

Carvel Back as Governor; Boggs Wins as U. S. Senator

Gov. J. Caleb Boggs Wednesday had a voter endorsement to trade in his job as governor for that of U. S. Senator for six years.

His Republican running mates on the statewide ticket all lost.

To win the seat held for 12 years by Senator J. Allen Frear, Jr., Boggs relied on a massive 13,740 lead in rural New Castle County.

This majority more than balanced Frear's majorities of 5,307 in Wilmington, 3,029 in Kent County, and 2,447 in Sussex County, to give him a net state majority of 2,957.

The Democratic tide swept into office former Gov. Elbert N. Carvel by 6,884 votes over Republican John W. Rollins for governor, re-elected U. S. Rep. Harris B. McDowell, Jr., as Delaware's congressman by 1723 over the GOP candidate James T. McKinstry, and Mayor Eugene Lamot for lieutenant governor by 1,195 votes over his hard working rival, William V. Roth, Jr.

Other statewide races went the same Democratic way: Mrs. Belle Everett, treasurer, defeated James Somerville by 4,280 votes and Ernest E. Killen, auditor, beat William W. Shaw by 3,359 votes.

Biggest to most observers was McKinstry's strong run against McDowell. Largely unknown, McKinstry outpolled Nixon by nearly a thousand votes in Wilmington, racked up a 9,759-vote edge in rural New Castle County, then saw himself lose narrowly in Kent and Sussex Counties by only 1,019 and 437 respectively.

Carvel ran strongest of all the Democrats on the statewide ticket. He piled up a 10,724-vote bulge in Wilmington while cutting his opponent's edge in rural New Castle County to 6908. Carvel also carried Kent County by 921, and Sussex County by 2147.

Carvel became the first governor candidate in Delaware history to receive 100,000 votes. Even Senator Frear's all-time record statewide majority in 1954 was registered with only a little more than 82,000 votes. In 1958, Senator John J. Williams won re-election by more than 10,000 votes, but still polled only a total of 82,000 votes.

Roth lost out by his inability to capture the fancy of Kent and Sussex County voters. He came out of rural New Castle County with a lead of 10,366, but saw Lamot edge him out on the basis of majorities of 9,920 in Wilmington, 1,041 in Kent, and 833 in Sussex.

Somerville came out of New Castle County with an edge of only 8,064, too little to overcome Democratic majorities elsewhere.

The case was the same with Shaw, only worse. He carried rural New Castle by 8,697 but lost the other two counties and Wilmington.

Boggs, who refused to acknowledge his victory as long as one district remained uncounted, said when the final returns were in:

"Based on the unofficial figures, I wish to express my appreciation to the people of Delaware for the support they have given me in this election. I'm very grateful to everyone who had a part in making this possible, and to my good friend and distinguished opponent, Senator Frear, I appreciate the fine, vigorous campaign that he ran."

Governor Boggs' victory was his sixth major success in as many elections. He was elected to the U. S. House in 1946, 1948, and 1950, and governorship in 1952 and 1956. His only defeat for public office was for a minor Kent County post while a student at the University of Delaware.

Rollins conceded at about 12:30 a.m. with a telegram to Carvel: "Congratulations on your election as governor of Delaware. I wish you the best of success as the leader of our state and offer you my co-operation. I know you will have the support of the people of Delaware."

Carvel, in accepting his new post, said:

"With deep humility but with strong confidence in our future, I accept the trust that the people of Delaware have reposed in me. I thank the wonderful people of my beloved state for the confidence and support they have given me. I now call upon all Delawareans to unite with me in one common purpose—the building of a greater Delaware as a part of a greater and stronger United States."

