QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I have added the total disability income rider to my GI insurance policy. If anything happens to me so that I receive disability payments, will those payments reduce the face amount of my policy?

A—No. The face amount of your GI policy will not be affected by any payments you might receive under the total disability income provision because you are paying an added premium for this protection.

Q—How much special restorative training may a handicapped young man or woman receive

under the War Orphans Education program?

A—As much as is necessary to overcome or lessen the handicap of the disability to the extent that the young man or woman may pursue a program of education. However, the special training may not exceed 36 months.

Q—I am planning to sell my GI house. How do I go about applying to VA for a release from liability to the Government?

A—You must submit a written request to the VA Regional Office which processed your loan. The request should include your VA loan number if you know it; address of the property; name and address of the lender who

holds the note and mortgage.

Q—If I want to take a course under the Korean GI Bill that often is considered a vocational or recreational in nature, what steps am I supposed to take?

A—You must submit justification to VA that the course will be of bona fide use in your present or contemplated business or occupation. You must get VA's approval before starting the course.

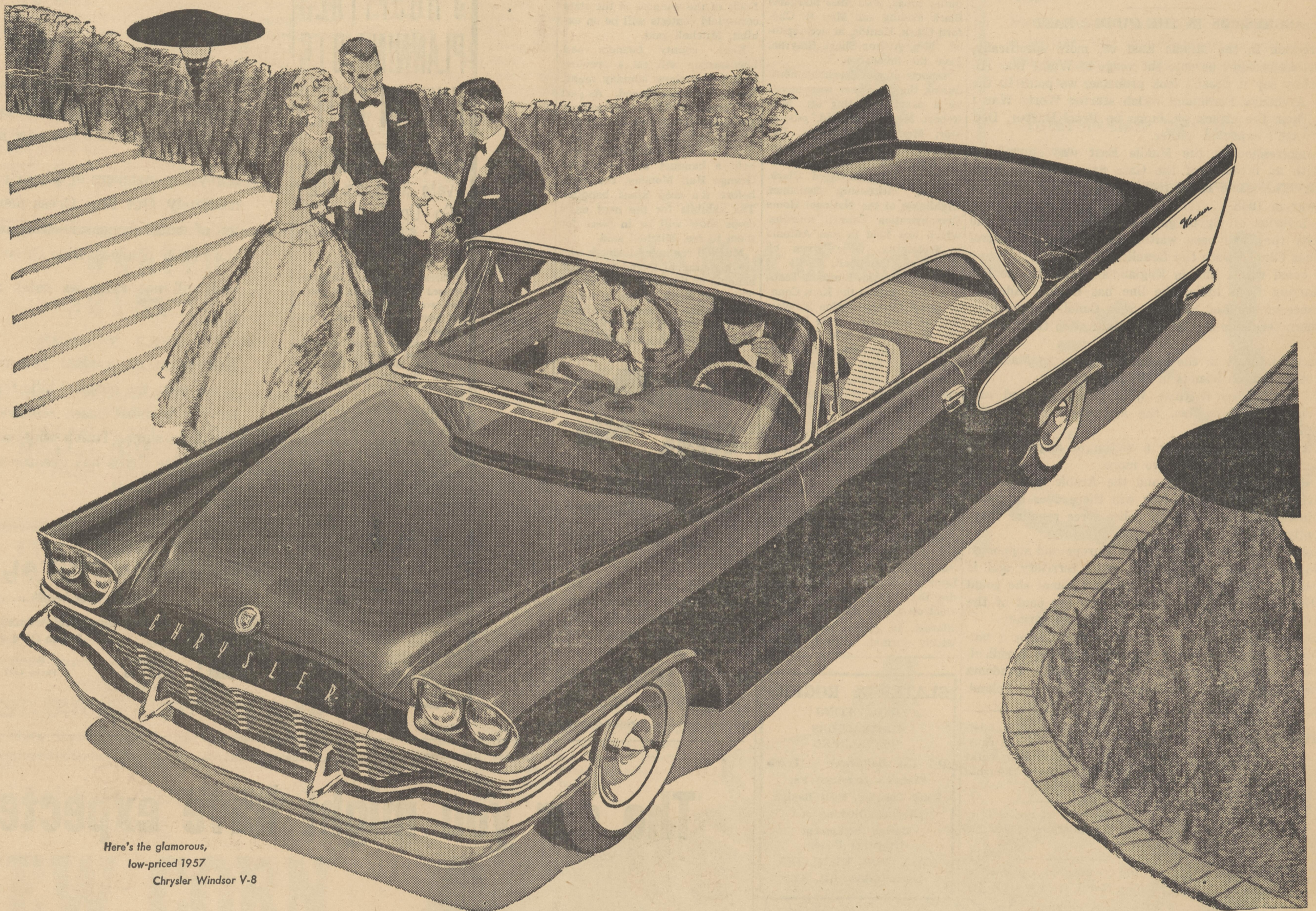

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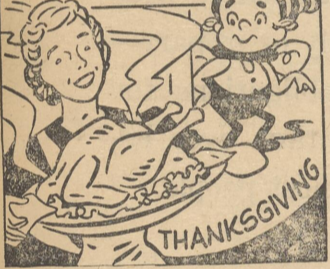

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THE ELECTION

President Eisenhower's popularity was clearly demonstrated last week when he swept the nation in the General Election. The vote-getting power of the President was accentuated by the fact that he carried many states where the GOP as a whole, lost out.

We will continue to have a Democratic Congress. Here in Delaware the Republican state ticket won. The wishes of Gov. Boggs, however, will again be canceled, to a great extent, by the fact that the voters split their tickets to again put in a Democratic Assembly.

In Kent County, in the county offices, all Democrats but one were elected. For the first time since 1948, a Republican was elected. J. Ward Hurley, from the First Levy Court District, will have two Democrats to oppose him in the Levy Court.

The normally Republican districts, in the race for representative, returned to the fold. They were the Second, Fifth, and Seventh. The Democrats elected representatives from these districts two years ago when the school integration question was up. This time they spent lots of time and effort in the area, dominated by Dover, Camden, and Wyoming, but it was the boys from the country who pulled the chestnuts out of the fire for the Democrats.

