

605 PERSONS VACCINATED HERE FRIDAY AT POLIO CLINIC; FELTON CLINIC IS FRIDAY

Six hundred and five persons received their first polio shot at a clinic Friday evening at Harrington Elementary School.

The second shots will be given Fri., April 12, between 5:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at the same place. Persons, who have not received their first shots, given without charge incidentally, may receive them at Felton School, Wed., March 27, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Dr. W. T. Chipman, of Harrington, administered almost all the shots, with some being given by the nurses.

Dr. Chipman was assisted by Mrs. Olive Shoemaker and Mrs. Barbara Edwards, nurses of the State Board of Health. Volunteer nurses were Mrs. Legatha Farrow, local school nurse, and Miss Helen Sherwood and Mrs. John Raughley, of Milford Hospital.

Mrs. Ernest Killen was hostess. Clerical helpers were as follows: Mrs. Clarence Black, the Misses Hazel and Lydia Johnson, Mrs. Thomas Clendening, and Mrs. Ernest Homewood.

The breakdown of the statistics on the number of persons vaccinated is as follows:

Persons 20 years and over, 466; ages, 15 to 19 years, 21; 10 to 14 years, 16; 5 to 9 years, 40, and under 5 years, 62.

The polio clinic was sponsored by the State Board of Health, the Delaware Medical Society, the State of Delaware, and the Kent County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The best man was Edward Hobbs, of Harrington, a friend of the bridegroom.

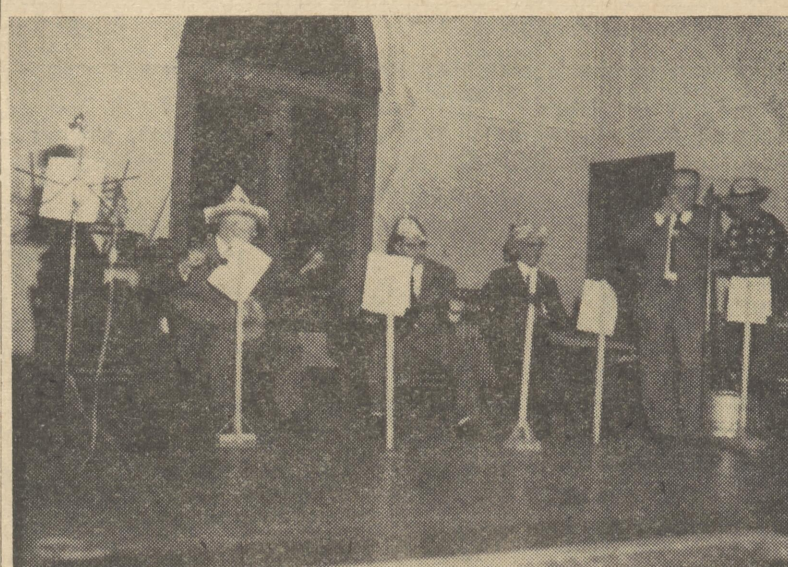
A family reception followed the ceremony at the home of the bride's parents, after which the young couple left for a short wedding trip.

Motorcycle Crash Fatal to Father Of 2 Children

A 22-year-old Maryland man, injured when his motorcycle skidded and threw him off on a curve near Felton Friday, died early Saturday at the Milford Memorial Hospital.

The death of Charles D. Wilson brought Delaware's highway toll for 1957 to 18, four more than in the corresponding period of last year.

Wilson, father of two small children, lived about one mile over the state line near Goldsboro, Md.

State police at the Bridgeville troop said Wilson was riding his motorcycle around a left turn while going south on Route 286 a little over a mile south of Felton.

The left footrest of the motorcycle dragged on the surface of the road as he banked for the turn and the motorcycle skidded sideways for 150 feet off the road's right shoulder, then overturned.

Wilson was thrown off and landed on the shoulder of the road, 32 feet from where the motorcycle left it.

Wilson had a fractured skull, fractured ribs, shoulder bones, and multiple cuts.

Sussex County Coroner Volle Gray said death was due to a fractured skull.

Troopers are continuing the investigation. Coroner Gray said that evidence he obtained showed that Wilson was traveling at a high rate of speed and possibly racing at the time.

At the time of the accident two other youths were riding motorcycles with Wilson, troopers said. They are Thomas Bernier and near Harrington and James Boyd of Felton, both cousins of Wilson.

Bernard was riding behind Wilson and Boyd in front.

The body was released by Coroner Gray to the Rollins Funeral Home, Greensboro, Md.

Wilson was a civilian employe in the sheet metal shop at the Dover Air Force Base. He had two days off and was apparently on a pleasure ride.

The accident occurred at 5:17 p. m. Friday and Wilson died at 4:30 a. m. Saturday.