Carvel, a towering 6-foot-6 in height, has been trying to get

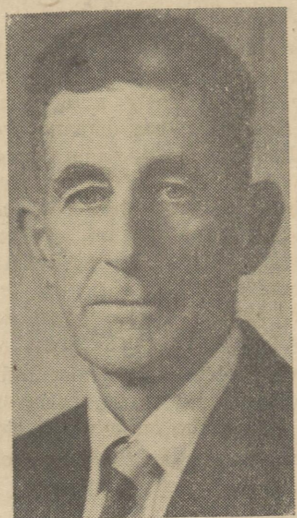
back into government since Boggs defeated him for a second term in the Eisenhower landslide of 1952. He was unsuccessful in a challenge to Senator John J. Williams in 1958.

Carvel, now 50, was the youngest lieutenant governor to be sent to Dover in the state's history when he was elected in 1944. Four years later he was governor.

DEMOCRATS TAKE 15 OF 16 OFFICES IN KENT, SUSSEX

Democrats swept like fire through Kent and Sussex Counties Tuesday losing only one out of 16 offices, and that one by five votes.

The sole Republican survivor of the political holocaust was Fred B. Carey, Sr., who nosed out John G. Tarburton, 4,398 to 4,393 for the First District Levy Court seat.

The heavy Democratic balloting followed a different pattern from the voting on the General Assembly, where Republicans took six House seats away from the Democrats.

Other Kent County results: Levy Court Commissioner, Second District: Walter J. Paskey (D) Harrington, 3,088; Clinton D. Robertson (R), Clayton, 1,998. Democrat lead 1,090.

Levy Court commissioner, Third District: Charles W. Bostick (D) Felton, 3,839; Charles N. Webb (R) of near Frederica, 3,450. Democrat lead 389.

Voting Machine Has Wrong Ballot

What to do about 163 votes cast on the wrong voting machine Tuesday in Kent County was still a question Wednesday.

Not until the 164th voter entered the machine at the Booker T. Washington School was it discovered that the wrong candidates were listed as running for state representative. This was about four hours after the polls opened.

Election officials then sealed off the machine and L. Wintfred Hughes, president of the Kent department of Elections, said he will not change anything on the machine until he is authorized to do so.

Two county contests were decided by majorities of less than 163 votes, leading to the possibility that the outcome will be questioned.

Charles F. Richards (R) defeated Austin P. Hufnal (D) by 147 votes, 1,588 to 1,441, for a House of Representative seat, and Fred (Continued on Page 8)

DEMOCRATS CONTINUE RULE IN THIS AREA

The local scene, in Tuesday's election, saw the Democrats hang up substantial majorities, in this traditionally Democratic area, with but one exception. However, the GOP was on the losing end in all cases here.

The national and state ticket, and the Kent County offices, did better here than elsewhere.

Leon E. Donovan, state representative for two terms, had no difficulty in winning the nod for Senator from the Fourth Senatorial District. This district comprises the Sixth and Ninth Representative Districts. His grand total was 1955, against 1190 for his Republican opponent, Francis Needles.

In the Ninth Representative District, Democrat George E. Ex-

ley, former city councilman, tallied 1347 votes, against 832 for his opponent, Jesse Trotta, in the race for representative. This is the Democratic stronghold in Kent County.

In the Sixth Representative District, which also includes part of Harrington, Dawson Shulties (D) garnered 631 votes, with 346 for Harry G. Farrow Sr. (R), in the race for representative.

The battle between Ernest E. Killen (D) and William W. Shaw (R), both Harrington residents, was a close one, as far as the Ninth District was concerned. In the First Election District of the Ninth, Killen registered 752 votes, against 694 for Shaw. In the Second of the Ninth, Killen tallied 437, compared with 293 for Shaw.

Democrats' House Margin Cut To 20-15; Senate Stays 11-6

Republicans made strong gains in the State House of Representatives, Tuesday, but the General Assembly continues under Democratic domination.

The GOP took six House seats from Democrats to reduce the Democrats margin to 20-to-15. Two Senate seats changed hands, but the Democrats retained the 11-to-6 majority they enjoyed during the 120th session.

