

R. E. Baynard, Harrington, Brother Die Within Hours

A Phoenixville, Pa., woman found her husband dead in bed Thursday morning, July 31, when she tried to awaken him and tell him that his younger brother had just died in Harrington.

The younger brother, Robert E. Baynard, 61, of 321 Weiner Avenue, Harrington, got up as usual Thursday morning but died of a heart attack before his doctor arrived.

The older man, Wilbur Baynard, 68, of 239 1-2 Washington Street, Phoenixville, died of a heart attack in his sleep, about four hours before his wife tried to wake him.

The Harrington widow, the former Edna Coppage of Church Hill, Md., telephoned her sister-in-law in Pennsylvania to tell her about Robert's death.

It was this telephone call that led the Phoenixville woman, the former Pauline Cosden Larrimore, of Centerville, Md., to discover her husband's death.

The brothers were members of one of Queen Anne's County's oldest and most prominent families but were born at Farmington, sons of John Emmett and Laura Calloway Baynard. They were brothers of Ralph C. Baynard, a farmer near Centerville.

In addition to his wife and brother, Wilbur is survived by twin sons, Wilbur Emmett and Thomas Harry Baynard, of Phoenixville, both members of the Radnor Township Police Force; two daughters by a former marriage, Mrs. John A. Connell of Maple Shade, N. J., and Mrs. Ronald O. Gubelman of White House, N. J.; a stepdaughter at home, Miss Betty Jean Haymond, and three grandchildren.

Wilbur, a member of Phoenixville Baptist Church, worked for Deger Dairies before his retirement. He lived in Phoenixville since 1941.

His brother in Harrington was employed by Huber Baking Company until three years ago. He was a veteran of World War I, member of the VFW, and had been a warden and vestryman of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Harrington for many years. He was also a former member of the City Council.

Robert is survived, in addition to his wife and brother, by two children, Mrs. Edward Braun of Wilmington and Robert E. Baynard of St. Louis, an employee of Monsanto Chemical Company, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services for the Harrington brother were held Saturday morning in St. Stephen's Church with interment in Hollywood Cemetery, Harrington. Officiating were the Rev. John R. Symonds, rector of St. Stephen's, and the Rev. Joseph Hinks of Milford. Friends called Friday evening at the J. Millard Cooper Funeral Home, Harrington.

Funeral services for Wilbur Baynard were held Monday at 1 p. m. in Chesterfield Cemetery, Centerville. Friends called Sunday evening at the Ket Funeral Home, 416 South Main Street, Phoenixville.

Breeding Sent to State Hospital for Mental Test

Clayton Edward Breeding, 26, Thurs., July 31, was committed to the Spring Grove State Hospital, near Baltimore, for mental tests under an order signed by Judge J. Dewese Carter of the Second Judicial Circuit, at Denton.

Breeding is charged with first degree murder in the strangulation death of Mrs. Ruth Ellen Cannon, 19, on or about June 28 in the vicinity of Hickman, Md., on the Delaware-Maryland line.

Judge Carter Wednesday said he would sign the commitment order upon the return of the State's Attorney James A. Wise. The latter appeared in court Thursday and offered no objection to the order for Breeding's transfer to the state hospital.

The mental tests, to be conducted by a group of doctors from the State Department of Mental Hygiene, will determine if Breeding will stand trial for the murder of Mrs. Cannon. Should he be adjudged insane, it is expected that he will be sent to a mental institution.

Breeding was arrested July 21 at Newark, where he attempted to burglarize the VFW Home, following a three-week's manhunt. Held in the Talbot County jail since that time, he has refused to discuss the death of Mrs. Cannon.

It was "Breeding Day" in court with Clayton's father, Walter 51, appearing before Judge Carter who granted the elder Breeding a change of venue for his trial on a charge of assault with intent to rob Charles Arney, 65, on April 12.

