## Railroad News

The square structural rigging on the lawn at the station with brake wheels mounted on all four sides is for instructing trainmen on the safe way to apply the various kinds of hand brakes in use today.

Passenger Trainman John Baker from Delmar, the instructor in charge, says 103 trainmen received instructions at Delmar last week. All local trainmen will be instructed this week and the rigging moved to Clayton next week.

The Delaware division replaced the switch locks on all switches last week with the later type lock, which has been standard on the system for the past twelve years.

Joe Mitchell, engineer on D-28, last Friday was bucking severe headwinds and heavy rains all the way. On arrival at Edgemore, he found water over No. 13 yard track where they had him lined up to terminate his train. Joe hesitated about taking his 116-car train into water that was up over the journal boxes on cars nearby, and refused to move without a written order signed by the superintendent.

The yardmaster told him Columbus took a chance in water a lot deeper than that and made it. Joe said: "Yes, but Columbus didn't have a diesel engine." They did not give him an order, but found another track to reach his train. Joe is to be highly commended for the stand he took, as the possibility of further delay and damage to motors was avoided.
