COOPERATIVE EFFORT EQUALS PUBLIC GAIN

Milford Veterans of Foreign Wars, Blue Hen Post 6483 has leased to the Delaware Game and Fish Commission a two acre tract of land at Haven Lake for installation of a launching ramp and parking area for cars and trailers. The State Highway Department has agreed to maintain the road leading to the area for the Game and Fish Commission. The Haven Lake launching site will add one more free access site to Delaware waters.

At Fowler's Beach the parking area, which and mat facilities have been heavily used all season with as many as 70 cars in the lot on a good fishing day. Commission developed launching sites at Quillen's Point and Masey's Landing, on the Indian River Bay, and three sites on the Assawoman Bay are familiar to fishermen and crabbers.

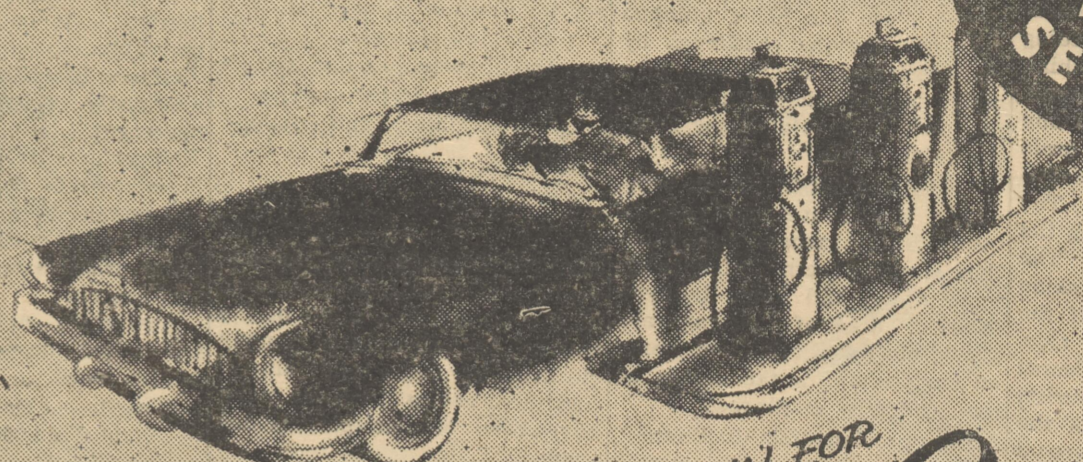

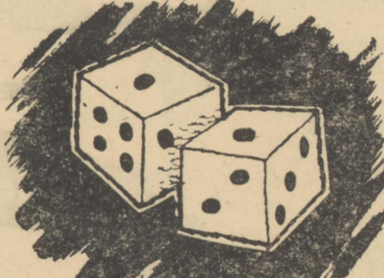

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I have a \$10,000 Korean GI term insurance policy. I understand that after January 1, 1957, no more of this insurance will be issued to Korea veterans. Will I have to give up my policy after that date?

A—No. Policies already in force on January 1, 1957, may be retained after that date.

Q—My father died as a result of a service-connected disability, and therefore I am eligible for schooling under the new War Orphans Education Program. Is the amount of schooling I can get based on the length of time he served in the armed forces?

A—It is not. Regardless of how long your father served, you may be eligible for 36 months of schooling. This period of schooling will be shortened only for eligible young men and women who are veterans and who already received training under the Korean GI Bill or Public Law 894 for the disabled.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran who died of a non-service-connected condition. I receive a pension from VA each

Estonian Wins In Penguin Regatta At Oak Orchard

Despite windy weather that gave sailboat enthusiasts a rough time on Indian River, the Atlantic Coast Championship Penguin Regatta at Oak Orchard, Saturday and Sunday, attracted record number of entries and produced one of the most thrilling meets seen in the area in some time.

The meet, which had to be cut from a five-race event to four races, also saw the literal unseating of a six time champion and the crowning of a new one. Actually there were 44 Penguins entered from seven states and the District of Columbia. Of that number, 41 sailed in the opening races and at least 28 were able to make their way through all four races.

It looked easy pickings for the six times national penguin champion Runyon Colie, Jr., of Mentoloking, N. J., who easily captured the first event Saturday despite a 20-mile wind that was doing all sorts of tricks to the little craft as they dodged in and out of one another's way, aiming for the buoy course-makers.

In the second race Colie managed to come in ninth and still was in good position to win. However, the wind proved his undoing Sunday afternoon. As

he turned around the buoy marking the end of the first lap, he capsized. A good sport, he came back for the fourth race and again capsized in the very same place.

Meanwhile, William Lane of Easton Md., with Connie Bloomfield as a crew member, improved in every race. He scored a sixth, second, second and first in the four events; compiled 132.3 points and was crowned the new 1956 penguin champion by the National Penguin Class Dinghy Association.

