copy of University of Maryland Fact Sheet 36, 'Corn Picker Adagent, and use it along with your manufacturer's manual to adjust the picker.

"Drive slow and be careful to keep on the row, especially in down corn. Getting off the row means clogged pickers, and will make you lose corn, as well as

"Always stop the picker to clean snapping rolls or to make any adjustments or to grease the

"Be alert-don't get hurt while harvesting this year's corn crop."

CULTURE COMES—ON WHEELS

When we were a youngster the great English states For hunger gnawed him night and day—Bill Muggins knew man, Winston Churchill, was not on the map, but the American Winston Churchill, probably the greatest writer of historical novels we have produced, was at the peak of his worldwide fame. We read many of his books, among them "The Crisis," an epic of Civil War days, and through the years we considered this the greatest novel of this type ever written.

Any book worth reading should be read more than once If you have read it in your youth, you should read it again learned something during the years and see if it forms the same pattern of approval it did when all of life was a great adventure.

Go into the ordinary so-called book store of today—and we went into many in our search for a copy of "The Crisis" -and you are confronted by rack on rack of lurid stuff about sex and murder. We know this masterpiece can be found in almost any good public library, but it takes time to thoroughly read a book like this and we were not long in any city with such a library.

And then the "Bookmobile," sent out by the Library Commission for the State of Delaware, came to Harrington. We asked the lady in charge about "The Crisis." She was very gracious. "The library has it," she said, "but it's in such demand that it's out most of the time. I'll see if we can't get it for you.'

The next time the Bookmobile came to Harrington, another lady, equally gracious, was in charge. "We have filed your request for the book, and if we can't supply it, we'll order a new copy."

The new copy was delivered to us last week. Once again we read "The Crisis"—and we appreciated it even more than we did when we read it years ago—and all residents of Delaware should appreciate the work of the Library Commission in bringing to their homes something worth reading There came from one lean spigot streams—that spigot more than one time.

"TAXATION WITHOUT REPRESENTATION IS

This was a shibboleth of the colonists when they arose in arms against Great Britain. They had taxes imposed by the mother country, but they had no representation. Many have died all over the world—to give you and others the right to vote, the right to elect your own officials.

When we read that only 51 per cent of the eligible voters of the United States voted in the presidential election in 1948, we must realize that 49 per cent of our people do not give a hang about the sacrifices others have made to win this privilege for them. As far as they are concerned, their fathers died in vain.







2, 4-D, the successful chemical weed-killer, has now been modified so that certain forms of it are beneficial to tomato plants, according to preliminary tests of the U.S. Department of Agricul-

Ordinary unmodified 2, 4-D harms tomato plants, curling the leaves, stopping growth, and even killing some of the plants. Modified 2, 4-D caused fruit to set, and tomataoes developed without pollinatión. These tomatoes were of increased size and excellent

Dr. G. E. Hilbert, chief of the Bureau of Agricultural and Industrial Chemistry, emphasized that work thus far has been done under controlled greenhouse conditions, and that further studies, including field tests, are necessary before there can be applications of commercial value. Scien tists of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils, and Agricultural Engineering are co-operating in

The weed-killing type of 2,4-D is very potent, destroying not only weeds, but also some cultivated plants. This limits its use-

By modifying the original 2, 4-D by chemical combination with cer tain amino acids prepared in the laboratory, chemists and plant physiologists were able to produce the modified 2, 4-D which helped the tomato plants.

of the University of Delaware had to say about the disease recently. Waller, chairman of the animal and poultry industry department, Dies; Stricken at Races said the disease has appeared only in garbage feeding areas, or in hogs which had passed through large central stockyards.