AGGRESSION IN THE MIDDLE EAST

Aggression in the Middle East or, more specifically, in Egypt, has brought us onto the verge of World War III. Lest scoffers say it doesn't look probable, we point to the death of Archduke Ferdinand which started World War I in 1914. Then, the attack by Japan on Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941, wasn't expected, either.

The aggression in the Middle East was started by Israel, with an invasion of the Gaza Strip and the Sinai Peninsula. This same Israel took territory from Egypt in a brief war in 1948.

The invasion of Egypt gave England and France the opportunity they had been waiting for: to regain control of the Suez Canal before the Israelites took it.

The canal was a link in England's lifeline to the Far East. Starting from India, the line has Ceylon, Aden at the entrance of the Red Sea, the Suez Canal, Cyprus near the northern terminus of the canal, Malta, and the Rock of Gibraltar.

France's interest in the canal may point to Madagascar and other French islands in the Indian Ocean.

What puzzles us is this: Why didn't England and France chase the Israelites, the aggressors out of the Sinai Peninsula?

As it was Egypt, already a victim of aggression by one nation, was attacked by two more.

We do not believe Israel and the Arabic nations will ever solve their differences. Nor will there ever be peace in the Middle East unless a UN police force remains there permanently.

Israel, crowded by refugees from Europe and supported by world-wide contributions, needs more territory and is not particular how she gets it. The Suez Canal she could use. With the Arabic states producing 70 per cent of the oil used by Europe, they are also an eventual target.

The request of Israel, an aggressor nation, for a mutual defense pact with peace-loving United States, is ridiculous. If we support aggressors, we cannot justly condemn the Soviet Union for its brutalities in Hungary and Poland.

Record Number of Entries Scheduled for Annual State Crop Show

More than 250 entries have been received for the annual state Crop Show to be held in the Capitol Grange Hall at Dover, Tuesday, reports William Mitchell, University of Delaware agronomist and secretary of the Delaware Crop Improvement Association.

Entries in the show, which is held in conjunction with the annual DCIA banquet that night where the state's crops kings are named, include hay, silage and small grains exhibits. Also, corn and soybeans samples from the fields of the winners in the state corn-yield contests will be on exhibit, Mitchell said.