Walter Breeding will stand trial in the Circuit Court of Kent County at Chestertown as the result of Judge Carter granting the plea of his attorney, Marvin H. Smith, that it would be impossible for the father to get a fair trial in Caroline County because of the publicity over Mrs. Cannon's death. The elder Breeding is accused of beating Arney, taking \$45 from his wallet and then leaving him badly injured in a drainage ditch.

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CITY TO PURCHASE ANOTHER DUMP SITE



The City Council may have solved the problem of a dump site Monday when, at its regular August meeting, it authorized the purchase of land west of town for the purpose.

The Council recently took an option on the Townsend property on a dirt road leading from the Harrington-Greenboro road to the Harrington Blades Crossroads road. At Monday's meeting the group decided to buy the land, 25 or 30 acres of brush, at \$1000. The tract has been approved by the State Board of Health.

The city manager was authorized to have a site cleared for a dump as soon as possible. As soon as the property is ready, the dump site on U. S. 13 will be closed.

The City retains another dump site, 15 1/2 acres, it bought from Herman Emory on the Blades Crossroads road for \$500. After protest from nearby residents, the site was put up for sale on sealed bids, with the right to reject any offer. One of \$650 was tendered Monday by Raymond Brown and rejected because the Council thought it was too low.

John Satterfield (no relation to the electrical contractor) appeared at Monday night's meeting to ask if the bidding was still open. He was told it had closed at 4 p.m.

The Council had a busy evening, as usual. Earl Sylvester, former mayor and former state senator, wanted to know who was responsible for cleaning out a ditch between his property and that of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on Delaware Avenue. He explained it was cleaned by the City when he was mayor but thought it was the State's responsibility. Last week, he pointed out, the ditch was flooded by his lawn. He added that "not a nickel had been spent on it."

City Manager Norris C. Adams said he had seen the State Highway Department and it would have diggers work on the ditch but he didn't know when. Sylvester interrupted to say he was losing ground right along.

T. Brinton Holloway, who attended the meeting as a member of the Legislative Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, said he didn't believe the watercourse was a tax ditch and that, in that case, it became the problem of the taxpayer or the City to clean it.

Sylvester followed by saying the City should see top officials of the State Highway Department. He also expressed the opinion that Municipal Aid funds could be used to clean the ditch since it took drainage from the streets which are maintained by the monies. The Council agreed to write the State Highway Department.

The Council voted to insert cards with the water bills giving the telephone number of the police department, Harrington, 5350, with instructions that, if the police could not be reached, the caller was to call the state police at Bridgeville 7600. The state police would then radio the Harrington police car. Cards with the information can also be picked up at the City Hall.

Councilman Alan Rutledge said Albright & Friel, Philadelphia engineers, had not reported, after a month's delay, on a request for information about a sewer survey in Harrington Manor. His request to the Council to be allowed to get in touch with the firm was approved.

The former Pilgrim Holiness Church, on Liberty Street, has the old-type toilets which flush when the lids are down. The lids have been sealed and water has been running continuously. It was suggested the water be cut off at the street. The church has been in a new building on Delaware Avenue for some time and the old building is unoccupied.

Other Business
Lester Emory, Second Avenue extended, complained that a high crown in the street was causing rainwater to flood his lawn. It was taken under advisement.

The Police Commission is to meet with representatives of a parking meter company to discuss purchase of new meters or parts. The devices have been in some ten years and many are in bad shape.

Mayor Hewitt Smith said the City desperately needed street signs. He thought the cost could come from the Municipal Aid Fund and appointed Councilman Clarence Collins and Rutledge to report at a meeting Tuesday evening, Sept. 2.


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Needlecraft News

Southern States Co-op Dedicates Warehouse

More than 3,000 Delmarva farmers enjoyed a fried chicken luncheon and heard an address of welcome by Delaware's Gov. J. Caleb Boggs as they attended the official dedication of Southern States Cooperative's new seed and farm supply warehouse at Seaford Saturday.