The Republican gain in the House means that the Democrats will not have the power to pass two-thirds and three-fifth measures without Republican co-operation. It takes a three-fifth vote to override a veto, for example, and a two-thirds vote for a constitutional amendment.

The GOP, of course, also kept the power to block the three-

quarters vote needed to pass a bond issue, a weapon the Republicans used effectively in the recent session.

In a key New Castle County race, State Rep. Margaret R. Manning, Republican beat her longtime foe, Rep. F. Earl McGinnes, Jr., for the Fourth District Senate seat, formerly held by Senator Wilmer F. Williams, Republican.

Republicans took both the House seats vacated by this contest, Robert N. Downs beating Joseph R. Waling in McGinnes' Christiana Hundred and Andrew Casey defeating Joseph T. Walsh in Mrs. Manning's Mill Creek Hundred.

In the Sixth Senatorial District, Republican Senator Jacob A. Correll of Pender Hundred bowed to Democrat B. Walter Johnson.

This loss was counterbalanced for the Republicans by regaining Sussex County's Fourth District Senate seat they lost in 1956 to Senator Lemuel H. Hickman of Frankford. Here, William F. Wilgus beat Jacob E. Banks, Jr.

Revenge keyed the victory of John Annett over Democratic State Rep. Edgar T. English in the Second District of Sussex County. Two years ago, English was declared the winner by two votes.

Other House seats which the Republicans picked up were the Seventh of New Castle County, the Second and Fourth of Kent County, and the Eighth and Ninth of Sussex.

The 121st General Assembly will convene in Legislative Hall, Dover, at 1 p. m. Tues., Jan. 3.

Veteran Senate Majority Leader John E. Reilly, Sr., unopposed four years ago, made it seem as if he were unopposed again this year, flattening Republican David C. Boyer, Sr. by 9,440 votes in Wilmington's Second District. Reilly is expected to continue as majority leader next year.

Three other senators were up for re-election, two made it—Earl M. Tull (D-Seaford), and Allen J. Cook (D-Kenton), president pro tem for the last two years. Senator Correll failed.

In the House, 22 members were up for re-election—15 Democrats and seven Republicans. Eighteen made it. The four losers—all Democrats—were Edward Long Jr., and William W. Opydyke in Kent County, and English and Joseph B. Walls in Sussex.

There will be two Republican Snowdens in the General Assembly, holdover Senator James H. Snowden of Wilmington and newcomer Rep.-elect Robert Snowden of Georgetown.

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Wally Kinnan to Speak On "Almanacs To Satellites" at Dover

"Wally Kinnan the Weatherman" will be the speaker at this year's awards banquet at the Capital Grange Hall, Dover, Nov. 22, following the 52nd annual crops show and short course.

Outstanding farmers will be honored at the banquet. Mr. Kinnan, WRCV-TV, Channel 3 weatherman, will speak on "Almanacs To Satellites." He will leave plenty of time for questions so bring your weather problem with you.

Kinnan is one of a small group of licensed meteorologists on television today. His daily weather forecasts are based on a careful analysis of weather data and information compiled from special weather reporting sources available only to licensed meteorologists.

Kinnan's daily forecasts are made after detailed plotting of charts and weather maps showing wind, cloud formation, barometric readings, temperatures, and weather conditions throughout the United States and Canada. A weather expert for over 12 years, Kinnan came to WRCV and WRC-TV after six years as head of the meteorological department at WKY-TV, Oklahoma City. He first joined their staff in 1950 on a part-time basis while stationed at nearby Tinker Air Force Base as weather officer and member of the Tornado Research Project. He became full time weather forecaster at WKY following his discharge from the Air Force in 1953.

In 1951 Kinnan was stationed at Hickam Field, Hawaii, as an Air Force weather expert and Officer-In-Charge of Upper Air Analysis and Research.

