

Go-Ahead Study Approved For Second Bridge Span

The Delaware Interstate Highway Division today gave the go-ahead signal for a feasibility study to build a second span parallel to and in the general area of the present Delaware Memorial Bridge.

The study, which was undertaken sometime ago, had been temporarily halted by J. H. Tyler McConnell, chairman-director of the Division, when Bank of Delaware officials, span trustees, argued that the report could not be financed from current bridge funds.

The matter was reviewed by bridge attorney James L. Latchum, with Lester Washburn, a New York bond expert, and it was finally agreed that since, in effect, the twin-bridges would represent one operation the study could properly be paid for from current funds.

Colonel Enoch Needles, of Howard, Needles, Tammen and Bergendoff, consulting engineering firm, attended today's session of the Interstate Highway Division, displaying an aerial map of the general area and arguing that at present the dual bridge is the only feasible solution to Delaware-New Jersey traffic problems.

Proponents of a Delaware-New Jersey span opposite the city of Wilmington or farther north near the Delaware line were informed by Colonel Needles that these points would be feasible so far as construction is concerned but would not be practical because of the current pattern of traffic in the two states.

He said New Jersey officials agree that all of the present and near-future highway construction is designed to be funneled toward the present bridge, and that a second span at that spot would be more practical.

Col. Needles pointed out that construction on the Delaware side is designed in the same manner, and therefore the second span would serve Delaware's purpose to better advantage.

It is expected that the new structure will be practically a duplicate of the present bridge in design and construction. While Col. Needles would make no estimates, it is generally believed construction costs would run from \$100 to \$120 million. It would be located approximately 100 yards north of the present structure.

"It appears very clear that the most feasible and economical arrangement will consist of a new structure alongside the present one, the two to serve as twin structures; the new, or north structure to carry one-way traffic from New Jersey to Delaware and the existing or south structure to carry one-way traffic in the reverse direction," Colonel Needles declared.

"The approaches to the twin structures will be amplified so that on the New Jersey side there will be a direct approach to a common interchange which will serve the New Jersey Turnpike, Route 40, Route 295, and existing 130, both to the northward and southward.

"The approaches on the Delaware side will provide connection with New Castle Avenue and Route 13, together with the future interchange in the vicinity of Newport, which will bring together Route 495, Route 95, and the proposed Delaware Turnpike to the westward. The proposed twin structures and the necessary highway approaches will constitute the new Delaware

On Designing Shakespeare

To a scenic designer, Shakespearean plays pose many problems, for the designer finds he is given a much freer means of expression than with most modern authors, according to Alan Billings, technical director for E 52 University Theatre upcoming production of "Twelfth Night," scheduled for Mitchell Hall at the University of Delaware on December 8, 9 and 10.

Billings points out that the Shakespearean play is written in a fluid style, that is, the scenes flow from one to another in almost continuous action. In Shakespeare's day the stage was built with an apron that projected the actor into the audience, making easily the flow from scene to scene by the mere change of a curtain or a small prop.

"When I first undertook to design the setting for a Shakespeare play, I found myself confronted with two basic problems," explains Billings. "First was to take a play written for sixteenth century stage and audience and adapt it to the modern stage and audience, which is accustomed to picture frame

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"Nursing As a Career" Day To Be Held Saturday

The Delaware League for Nursing is sponsoring its fourth "Career Day" for high school students interested in making a career in nursing. The program will be held Sat., Dec. 3, at the Pierre S. du Pont High School in Wilmington from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. The morning session will include an introduction to the various nursing school programs offered in Delaware. These selections by the Democratic majorities in each branch of the General Assembly were made at a joint dinner meeting with party leaders.

The Senate Democrats agreed on Senator Curtis W. Steen, Dagsboro, for majority leader, and Senator Allen J. Cook, Kenton, for majority whip.

On the House side, the Democrats agreed on Rep. Norman Eskridge, Seaford, for majority leader, and Rep. William J. Paskey, Jr., Felton, for majority whip.

The actual election of the legislative president pro tempore and speaker will take place after the general assembly convenes on Jan. 3. The Democrats, having majorities in both houses, can put their choices in office.

Senator Reilly, who is to become president pro tempore, was majority leader at the last session, when Senator Cook was president pro tempore. The official holding that position appoints the Senate committees and presides when the lieutenant governor is absent.

Carvel Appoints Commission On State Goals

Governor-elect Elbert N. Carvel announced Wednesday appointment of the Governor's Commission on State Goals for the study of Delaware's unmet needs. Former Superior Court Judge Daniel L. Herrmann will be chairman of the Commission which will hold its first meeting in Wilmington on the evening of Dec. 6.

In his campaign for the Governorship, Mr. Carvel pointed out the necessity for a bi-partisan commission of capable and distinguished citizens to review and define the important objectives for the betterment of all Delaware citizens.

Mr. Carvel stated: "Delaware is one of the fastest growing states in the Nation and it is urgent that we consider the many problems which are the responsibility of our State. After these goals and needs have been studied, we as a people should plan a logical solution for these problems so that the state may progress on an intelligent course.