"We are proud that Southern States Cooperative's new warehouse is located in Seaford," Governor Boggs said. "The size of this structure, covering nearly two acres of land, shows that the planners were thinking in terms of future needs—10 to 15 years from now.

"This area is a growing and developing one, populated by great Americans who look ahead by building soundly for a happy future. This new Southern States warehouse will help contribute to the growth of the Shore area and help make this community a better place in which to live. This facility is evidence of the 35 years of sound experience of the organization in the past and evidence of great faith in the future which is so necessary for our American way of life to survive."

W. N. Stoneman of near Richmond, Va., president of Southern States Cooperative, presided over the formal program which was held in the warehouse building at 2 p. m.

Also on the program were Dr. Albin O. Kuhn, executive vice president of the University of Maryland; Southern States General Manager O. E. Zacharias, Jr., of Richmond, and W. T. Steele, Jr., and J. E. Givens, wholesale and community services directors, respectively, for the cooperative.

The invocation was given by Rev. W. O. Hackett, pastor of the St. John's Methodist Church in Seaford.

In his remarks General Manager Zacharias pointed out that "service is the chief motive of Southern States Cooperative. This warehouse is another facility in the Southern States system that has been built by farmers working together.

"By working together," he said, "we have built one of the largest cooperatives in the United States. By working together we are raising the quality standards of farm supplies. By working together we will get a greater return for farm products."

The program opened at 9:30 with a special breakfast for Delmarva news, radio, and TV representatives at the Seaford Inn. Also present were agricultural extension editors, magazine representatives, and cooperative information leaders from Washington.

Registration of the visitors took place at the loading dock in front of the building. Tours of the facility and exhibits started at 10 a. m. The chicken luncheon at 12:30 and the dedication program at 2 p. m. completed the day's program.

Prizes were awarded at the conclusion of the program by Jack McHugh, manager of the warehouse, and J. H. Buchholz of Richmond, director of SSC's Cooperative Seed and Farm Supply Division.

Music and entertainment were provided throughout the day by Mel Price and his Santa Fe Rangers from Easton, Md.

The new \$750,000 warehouse, which will serve as a distribution center to the cooperative's 50 Eastern Shore retail outlets, is located on a 13-acre site in the western part of Seaford. Officially opened for business in May, the facility will handle field and vegetable seeds and hybrid corn and over 2,000 miscellaneous farm supply items.

The one-story (except for the seed processing section) building of cream-colored brick contains 90,000 square feet of floor space and employs from 20 to 25 persons, depending on the seasonal demands for service.

The warehouse features the most modern of equipment, especially for the receiving of seed in bulk from Delmarva farmers and for cleaning and processing incoming seed.

The Seaford warehouse is the second major wholesale facility to be erected in Seaford by Southern States in the last four years. The feed mill, located along the Nanticoke River at the foot of Bradford Street, was opened in December 1954.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Is there a deadline date for starting school under the War Orphans Education program?

A—There is no deadline date. You may begin school at any time, so long as you are between 18 and 23 years of age. Under certain circumstances it's possible to begin before 18 and continue after 23.

Q—I have an idea for a mail order business which I could conduct from my place of residence. Can I get a GI home loan to buy a house in which I would plan also to conduct my own business?

A—Yes, provided the house will be used primarily for residential purposes and will not contain more than one business.

Q—I need to write the VA on a question about my GI insurance, but can't find my insurance number. What kind of information will help VA in identifying me and my policy?

A—Give the VA your full name, your branch of service, date of separation from service, your serial number, and the date and place of your birth. This information should enable VA to identify your policy.

Q—I am a disabled Korea veteran who never held a GI insurance policy. Now that the VA has declared my disability service-connected, I understand I can apply for a GI insurance policy. How soon do I have to apply?

A—You must make application within one year from the date VA found your disability service-connected.