Kinnan studied industrial engineering at Ohio State and used his musical talents to finance his education, playing in dance bands.

Kinnan also holds a degree in Meteorology from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and has done graduate work at the University of Chicago and the Air Force Technical School.

Wally Kinnan is also an accomplished musician. A former trumpet player with the great Jimmy Dorsey band, he has worked with such leading singers as Helen O'Connell and Bob Eberle and later played with the Charlie Barnett and Ben Bernie orchestra prior to World War II. During World War II, he was a B-17 pilot and spent 22 months in a German prisoner-of-war camp. Using his musical background, he organized a swing band to entertain fellow prisoners.

Wally received commendations for his efforts in behalf of prisoner-of-war morale. His band was probably the only American swing band in Hitler's Germany during the war.

Wally and his wife, Marjorie, have two teenage sons, Timothy and David. They make their home in Strafford, Pa.

Marvin Klair, Hockessin, will be toastmaster at the turkey banquet and the Governor-elect is expected to be on hand to present the awards to outstanding farmers.

Census Bureau to Conduct Sample Farm Survey in County

The 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will be conducted in this county during the next several weeks, it was announced by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will collect information on ownership and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, and livestock production and inventories. Information will be collected also on farm equipment, farm income, construction of new farm buildings, farm contracts, and farm operator debts. This survey will supplement information collected in the 1959 Census of Agriculture.

Farms in the county which will be covered in the 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture were selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section of all farms in the county. Information collected locally will be combined with that collected in other areas of the country to provide national estimates.

Local interviews for the 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will be conducted by Mrs. Helen H. Johnson.

U. of Del. Announces Fellowships Available For 1961-62

Fellowships in agriculture, the behavioral sciences, biological sciences, chemistry, engineering, history, art, early American culture and psychology are available at the University of Delaware for the 1961-62 academic year. Associate Dean James C. Kakavas announced Thursday.

Research fellowships in these areas carry stipends ranging from \$1800 to \$2400 covering 10 to 12 months' work.

Teaching assistantships, with stipends of \$1500 to \$2000 are available in arts and sciences, engineering and physical education. Additional benefits include the waiver of tuition and laboratory fees.

National Defense Act Fellowships are available in applied sciences, biological sciences, chemical engineering, chemistry and history.

National Science Foundation Co-operative graduate Fellowships are available in the natural sciences, engineering and mathematics.

Applications should be submitted directly to the chairman of the departments concerned before March 1, 1961. Catalogs and application blanks may be obtained by writing to the dean of the school of graduate studies, University of Delaware. Announcement of awards will be made by April 1, 1961.

U. of Del. Named Testing Center

The University of Delaware has been designated as a testing center for the 1961 nationwide administration of the National Teacher Examination in February. James E. Robinson, director of residence, announced Thursday.

College seniors preparing to teach and teachers applying for positions in school systems which encourage or require applicants to submit scores on the National Teacher Examinations along with their other credentials are eligible to take the tests.

The examinations are prepared and administered annually by the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N. J. The designation of the University of Delaware as a testing center for these examinations gives prospective teachers in this area an opportunity to compare their performance on the examination with approximately 10,000 candidates throughout the country who will be participating in the nationwide program on February 11, Mr. Robinson said.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the common examinations, which include tests in professional information, general culture, English expression, and nonverbal reasoning. In addition, each candidate may take one or two of the thirteen optional examinations which are designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter in the fields in which he may be assigned to teach.

Applications for the examinations and bulletins of information describing registration procedures and containing representa-

tive test questions may be obtained from Mr. Robinson, Brown Residence Hall, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, N. J. Prospective teachers planning to take the test should secure an application blank and a bulletin of information promptly, Mr. Robinson advised.

**Help-Your-Self
 Dairy Program
 Suggested**

"Want to up-grade your dairy operation? There is a help-yourself dairy program, so simple that dairymen often ignore it but it's been proved by practical use," George Vapaa, county agent says.