Kent county farmers and townspeople will get a preview of the crop show Monday night, Mitchell also announced. As part of Farm-City Week celebrations sponsored Nov. 16-22 by Kiwanis International, the combined service clubs of the Dover area will hold a banquet at the Capitol Grange Hall Monday, the night before the crop kings banquet. The exhibits for the next day's crop show will be in place for them to see, Mitchell said.

Mitchell reminded farmers who are planning to attend the crops banquet or the crops show on the 20th that there is also a 4-hour short course in crops scheduled



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at the Capitol Grange Hall that morning and afternoon. Speakers from Delaware and Pennsylvania will discuss nitrogen applications, year around feeding of silage, hay analysis, use of roughages, and horse sense about growing corn. There will also be a report on wise and unwise methods for harvesting soybeans.

3 HOSPITALS PLANNING BIG HIKE IN RATES

Cost of Semi-Private Rooms May Go Up From \$12 To \$16 Per Day

Three Wilmington hospitals, pressed by rising costs of operation, are considering a substantial boost in room rates, it was learned yesterday.

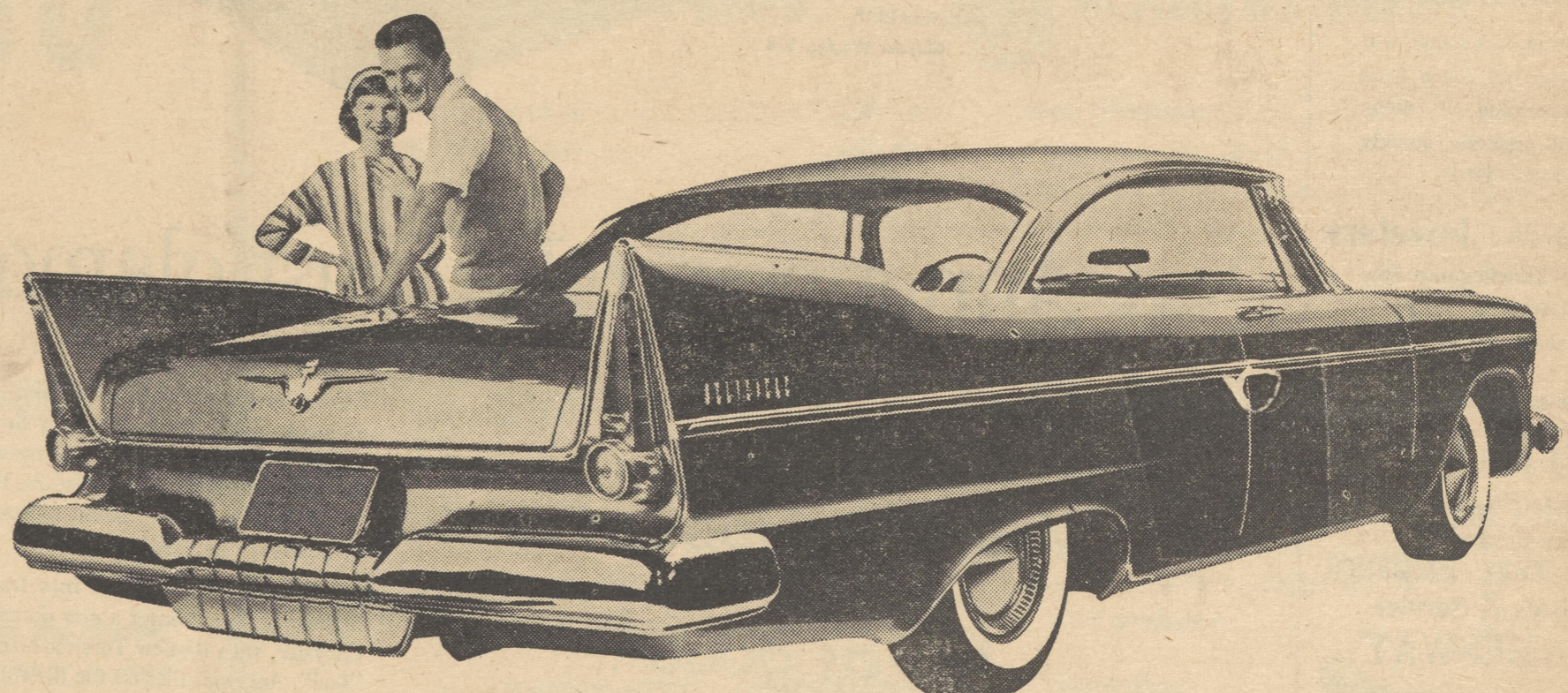
The change under study at Wilmington General, Delaware and The Memorial Hospitals, would increase the rate for semi-private rooms from \$12 to \$16.

