

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

This is Chamberlain's third year at making such surveys in the northern country. Last year and the previous year, he made surveys, much of them on foot, and others by boat and planes, in the Goose, Payne, and Naim Bay areas of Labrador.

The two men were making final wind-up aerial surveys and preparing to close out the summer's activities in a few days, when the plane made its forced landing on Great Whale River, near the Hudson Bay.


