If Mrs. Charley Welch. it is kept one or two days after it is thawed, it should be wrapped loosely and stored in the Magnolia coldest part of the refrigerator.

As for cooked turkey be sure to refrigerate it promptly. The stuffing should be removed and stored in a separate container. The reason for this is to prevent possible spoilage. Store leftover gravy in a covered bowl. Wrap the turkey loosly in waxed paper and put into refrigerator as soon as possible after the meal.

When reheating turkey or dressing, be sure it is heated all the way through before being served. If you use low heat, you can be more sure of serving hot
