The City Council may have solved the problem of a dump site Monday when, at its regular August meeting, it authorized the purchase of land west of town for the purpose.

The Council recently took an option on the Townsend property on a dirt road leading from the Harrington-Greensboro road to the Harrington Blades Crossroads road. At Monday's meeting the group decided to buy the land, 25 or 30 acres of brush, at \$1000. The tract has been approved by the State Board of Health.

The city manager was authorized to have a site cleared for a dump as soon as possible. As soon as the property is ready, the dump site on U.S. 13 will be closed.