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Delaware Food Market Report

When you are making up your food shopping list this week, remember to include peaches. Fresh peaches are just about your best fruit buy these days. The U.S. Department of Agriculture says supplies are abundant, prices reasonable, and lists peaches at the top of the August Plentiful Foods' List. Watermelons and fresh lemons are also in big supply as well as early summer potatoes, lemon products, summer vegetables and vegetable fats and oils—that's the food outlook for the month of August, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Peach production is king size this year—the biggest crop since 1947. It is estimated that 49½ million bushels will be harvested. This means we will have nearly ¼ more peaches on the market this year than we had last year, and more than ¼ above the 10 year average. All of this adds up to this fact — buy and serve peaches often. Don't forget to freeze, can and preserve peaches too. When buying, look for a background color of yellow or cream rather than green. Avoid hard or shriveled peaches.

Lower fruit and vegetable prices following a good growing season have made the overall price picture a little brighter. Meat, too, shows a general decline. Chicken, however, remains the outstanding buy. Turkeys are in good supply and prices are reasonable. Both grades of bacon can be found on special sales too. Lots of frankfurters, many hams, beef roast and some steaks will also be featured items during weekend sales.

Egg prices are up again. Grade A large eggs are up 2 to 4 cents on the dozen, but pullet eggs, beginning to be seen more in local markets, are steady in price, averaging 43 cents a dozen. Look for special sales on cheeses—this will help stretch the meat budget too.

J. Wesley Walls Files for Sheriff





Farm Field Day Set With New Features

"There is nothing new under the sun" may apply to some things but not to the University of Delaware's agricultural sub-station near Georgetown.

You can see for yourself Aug. 13 at the Farm Field Day when some 59 different experimental plots will be open for inspection. Everything from new blueberry varieties to chemical weed controls to irrigation experiments to new fungicide tests are on the program.

There will also be a few old things which are still considered in fashion—like a watermelon feed for example.

The Delaware Sheep and Wool Association will have an exhibit with the six breeds grown in Delaware on display. That will be: Suffolk, Shropshire, South-down, Dorset, Corriedale and Cheviots. Miss Bo Peep of 1958 and members of the association will be on hand to answer questions.

The market hog grading contest is another high point in the day's action. Ten market hogs will be graded according to government standards and contestants can try their hand up until 3 in the afternoon. Prizes will be awarded into two categories, one for those over 21 years old and one for those under 21.

Of the experimental plots, the pre-emergence weed control tests on corn and soybeans are impressive, particularly in view of this year's surplus weed crop.

Dr. Henry W. Indyk, agronomy department, is running the tests on several chemicals to find the most economical, safe and effective control.

He says the chemical treatments at the substation were made one day after the corn or soybeans were planted. The weeds which are the most troublesome to corn and soybeans are pigweed, lamb's quarters, ragweed and morning glory in the broadleaf group and crabgrass and nutgrass are the worst of the grasses.

Some chemicals or combination of chemicals have been very effective in controlling all these weeds Dr. Indyk says. You can see the plots and get details of application and amounts used from Dr. Indyk at the Farm Field Day.

For wives that come to the Field Day there will be a crafts exhibit and demonstrations by the Sussex Home Demonstration Clubs and County Crafts Committee.

Are Dwarf Trees The Thing For Home Gardens?

Increased knowledge and know how has made the dwarf fruit trees a better bet for home gardeners than they used to be, says George Vapaa, Kent county agricultural agent.

He says the home gardener must be willing to take care of the trees. This means spraying and a stake to hold the trees upright.

The gardener interested in planting dwarf apple trees should be sure he is getting true dwarfs, Mr. Vapaa warns. To be sure, ask for Malling IX or Clark Dwarf.

Trees which are semi-dwarfed will be too large to spray with hand equipment, he said.

To be sure you have dwarf trees, look for a large swelling of the tree trunk about 2 to 10 inches above ground level on the Malling IX and about 6 to 24 inches on the Clark Dwarf.

Dwarfs tend to sucker profusely and should not be allowed to branch at or below the swelling on the trunk.

