**The Annual Pre-School Exam.**

The Annual Pre-School Examinations conducted by the State Board of Health will be given to the children of the Harrington (White), Houston and Farmington Schools at the Harrington (White) School, Thursday, April 29th at 10 a.m.

Immunizations will also be given. In addition to the triple vaccine, which will give protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and lockjaw. Vaccinations against smallpox will also be available.

The State Board of Health recommends that these examinations be given by private physicians. If this is not done, however, the children will be examined in the schools. Qualified physicians and nurses will be in attendance.