Whatever increase the hospitals decide to put into effect must eventually be reflected in an increase in Blue Cross membership rates. Officials of Group Hospital Service are known to be watching the hospitals' rate change move closely, because it directly affects Blue Cross's financial situation. Blue Cross serves as a financial agency which collects dues from its members and pays certain hospital bills for them. Blue Cross has no control over the rates which it must pay hospitals to provide its members with service, and for that reason its own membership rates are closely tied to changes in hospital charges. Blue Cross officials have been saying, however, that they expect their present rates to hold for at least the rest of this year. The last increase in Blue Cross rates was made in February, 1955.

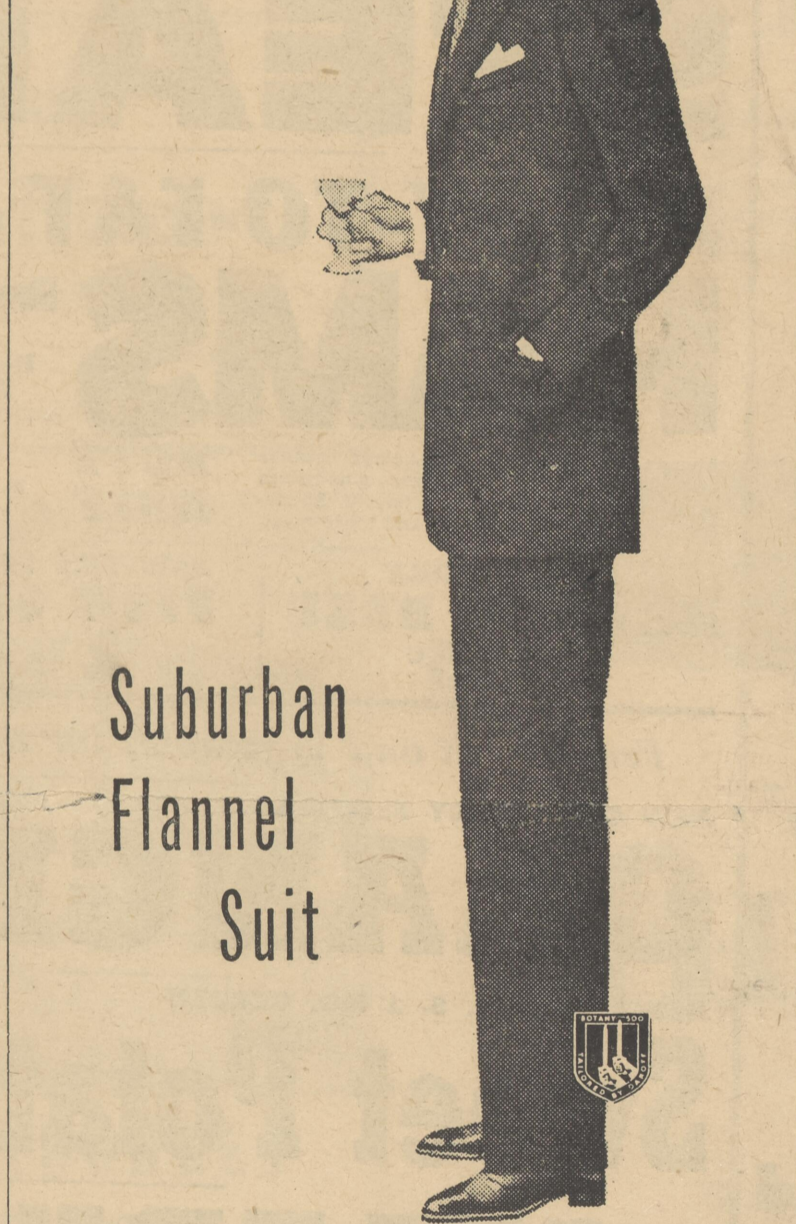