He lists five components for his help-yourself dairy improvement program: Keep herd records and use them; base your feeding program on high quality forage; breed cows to the best bull available; produce high quality milk and invest in your markets.

Dairymen can't afford to be without records. There are several types available, Mr. Vapaa says. You need records to cull unprofitable cows, as a basis for selecting good breeding stock and to feed the herd according to individual production.

**Seed "Bargains"
 May Bring In
 Weed Crop**

Seed "bargains" are usually expensive, and County Agent George Vapaa warns that cheap seed may contain weed seeds and be of poor quality.

Farmers who buy untested or non-recommended varieties of small grain seed may lose all or part of their investment in land, land preparation and fertilizer.

The agent believes, in the overall cost of producing a crop, seed is a minor item whether it is the cheapest or most expensive seed. It generally works out in the end that the cheapest seed is by far the most expensive. It is impossible to justify the loss in yield and quality that results from poor seed when compared with the few cents per acre more a farmer might pay for good seed of known quality and performance.

Will you look for a good buy? Or, more important, will you get good quality seed? Mr. Vapaa suggests you get the answers to these questions on the analysis tag attached to the seed you buy. Is it an unmix, adapted, recommended variety? Is it clean and free of weeds? Is the germination high enough to give a good stand? Two other things are important: look for Delaware certified seed, and buy from reputable sources.

Information on varieties of small grains recommended by the University of Delaware can be obtained from the agents office at the Dover Post Office or your local seed dealer.

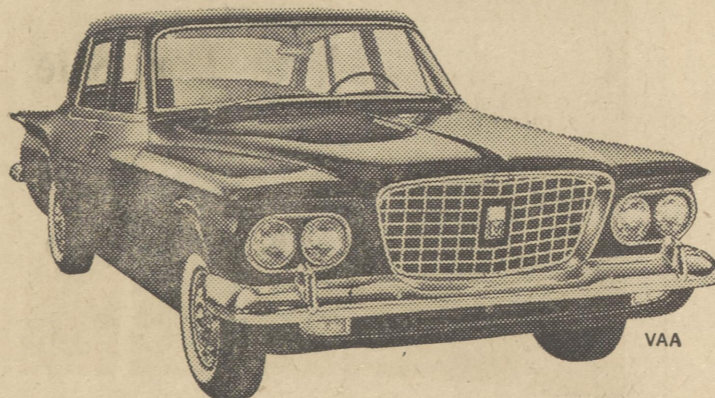

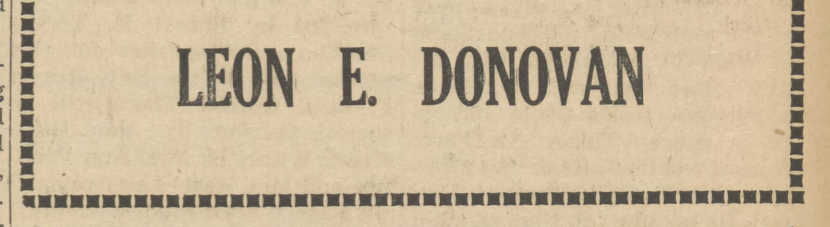

The findings of the recent Arden House Conference has provided us with the information needed to begin a program which will work toward the eradication of tuberculosis," he said.

The seals are being mailed by the Wilmington and Dover offices of the Delaware Tuberculosis and Health Society. The 1960 Christmas Seal Campaign is under the direction of G. Taggart Evans and Frank F. Pierson, Jr., executive secretary and assistant

Executive secretary, respectively, of the Society.

The Christmas Seal mailings are divided between 80,000 in New Castle County and 25,000 in Kent and Sussex Counties.

Splinter Groups Fizzle in Election

"The National States Rights Party of Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas fizzled Tuesday as it polled only 252 votes in Delaware.

