Schiff, Hackett Star In Seaford Invitational Track Meet

By Keith S. Burgess Jimmy Schiff and Dwight Hackett led the Harrington High track team to an excellent fifth place showing in the highlight of the downstate track and field season at Seaford Wednesday afternoon. This event had more than 400 boys performing from 18 high schools, in 3 states. Our boys did remarkably well for such a

young inexperienced team. Hackett remained unbeaten in the miles this year by winning out over a large field of 38 in the fine time of 4:59.5. He now has the two fastest miles in the state this year to his credit.

Schiff remained undefeated in the dashes this year by winning both handily. His time of 23.8 in the 220 yard dash was a new Seaford invitational record breaking the old record of 24.2 set in 1956 by Bob Fooks of Wicomico High, Salisbury. He apparently had broken or tied the old reiord of 10.2 in the 100 yard dash when the first two stop watches clocked him in 10.1 and 10.2. However the third stop watch showed 10.5 and this brought the official average time up to a little more than the previous standard. Shaw. As for meat - prices are still high, but flounder, porgies, whiting, and halibut steak are all lower in price. So seafood will do much to help the family budget.



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




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
