S. B. A. Notes
Edward N. Rosa, regional director of the Small Business Administration, announced last week that small firms in the States of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware received \$144.9 million in government contracts during 1961 under the SBA's co-operative set-aside program—representing a 17 percent increase over contracts awarded small firms in 1960.

During the 12-month period ending December 1961, Mr. Rosa said, small businesses in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware received 4712 prime government contracts valued at \$144,942,047.00. The represents an increase over the same 12-month period of 1960, when 3397 prime contracts valued at \$124,253,707 were awarded small firms as a result of SBA's co-operative set-aside program.

On a national basis, SBA was responsible for the award of \$45,856 million in government contracts last year valued at \$1.5 billion to small firms from military and civilian purchasing agencies of the government. In 1960, 25,074 prime contracts valued at \$955 million went to small firms as a result of the Agency's set-aside program.

SBA procurement representatives stationed at major purchasing installations throughout the country screen proposed government purchases and in co-operation with military and civilian purchasing officials, earmark certain proposed purchases for exclusive bid by small business firms.

Mr. Rosa also announced that 60 certificates of competency, were issued in 1961, on behalf of low-bidding small firms for government contracts valued at \$14.8 million. The firms were located in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

"SBA certificates of competency, in effect, offer an appeal procedure for the low-bidding small firm whose bid has been rejected by the purchasing office due to a financial or production question," Mr. Rosa explained. When a certificate is issued by the agency, under law the contracting officer must accept it as conclusive.

Nationally, 234 certificates were issued by SBA in 1961 covering government contracts valued at \$77.7 million. This compares with 151 issued in 1960 for contracts valued at \$19.6 million.

Mr. Rosa said, "SBA's increased procurement activities are indicative of still greater achievements for small business in government contracting during 1962."

Other SBA programs of assistance for small businesses include:

- SBA co-sponsored management courses.
- Loans for small business expansion, and new small business enterprises.
- Licensing of small business investment companies
- Loans for state and local development companies.
- Management and technical

Despite the weather we've been having, signs of spring are beginning to appear in local markets.

Little red-skinned new potatoes and fresh red strawberries offer winter-weary appetites a welcome change with a taste of spring. More rhubarb and green peas in their pods are available this week and quality has improved. Spain and Chile continue to fly in melons and other fruits to give a further touch of spring to our grocery shelves. Fresh pineapple is a bit cheaper this week but peaches and plums continue to be on the luxury list as honeydew melons are.

The salad bowl will cost a bit less this weekend—lettuce is down a penny of so but there is a wide variation in quality. Carton tomatoes are selling as low as 19 cents, however, the average price is 25 cents a carton. Most of these tomatoes are small in size and definitely on the green side.