Dwarfs can be spaced as close as 10 feet apart, he says, but mixed varieties will vary in size and make a rather ragged effect as far as looks are concerned if you plan a dwarf orchard in a regular pattern.

Both the Malling IX and Clark Dwarf are apple trees but dwarf trees are also available for pears and peaches.

Kent Pastures Tour Starts Aug. 14

Co-operating farmers enrolled in the Greener Pastures Program will be visited on Aug. 14, 15, and 18, says George Vapaa, Kent county agricultural agent. William Mitchell, extension agronomist at the University of Delaware, and the agent will offer fall seeding and fertilizer recommendations to farmers interested in establishing new pastures or hay crops.

Each farm is scored according to its actual performance as measured against its potential ability in forage production. When a farmer makes a score of excellent, he is graduated from the program and another farmer is enrolled to carry on the cycle. About 50 farmers are visited two or three times on a regular schedule during the year. The purpose of several visits is to provide timely-on-the-spot recommendations.

Farmers and others interested in the program are invited to go

along on all or part of the tour, since a good cross section of farm practices may be seen. The complete visiting time schedule is given below, but may be varied slightly if other calls are added:

Plans Complete for Milford-Frederica Dual Highway

The State Highway Department has announced the completion of plans for constructing a dual highway from Milford to Frederica, and for widening and improving the existing highway from Leipsic to Smyrna.

Bids on both of these projects are expected to be received on August 13 and the work will get underway soon after the contracts are awarded.

The Milford to Frederica project provides for the present highway to become the northbound lane of the divided highway with a new reinforced concrete highway, 24 feet wide, being constructed for the southbound lane.

The project will begin about 1,100 feet south of the Scarborough corner, just north of Milford where the Rehoboth traffic turns off of Route 113 for Rehoboth, and continue north to a point about 1,300 feet north of the point where the blacktop road to South Bowers and Thompsonville joins Route 113, the distance is 4.458 miles.

The new traffic lane will be separated from the present highway by a parkway, averaging 50 feet in width, and it will generally follow the route of the present highway, being on the west side of that highway.

Except for some drainage work at one point, no work is planned for the present highway and the specifications for the project provide that the new traffic lane must be completed and ready for use before this drainage work can be started on the present highway.

The improvement on the Leipsic to Smyrna highway will consist of extending the present 15-foot width to 22 feet by placing an additional 3½ feet on each side of the present highway.

The work will start at the north end of the Leipsic bridge and continue to the intersection with Route 13, at Clarke's Garage, just south of Smyrna, the distance being 5.864 miles.

The additions to be placed on each side of the existing highway will have a plant mix asphaltic concrete base, and the entire roadway will be surfaced with bank run asphaltic wearing course.

Included in the project will be the installation of some drainage and placing a super elevation on the curves.

With the completion of this improvement and the completion of widening the existing highway from Little Creek to the Kitts Hummock Road, an alternate route will be provided for traffic from the north to the south of Dover along Route 113.

Roses Taking One-Two From Black Spot And Mildew

Black Spot is thriving on Delaware's wet hot weather to the detriment of the state's rose bushes and the anguish of the owners of same, George Vapaa, county agricultural agent said.

The follow-up to the Black Spot is mildew which is doing a pretty thorough job with what the Black Spot isn't getting.

Black Spot can be controlled, he says, by applying a good fungicide such as Zineb at weekly intervals.

Black Spot looks like it sounds — black spot on the leaves. They sometime have a yellow halo around them. Infected leaves turn yellow and fall off.

Besides spraying, Mr. Vapaa says to strip off the infected leaves and leaves that have fallen on the ground and burn them to reduce the spread of the disease.

Mildew forms a white powdery mass on the young shoots, leaves and buds of roses. They look like mold patches and cause swelling and distortion of the young shoots.

Mildew can be controlled by Karathane. A mixture of Zineb with Karathane will solve both the disease problems.