Wilson is survived by his wife, Mrs. Shirley Draper Wilson of Goldsboro, his children, Charles Wilson, Jr., 4, and Patricia 1, his parents, Charles Wilson and Mrs. Ethel Wilson, Goldsboro; a brother, Leroy Wilson, Seaford, and another brother, Wayne of Goldsboro.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, EDUCATION, AND WELFARE

The Wilmington social security office is experiencing the greatest rush of business in the twenty years of its existence. Since the first of the year, the number of people making claims for insurance benefit payments has doubled over that of a year ago, district manager, Myron Milbouer, said.

The increase in the number of claimants here reflects a condition prevailing in most of the 556 social security offices throughout the country. In one January week alone, a total of 253 persons in this area made claims for old-age, survivors, or disability insurance payments.

Milbouer said that his office is doing everything possible to expedite the handling of people making benefit claims. Since the 1956 amendments to the Social Security Act became law last August, the Wilmington district office has added five staff members to help process the increased work load.

Due to the increased number of claimants, however, many may have to wait longer for interviews when they come to the Wilmington office or one of the eight contact stations maintained in different parts of the State. Also, he said, the large number of claimants in the office slow up the processing of the claims papers. A new beneficiary must sometimes wait longer before he receives his first monthly insurance benefit check.

"If you have made a claim for payments but have not yet received your first check, please be patient," Milbouer urges. He assures those who have recently filed claims that the delay will not result in any loss of benefits. The date an application is filed, not the date of the final award, is used in figuring the monthly benefit amount. Furthermore, he pointed out, benefits can be paid for a period of as much as a year before the time a claim for benefits is made when people are entitled to back payments. Benefit checks for future months will not be affected by the work load and will reach beneficiaries on time.

While ordinarily a wage earner need not submit proof of past earnings, in a claim for old-age benefits, a self-employed person will need to bring along copies of his income tax returns for 1955, 56. Moreover, in claims filed by a widow, widower, child, or surviving dependent parents, certain proofs are usually required. "We don't urge people to go to any great trouble or expense to obtain proofs, but the handling of a claim can be speeded and return visits to our office avoided if a marriage certificate or a birth certificate or baptismal certificate is brought along," Milbouer declared.

In case of doubt, a telephone call to the social security office may save time and delay in getting all necessary papers and in arranging a time to come to the office.

Commenting on the unprecedented number of claims now on hand, Milbouer stated that the situation is temporary. It is due largely to the recent changes in the social security law.

In the area served by the Wilmington social security office a major reason for the increase in claimants is that many self-employed farmers are now qualifying for old-age benefits. Farm operators were first brought under social security at the beginning of 1955. About 400 in this area who have reached retirement age have filed benefit claims since the first of the year, he said.

Women can now elect to claim benefits at age 62. In the country as a whole, more than 600,000 women between the ages of 62 and 65 have filed claims since this provision first became effective last November.

While disability insurance benefits to persons who have reached age 50 first became payable for the month of July 1957, many disabled people are now filing claims. Other disabled people who are still under age 50 are calling to have their social security work records frozen. This action will protect them and their families for future benefit payments even though the disabled worker is not yet eligible for monthly disability payments for himself. As many people are still unfamiliar with the disability provisions in the social security law, Milbouer advises them to ask for a copy of "If You Are Disabled," a new booklet which explains the requirements for the disability freeze and disability benefits.

Delaware Food Market Report

Beef, often called king of the dinner table, has climbed to the top of this week's list of most plentiful foods. However, the food shopper will find it costs a penny or two higher this week. This is in line with the long range forecast that consumers will pay a little more for meat this year than last.

Weekend specials will bring prices down on many beef cuts, look for good buys on chuck roast, ground meat, and round steak. Fresh pork roasts, frying chickens, stewing chickens, turkeys, legs of lamb, frankfurters, sausage and sea foods will also be on the list of specials and good buys.

As most meats continue to rise in price (even though only a penny or two), chickens stay cheaper than meat. With spring officially here thoughts will go to picnics and outdoor eating—what could be better than barbecued chicken.

Vegetables look a little better, price wise, and only a few increases are seen in this week's market report. Heavy rains are responsible for one and two cent raises in green peppers, cucumbers and tomatoes.

Lettuce remains and outstanding buy, averaging 15 cents a head; this weekend it may be found as low as 2 heads for 25 cents. The heads are large, compact and of good quality.

Other good buys this week are: corn as low as 5 cents an ear; Red Bliss and Idaho baking potatoes, averaging 7 and 8 cents a pound; carrots, and many greens.

In the fruit line look for good buys on bananas, they are down in price, selling as low as 9 cents a pound in many stores. Lemons have dropped in price also, selling around 48 cents a dozen. White seedless grapes, as well as the big, dark Ribier grapes are coming into local stores. Don't forget to continue to look for excellent buys on oranges and grapefruit.

Have you seen the new icebox cookies in the refrigerated cases at many stores? They are new and come in three flavors - Crunchy Peanut, Coconut, and Butterscotch. The cookies are shaped in rolls and all the cook has to do is slice and bake them.

RELINING COAT SAVES MONEY

If a worn lining is giving your coat a shabby appearance, and you feel it's about time for a new coat-stop-before you spend the money.

