Science Day Exhibit at Philadelphia College of Science and Pharmacy

Periodically the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in an effort to encourage high school students to choose a career in pharmacy or one of the allied health sciences, sponsors a Science Day Exhibit.

This year the Science Day exhibit will be held on Friday evening, Nov. 1, and Saturday afternoon, Nov. 2. The entire College including the many laboratories, the library, and the museum will be open for inspection. Students of the College will act as guides to escort visitors to the various demonstrations throughout the building. Members of the faculty will be available for consultation.

Students and faculty members will demonstrate the equipment and laboratory techniques used by the college in its several teaching fields. Emphasis will be placed on contrasting the differences in the scientific methods used today with those of the past. Many of the displays will permit interested visiting students to conduct experiments under proper supervision.

A special feature for young ladies will be a Seminar. "Opportunities for Women in Pharmacy and Science," conducted by the women students of the college. Two sound-color films of general interest to those investigating careers in pharmacy and science will be shown at regular intervals throughout the day.

Students who wish to visit the College may contact the Guidance Office for further particulars, but no tickets of admission are necessary.

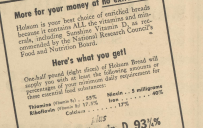

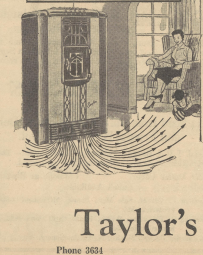
