### Social Security Notes

Insurance benefit payments will be made to at least ten of the surviving families or relatives of migrant farm workers killed recently in the two major highway accidents in North Carolina and Colorado, Myron Milbouer, district manager of the Wilmington social security office declared.

The family of one victim will receive monthly payments of \$101.80. In all ten cases, lumpsum death payments will be made. These will total about \$1400, and range from \$102.60 to \$225, dependent on the amount of earnings shown on the deceased workers' social security accounts, Milbouer said.


In cases where the worker insured left dependent survivors, monthly payments may be made. In every case where eligibility is established, a lump-sum death payment may be paid.

The first of the two accidents occurred June 6, when a truck transporting migrant farm workers collided with a trailer truck near Fayetteville, N. C., Two days later, another truck carrying farm workers was hit by a train near Rocky Ford, Colo. In all, 32 migrants were killed.

Inaccurate records and lack of identification are delaying establishment of the social security insured status of the 22 other victims. Monthly benefits to dependent families or lump-sum payments to surviving relatives can be made only if the persons who died in the accidents had worked long enough under social security to be insured. In some cases, unreported wages may be found which will mean payments to more of the families.

Not all farm workers are covered by the social security law, but Milbouer declared, "these recent truck disasters, which left many families without beenfits, show how important it is that every farm worker who is covered gets proper social security credit for his earnings. We believe that there are many employers who do not yet fully understand their duty to report the wages they pay these workers. "We are trying to reach all farm workers themselves to explain why their social security records must be kept correctly. Those who do not show their social security cards to their employers and see to it that the tax is deducted from their earnings run the risk of losing social security benefits," Milbouer stated. Milbouer contrasted the mi-

grant worker tragedies with industrial disasters such as the re



cent mine accident in Bishop, Va. "All of the miners' surviving families got benefits, including many maximum payments of \$200 monthly," he stated.

Since January 1, 1955, some migrant farm workers have been covered by old-age and survivors insurance. Starting with 1957, migrant workers are covered by social security if they get cash wages of \$150 or more from one employer in any one year, or if they work for one employer on 20 or more days in the year for cash pay at other than piece rates.

A crew leader who supplies workers to a farmer and pays these workers is considered the employer for social security purposes unless the farmer and the crew leader have a written agreement making the farmer the employer. Unless there is such an agreement, the crew leader must deduct social security taxes from the worker's pay and report each workers' earnings once a year.

"These payments," said Milbouer, "depend first of all on whether the workers' earnings have been correctly reported by his employer. The Social Security Act is for the benefit of people who work for a living. The worker as well as his employer has a responsibility to see that his earnings get credited properly."