"A complete study of Delaware's statewide needs in such fields as education, industry, health and welfare, labor, the law, zoning, urban and suburban development cannot be accomplished overnight. This is a crucial and long-range program that will determine what must be done rather than how it is to be done. The State can no longer live from week to week, month to month or even year to year. We must assure a sound future for present Delawareans and succeeding generations. We will construct a solid foundation through careful, intelligent planning by a group of outstanding leaders who can be of great assistance in making such a program possible.

"After long consideration, I have chosen a bi-partisan commission consisting of leaders in all fields directly related to the crucial needs of Delawareans. Co-ordinating with Judge Herrmann will be Mrs. Mildred Tunnell, Dr. John A. Perkins, Henry B. duPont, Ralph K. Gottshall, N. Maxson Terry, Otis H. Judge Herrmann has been active in civic, legislative and charitable programs since his admission to the Delaware Bar in 1940. After his release from military service as a Major in the U. S. Sudler J. Wilson, Georgetown, was crowned soybean king and John Anglin, Lewes, alfalfa king at the annual Crops Awards Banquet at the Capital Grange Hall in Dover, Nov. 22.

William L. Cross, Middletown, was also honored as an outstanding example of a corn producer who does a fine all-around job of production, handling and marketing, according to Dean George M. Worrirow, school of agriculture, University of Delaware, who did the crowning.

Anglin produced 7 tons of alfalfa per acre on his contest plot to win the alfalfa crown. This is nearly half a ton more than last year's winner, George Simpson, Houston. Use of an artificial drier enabled Anglin to produce the best quality hay also. The judges rated his hay first in color, leafiness and smell.

Mr. Wilson won the soybean crown with 51 bushels per acre on his five-acre plot.

The county winners in the soybean contest were Paul McCommons, Bear, New Castle County winner with 47.9 bushels and John F. Wilson, Harrington, Kent County, 45.9 bushels.

County alfalfa winners were James Mitchell, Smyrna, Kent County winner with 5.5 tons of alfalfa per acre, and Zettler Brothers, Glasgow, New Castle County winners with 6 tons per acre.

Two 4-H'ers, Robert Stafford, Newark, and Marlene Korschak, Dover, were awarded scholarships of their choice to 4-H Short Course or 4-H Camp for winning the seed judging contest held Nov. 21.

The scholarships are sponsored by the Delaware Crop Improvement Association which, with the cooperation of the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Delaware, also sponsors the Crops Show, Short Course and Awards Banquet.

The Delaware Crop Improvement Association elected a new president, Carlton Blendt Jr., Townsend, and a vice president for each county. They are Francis Winkler, Harrington, Kent County; David H. Woodward, Middletown, New Castle County and Allison Davis, Greenwood, Sussex County.

The speaker at the annual banquet was Wally Kinnan, weatherman on WRCV-TV Philadelphia. He explained the complexities of weather forecasting and the recent advances made possible by earth satellites.

settings that leave little to the imagination.

"Twelfth Night" is anything but a realistic play, it is not believable and was not meant to be believed, but rather accepted and enjoyed. This is a blessing to the designer, who, since the setting also need not be realistic, is free to use his imagination. The second problem," according to the director, "is to preserve the fluid movement of continuous change of scene and locale, and I find that I am continually returning to the basic idea upon which Shakespeare's own Globe Theatre was built."

Billings explains that he is not trying to reproduce a historically accurate or even realistic setting for "Twelfth Night," but rather is attempting to catch the mood of the play and its scenes and to communicate this through color, line and mass.

"Fortunately I have at my disposal a tool no sixteenth century designer had—modern stage lighting," said Billings. "It is a constant amazement to me that a play written over 300 years ago lends itself so well to the most modern and strongest technical means of communication in theatre. Stage lighting can not only change the mood and locale on stage but also produce a smooth transition from one to the other."

Speaking as a designer, Billings is thankful that Shakespeare offers a great freedom of expres-

sion because he does not set limits of imagination.

"Although this causes problems and headaches to those of us used to following modern authors' set outlines, designing without the challenges of a Shakespeare."

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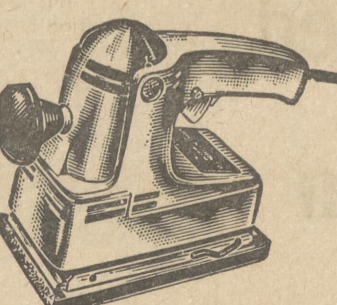
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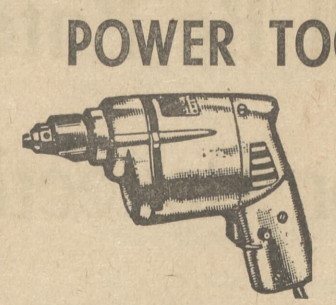
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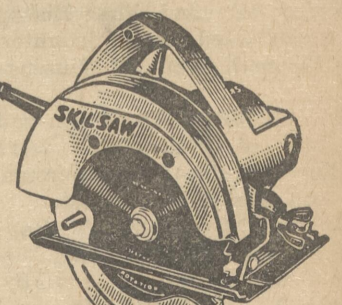
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