The runner-up position with 129.5 points was Dr. Walter Lawson, Washington, D. C., physician, who had Bert Bell as his crewman. Silver trophy awards also went to third, fourth and fifth place winners as follows; Bruce and Audrey Anderson, Red Bank, N. J.; Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Cotter, Silver Springs, Mr.; and Mr. and Mrs. and Mrs. Roger Brown, Short Hills, N. J.

Governor J. Caleb Boggs assisted Commodore Robert W. Tunnell in presenting the beautiful trophies to successful contestants. Governor Boggs praised the work of the contestants under trying conditions and invited them to return to enjoy Delaware's sports spots and its hospitality as provided by members of the Indian River Yacht Club, sponsors of the two-day event.

Winners of first place in the four races were: Colie, Brown, Anderson and Lane in that order. Each was given a small silver cup as his reward.

Mr. Lane also became holder of the National Association permanent trophy on which his name will be inscribed. Next year he returns it and the new winner will hold it for a year.

The Indian River Yacht Club had placed its hopes in Robert Purnell and "Bo-Bo Jr." to make a showing in the Atlantic Coast meet. Said to be their best sailer, he came to grief in the second race when his skill overturned and he could not finish. However, he gamely sailed along in each of the four races.

Walter (Hilly) Purnell served as race chairman and James M. Tunnell, Jr., was meet chairman, calling the signals and getting the skippers together from time to time when it seemed almost necessary to abandon the contests on Sunday because of the high wind. However, the skippers voted to make two more attempts and both were run off without incident except for Colie's capsizing twice.

Serving as recorders for the races were Edna Purnell, Emma Devin, Randall Rogers; Protest Committee, D. J. Layton, Jr., Hilly Purnell, Ralph Youngs, Lester Purnell and Horace Okie. Starters were James Devins and James Rogers while Lester Russell and James Tunnell, Jr., were observers at the finish line.

Summer Regatta scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 13. This will be an invitation meet.

Sheepmen to Note 3rd Anniversary

Members and friends of the Delaware Sheep and Wool Association will celebrate three years of progress at a banquet at Dover on Monday, Sept. 17th according to the president, Don Concilio.

Governor J. Caleb Boggs will be the guest of honor and will be treated to roast lamb from the prize grand champion animal at the Kent-Sussex Fair. The lamb was bid in for \$2.00 per lb. by Alexander's Restaurant at Dover, which is serving the banquet.

The main speaker is to be Dean George M. Worriolow of the University of Delaware, who is expected to discuss plans of the School of Agriculture to further assist the increasing numbers of sheep producers in the state.

The association handled more than 21,000 lbs. of wool for 75 producers at the third annual wool pool in June. Growers received at least eight cents more per pound by pooling their production as a graded product as against selling it individually for salvage prices.

The sheep growers meet regularly on a bimonthly schedule to compare growing practices, to hear specialists, and to exchange market information. A lamb pooling program is now being

considered as another marketing step which should increase farm profits.

Lamb and wool are two of the few items of farm produce now in short supply. Only about a fourth of domestic demands is produced in this country. Delaware growers who marketed their wool through the pool received 21.5 cents per pound as an incentive payment through the ASC program of the United States Department of Agriculture. Funds for the incentive program came largely from tariffs collected on imported wool. Domestic wool production is deemed vital in periods of national emergency.

DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT

Farmers in the northwest corner of Kent County have asked for a meeting to discuss improvement of land drainage in the Underwood Corners - Blackiston area. Accordingly, George Vapaas, county agricultural agent, has set the time for Thursday, Sept. 13, at 8:00 p.m., in the Kenton School. Landowners who may be affected by the project are invited to attend.

The Delaware state drainage laws provide that any group of landowners having a common drainage problem may petition the Soil Conservation District for help in solving it. Where the project is feasible, it is then permissible for the landowners to form a tax ditch company to construct a system of ditches and to provide for their maintenance. The new law also provides that the state and county share in the construction costs, since the benefits tend to improve the well being of the whole community.

The meeting on the 13th will be concerned with the preparation of a petition for drainage if the discussions show that there is enough general interest. Facts concerning the proposed drainage area, type of construction, and answers to specific questions will be given.

The Cattail Tax Ditch, west of Harrington, has been substantially completed under the new law.

The Greenbranch Tax Ditch company, also west of Harrington, is now under construction. An older tax ditch, known as the Culbreth Marsh, has been operating for many years under the original laws. About 14 groups in the county are in various stages of planning or operating tax ditches. Drainage is after all, the most pressing conservation problem in the county.

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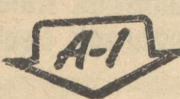
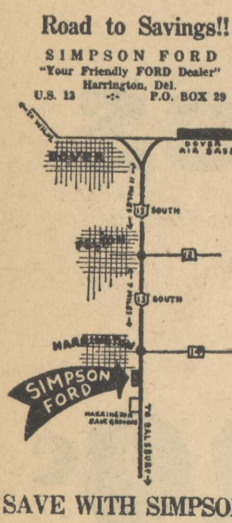
