

The burned building was an assembly shop where tanks were attached to trucks and trucks were repaired.

Coursey was pulled from under the trucks with his clothes in flames by Harvey Ivins, 22, Harrington. Ivins heard Coursey shout, pulled him from under the truck where flames were spreading rapidly, and wrapped a coat around him to snuff out the fire. The shop was a two-section building and one side is gutted -a total loss according to Favinger. This alone will cost \$25,000, he said.

He estimates another \$50,000 for two trucks destroyed in the fire and equipment, parts, and tools lost.

The owners, Joseph J. Callis, and George A. Thompson said the damage could go as high as by insurance.

For example, if a Dover customer wanted to reach OLympia 6-2631 in Wilmington, he would dial the special code "1", then dial O, L, 6, 2, 6, 3 and 1.





any net earnings figure; this saves the trouble of the actual computation. Even where the optional method is not used, the net earnings figure, on which the self-employment tax is paid, is not always the same as the farmer's net income. Certain adjustments often must be made to net income to determine net earnings. These adjustments are explained in detail in the Farmer's Tax Guide.

Are participants in a crop-sharing arangement liable for this tax?

The share farmer is considered to be a self-employed person and is subject to the tax. The landlord is subject to the tax if the arrangement provides that he will materially participate in the production, or management of production, of the crops and this participation actually takes place.





Mr. Rosa also anounced that 60 certificates of competency, were issued in 1961, on behalf of lowbidding small firms for government contracts valued at \$14.8 million. The firms were located in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

"SBA certificates of competency, in effect, offer an appeal procedure for the low-bidding small firm whose bid has been rejected by the purchasing office due to a financial or production question," Mr. Rosa explained. When a certificate is issued by the agency, under law the contracting officer must accept it as

conclusive. Nationally, 234 certificates were issued by SBA in 1961 covering government contracts valued at \$77.7 million. This compares with 151 issued in 1960 for contracts valued at \$19.6 million.

Mr. Rosa said, "SBA's increased procurement activities are indicative of still greater achievements for small business in government contracting during 1962."
