#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q-I'm a World War Two veteran with a GI insurance policy. I also draw disability compensation of \$65 a month. Instead of sending in my insurance premium every month can I just have VA deduct it from my compensation?

A-Yes. So long as disability checks are large enough to cover premiums, you may apply to VA to have premiums taken out of monthly compensation checks.

Q-I have been taking a general science course under the GI Bill, with science teaching as my objective. This summer I'm going to work in an electronics equipment plant and have been told I can qualify for a teaching position in their training division later on, if I take more math and nuclear physics in my classes next year and the year after. would that be considered a change of course by VA?

A-No. As long as your final goal remains the same, a change in subjects would not be considered a change of course.







White Sauce, Ready to Mix A time saver during the hot elements in the meal getting pro-

Short cuts mean less time in the kitchen and more time for something else like sitting down. One good time saver for creamed. dishes is white sauce made up ahead of time. A white sauce is easy to make and store. It will keep for several weeks in the refrigerator.

Here is a recipe for one quart of dry mix, enough to make two quarts (eight cups) white sauce:

1 cup butter or margarine, cup sifted all-purpose flour, 2 cups nonfat dry milk, 2 teaspoons salt

Blend all ingredients together, using a pastry blender or an electric mixer at medium speed for five minutes.

Any amount of the mix may be made into sauce at one time. Use half a cup of the packed dry mix and one cup of hote water. This will yield about one cup of medium-thick white sauce.




