

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

The ruins and splendors of Rome, India's sacred cows, her poverty and friendly people, and coccessors even tiger hunting, fill Vaughn Fox's first report from India to Delaware people. Vaughn is Delaware's International Farm Youth Exchangee, now spending six months with Indian farm fam-

Vaughn is now in Bhopal, India, approximately 9000 miles from Delaware. On his way to India he spent three days visiting Rome, then a week in Del-In his own words, Vaughn describes his first impressions of

"Soon I will take up my job as an IFYE, as grassroots ambassador. I cannot stay with the average Indian farmer because he can't offord to keep me. They have no sanitary conditions whatsoever, the water is polluted, and they have hardly enough food to get by on. I have seen poverty that I thought was impossible to exist. Today is Thanksgiving Day and it makes my heart ache to know and see these Indian people with no place to call home, no food to eat, and some have no clothes to wear. Krewatch also cautions that there should be adequate elec-M. Dawes, Oak Grove; Mrs. Lau-tric in the building with sufficient outlets where the heat lamps can be plugged on short lengths of the proper type extension cord. A porcelain or special metal socket is best because the sockets do get hot. Ordinary "acrossthe-counter" sockets should not be used.

There are two types of heat lamps. One type is made of hard glass, which is usually red in color, and will stand water splashing or moisture. The other, a lower priced lamp, is made of clear glass and will break if water is splashed on it.

In many uses, heat lamps are best protected by a deep-dome reflector. If such a reflector is used. Krewatch suggests that you be sure it is one with ventilation holes around the socket. This will prevent the entire unit from getting so hot.

Some manufacturers provide a bowed strip of metal across the open end of the reflector. Should the reflector fall on the floor or fall on a litter in a pen, the lamps will simply roll over, pointing the heat rays upward and thus not become a fire hazard.

In a building where a large number of lamps are used, it is best to check the wire size of the circuits to be sure that full voltage is delivered to the lamps. The loss of heat, says Krewatch, is more than double the drop in

With most of the world at war and a large portion of the remainder on relief, it takes something more than gleaming dental displays to thrill one—and besides, it isn't good taste to be thrilled by one's own smile. "Your smile will make be thrilled by one's own smile. you irresistible," shrieks another toothpaste commercial. Webster's definition of "irresistible": "That cannot be successfully resisted or opposed." The appalling ignorance of Stalin! Instead of spending billions for armaments, why doesn't he use the right brand of toothpaste-

Here's a million-dollar tip to the manufacturer of a cigarette, a manufacturer smart enough to recognize the intelligence of American people: "Good tobacco goes into our cigarette, and it is blended in the modern way. We do not say this is the best cigarette in the world, but we do say it is a good cigarette. We do not claim that, once you have tried it, you will prefer it to all other brands. Frankly, since a cigarette is a matter of personal taste, you may not like our cigarette at all—but you will never know this unless you try it."

HE DIDN'T BUILD FOR PROFIT-

SO IT PROSPERED

Several years ago a native of the Easton, Md., area went out into the world and amassed a fortune. He wanted to do something for his native town, That pleasant little city had two or three hotels, the typical country town hotels of other days, rambling structures, with a plentiful supply of wholesome food, unstinting hospitality—and very few conveniences—so this native son decided to give his old home town a modern hotel.

When the scope of his plan was revealed, the standpatters thrust their thumbs beneath their galluses, snapped the buckles and opined: "Durned fool thing to do, if you ask me"—nobody had asked "won't make any money-bound to lose his socks.