Very often the lining wears out before the coat, so maybe it's a new lining and not a new coat you need, points out Miss Lois Korslund, extension clothing specialist at the University of Delaware.

Se suggests buying only good quality lining fabric. This will give the coat several additional years of wear. The fabric should be preshrunk and color fast, so it will not fade or stain your clothes. Some fabrics are perspiration proof and guaranteed to hold up for the life of the garment. For this kind of information read fabric labels carefully before making your purchase, advises Miss Korslund. The fabric should also be firmly woven, so that seams will not pull out—it should be smooth enough for you to slip easily in and out of your coat.

Most lining fabric comes in widths of 39 to 45 inches. To determine how much fabric you need, measure the length of the coat from the shoulder at the neckline to the hem, add two inches for a hem, multiply this number by two, and add the sleeve length. These inches figured into yards will allow ample yardage for cutting out a new lining. Add an additional half yard if your coat is full.

Use the old lining as a pattern and follow the grain line of the original pieces. Cut and assemble the lining pieces, and replace the entire lining in the coat.

Miss Korslund recommends having your coat cleaned before removing the old lining, since it's much nicer to work with a clean garment.

For those of you with small families, here is a handy new item. Angel food cake mix now comes in half-sizes, containing 8½ ounces instead of the usual 11 ounces. This new package holds the right amount of mix for one loaf cake. Nice for the season's first strawberry short cake, sliced and topped with berries and whipped cream.

Home Gardener's Course Attracts Hundreds

An internationally known flower arranger on the Home Gardener's Short Course program at the University of Delaware Mar. 13 told the several hundred people attending the annual event that design principles are more important in flower arranging than too many rules.

Mrs. Herbert H. Greger, Rockville, Md., stressed harmony, form, direction, dominance, color, contrast, and lines in producing an effective flower arrangement.

Mrs. Bradley Morrah, president of the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc., in discussing the advantages of federated garden clubs, said one of the vital concerns of garden clubs today is the beautification of the future cross country highway system.

On the morning program, William Koch, Wilmington, said that 30 or 40 watt fluorescent daylight type bulbs 12 to 14 inches above plant crowns is best for growing African violets under lights. He pointed out that the violets should sit 14 to 16 hours daily on wet pebbles, and that the plants should be mist sprayed two or three times a day with warm water.

Dr. Jonathan Williams of the Delaware Orchid Society emphasized the increasing popularity of orchids as house plants. He suggested growing catyaleas and phalaenopsis in warm rooms, and cymbidiums and sypredium in cool rooms. George Jack, Winterthur Farms, Wilmington, pointed out that too large pots can rot house plants when the soil is extra wet. He demonstrated "pinching" plants to produce better shape and more branches.

Dr. C. W. Dunham, University of Delaware horticulturist, discussed cut-flower annuals that grow easily in Delaware. He mentioned zinnias, marigolds, cockscomb, straw flowers, and coreopsis. At the evening session, George

T. Lewis of Lewis Tree Surgeons Co., Media, Pa., advised making the environment for plants as natural as possible for best results. Robert F. Stevens, Delaware extension horticulturist, said that when transplanting trees, it is best to handle the trees by a burlap covered ball of earth around the roots. Avoid dropping or loosening earth around the roots, he cautioned.

Dr. Dunham said that care and common sense are necessary ingredients for fertilizing shrubs, and that shrubs are more often over-fertilized than under-fertilized. It is still not too late to treat trees and shrubs to control scale insects, Dr. L. P. Kelsey, entomologist at the University of Delaware, told the evening group. Emphasizing that prevention is easier than cure, he said to keep watch for insects to catch the pests before they can do damage.

A general purpose spray to control many insects and diseases on a wide range of ornamental plants was suggested by Dr. Donald F. Crossan, university plant pathologist. The mixture in one gallon of water he recommended was one tablespoon each of captan and zineb, and two tablespoons each of methoxychlor and malathion. Dr. Crossan suggested a single application of a phenyl mercury compound to control some of the more prevalent diseases of hardwood trees.

Session chairman were Raph P. Barwick, assistant New Castle county agricultural agent, morning; Mrs. Roland P. Trask, Claymont, afternoon; and E. P. Brasher, horticulture department chairman at the University of Delaware, evening.

spoon prepared mustard, 2 pounds frozen fish fillets (2 boxes-use unthawed).

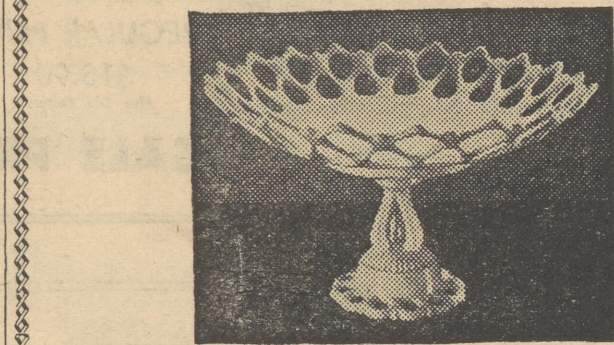