The white supremacy party, which got on the state ballot by filing a petition containing the required 250 signatures, apparently got only two outside votes—assuming everyone who signed the

petition voted for Faubus.

Seat of the States Rights Party activities was the Milford area, where riots broke out four years ago as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court decision ordering desegregation of public schools with "Deliberate speed."

Other splinter parties on the ballot fared no better. The Prohibition Party, with Rutherford L. Decker as its presidential candidate, polled 183 votes. The Socialist Labor Party, which sought the election of Eric Hass, got 62 scattered votes.

Phone Equipment Installed at Felton

Installation of additional dial switching equipment in the Diamond State Telephone Company's Avenue central office serving Felton and vicinity has just been completed at a cost of \$9800.

The new equipment increases the operating capacity of the office to serve 135 more customers, Fred Wootten, plant wire chief, said today.

The telephone company is spending an additional \$30,000 this year for the construction of outside plant facilities, such as cable lines, in the area served by the Avenue central office, Wootten said.

Present plans call for the expenditure of \$35,000 more in 1961 for the construction of outside plant facilities, the plant wire chief stated.

"This type of expansion is required to keep pace with the demand for service in the Felton area," Wootten added. "At the present time the Avenue (Felton) central office is serving more than 910 telephones, compared with only 500 in the same area in 1950."

New Type Lima Bean Story Told to Club

How a mildew-resistant lima bean seed was achieved within 10 years was explained to Federalburg Rotarians Monday by Victor Boswell of Hyattsville.

He is in charge of vegetable research for the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Boswell said that the department accepted the challenge of an area processing plant to discover such a seed. About half of the limas produced in this country come from this section, he said, and mildew was a serious threat to the crop.

Using illustrated slides, the speaker showed how beans from throughout the world were studied, cross-bred, effected, tests run, and the required seed finally obtained. The work was done at Beltsville, Md.

Applicants Sought For Cup Award

Nominations for the Annual Josiah Marvel Cup Award will be received by the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce until December 15th, according to an announcement made recently by that organization. The award is available to any Delawarean regardless of race, creed, color or sex who has given outstanding service to the State, the community, society or to his fellow man.

The Award, which will be presented at the Annual Meeting of the Delaware State Chamber on January 26, 1961, is the eleventh such made.

The silver cup, appropriately inscribed, was originally presented to Josiah Marvel, the first President of the State Chamber of Commerce, who served during 1913-1914, in recognition of his service in reorganizing the Chamber of Commerce. It was given to the Chamber by Mr. Marvel's heirs for such use as the Chamber might decide.

P. S. duPont, President of the Delaware State Chamber of Commerce, has appointed a confidential committee on the Award representing each coun-

ty, which will name the recipient.

In selecting the committee, Mr. duPont emphasized that nominations may be made by any resident of Delaware and should be addressed to the Marvel Cup Award Committee, 1112-14 King Street, Wilmington 1, Delaware. Four copies of each submission should be prepared.

Mr. duPont also stated that the Chamber desires the people of Delaware to understand that this Award is a State-wide event and that anyone may nominate any citizen of Delaware to receive it, the only condition being that he or she is a resident of the State and has rendered outstanding service to the State, community or society.

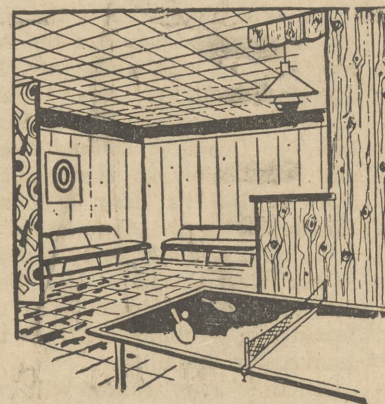

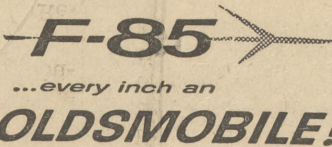
