Fish & Game News

The Board of Game and Fish Commissioners urges all dog owners to license their dogs as soon as possible. 1961 dog licenses may be purchased at most sporting goods stores, justice of peace offices and the Dover office of the Game and Fish Commission.

The Commission stresses the importance of securely attaching the 1961 red aluminum tag to the dog's collar. It is almost impossible to identify a lost, strayed or stolen dog that is not wearing a current license tag.

A dog license costing \$1 should be obtained for all dogs over four months of age. North of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, a current rabies inoculation is mandatory. Dog owners should consult their immunization certificate for the effective period of the last rabies shot received by their dog. Question 7 of the certificate is: "On the basis of this certificate, annual dog license may be issued for the _____ (date) If this date is before December 31, 1961, your dog will need a rabies vaccination before it will be eligible for licensing in 1961. Rabies inoculation may be secured from any veterinarian or at any of the clinics. The New Castle County health unit will schedule rabies clinic during February and March as they have done in previous years. Dates and locations will be published as soon as available.

The following regulations affect all dog owners outside the City of Wilmington: 1) Purchase dog license (costing \$1) immediately. Dog licenses for 1961 expired Dec. 31, 1960. 2) All dogs over four months of age must be licensed. 3) North of the Chesapeake & Delaware Canal all dogs must be currently inoculated for rabies before a license will be issued. 4) Attach 1961 red aluminum dog tag securely to collar. 5) It is just as important for confined animals to wear identification tags as those that may go afield. Easy identification will protect you and your dog and also make the work of the enforcement staff more effective.

Social Security Notes

There is good news for many retired persons, and for the widows and children of working people who have died. Because of 1960 amendments to the Social Security Act, less work under social security is now required for benefits to be payable to a worker, or to his surviving family. According to Edward F. Sullivan, Manager of the Dover, Delaware Social Security Office, approximately one-third less credit for work under social security is now needed. Under the old law for instance, a person reaching retirement age, or dying in 1960, would have needed credit for 13 or 19 calendar quarters of work under social security. Because of the amendments, however, credit for only 12 such quarters (about 3 years) is now needed.

Payments under the new law can be made beginning with the month October. Sullivan suggests that anyone whose application for old-age or survivors insurance benefits has been denied because of insufficient work under social security, recontact his office at 230 West Lookerman St., Dover. It will then be possible to check the worker's social security account to see if benefits are payable under the new law.
