How high is Harrington above sea level? You make your estimate. Answer is given below. Does rain water falling in our City flow to Delaware Bay, Chesapeake Bay or direct to the At-

If your first estimate is Mispillion River you are incorrect. Rain water falling in Harrington drains into two arms of Brown's Branch and flows northeast to the Muderkill River and thence to Delaware Bay at Bowers Beach. The exception is a small area of the south west corner of Harrington which drains into Bright Haines Ditch, reaches Marshyhope Creek above Adamsville and flows via Federalsburg, Md., to the Nanticoke River. Thus a small amount of Harrington rainfall reaches Chesapeake Bay. The railroad track through Harrington is 59.7 feet above sea level. Two miles south of Harrington it rises to a maximum of 63.0 feet. Then the railroad grade falls intermittently until it is only nine feet above sea level on the bridge at Seaford where it crosses the Nanticoke

The level topography of the Delmarva Peninsula is very interesting in its own special characteristics. It would be possible to quicken or reverse the flow of water tlmost anywhere by digging a ditch not more than ten feet deep and ten miles long. But in most cases the result would be

At first thought it might seem desirable to protect Harrington streets with such a ditch. It would need to be only four miles long to reach the Beaverdam Branch south of Houston. Harrington pavements would never again be kept under water. But dessert out of farm land around

The result is a local flood such as occured as Queen Anne, Md. last week.

This was a flood of Norwich Creek which flows into the Tuckahoe River just south of Queen Anne and Hillsboro. There has been so much deep ditching of land adjacent to Norwich Creek that when an unusual rain occurred the top soil of the farms eroded into the ditches. The Creek got out of its banks and washed out both the highways and the railroad.

The Pennsylvania Railroad had to make track repairs estimated at \$30,000 of its own money in order to get back into business moving freight between Easton, Queen Anne, Denton, and Queenstown. This work required a full week. Some highways have not yet been repaired and truck lines are bein inconvenienced while waiting for the taxpayers to repair the roads.

A class for mentally retarded children will open in Harrington shortly. This class will be operated by the Kent-Sussex Association for retarded children and is being set up for children from lower Kent and upper Sussex counties, who cannot qualily for classes in the public schools due to mental retardation. The school will stress individual attention so that each child will be able to work at his own level or ability. School will be in session approximately five hours per day, five days a week. The program of the school will place emphasis on self-care, socialization, muscle coordination, speech development, training in crafts and domestic skills, and as much academic learning as the children are able to absorb. Retarded children over four years of age will be considered for enrollment in this class. Children should be toilet trained and able to walk, but it is not necessary that they be able to speak.

A room for the class is being provided by the Church of the Nazarene, in Harrington. The teacher will be Mrs. Nellie Luff of Harrington. She has had previous teaching experience. She will be given assistance in planning her program by specialists from the Delaware Association for Retarded Children.

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



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Cost of Semi-Private Rooms May Go Up From \$12 To \$16 Per Day

By CY LIBERMAN Three Wilmington hospitals, pressed by rising costs of operation, are considering a substantial boost in room rates, it was learned yesterday.

The change under study at Wilmington General, Delaware and The Memorial Hospitals, would increase the rate for semi-private rooms from \$12 to

Whatever increase the hospitals decide to put into effect must eventually be reflected in an increase in Blue Cross mem bership rates. Officials of Hospital Service are known to be watching the hospitals' rate change move closely because it directly affects Blue cross's financial situation Rlue Cross serves as a financial agency which collects dues from its members and pays certain hospital bills for them. Blue Cross has no control over the rates which it must pay hospitals to provide its members with service, and for that reason its own membership rates are closely tied to changes in hospital charges. 


