

### Co-ordination of Schools and Mental Health Agencies Poor, Survey Told

A lack of coordination between schools and the state's mental institutions for children was criticized Tuesday.

Walter L. Kabis, state supervisor of special schools and classes for trainable and institutional programs, told the hearing in Dover in the survey of the state's mental health facilities that children are sent home from Governor Bacon Health Center after treatment without their schools being notified or given a detailed report.

Kabis also criticized a situation in which school districts must "bootleg" guidance counselors. He called them the "first line of defense against mental illness," adding, "guidance counselors do not exist as far as the budget for unit allocations is concerned."

Kabis, for 10 years director of education and recreation at the Governor Bacon Health Center, testified before the American Psychiatric Association survey team at hearings in Dover.

In other testimony Tuesday, —Charles R. Harris, executive secretary of the Delaware State Education Association, decried a lack of coordination and communications among state mental health agencies, the schools and the Department of Public Instruction.

—E. A. Rutledge, a guidance counselor in the Harrington Special School District, criticized the effectiveness of the Governor

Bacon Health Center whose staffs are "under-staffed and overworked."

—Dr. Donald L. Howie, a neurologist at Milford Memorial Hospital, recommended that internists with neurological or endocrinological training supervise state mental hospitals instead of psychiatrists.

—Mrs. Ruth Tyndall, Sussex County coordinator of child development and guidance for the State Department of Public Instruction, said Delaware should have a law requiring parents to secure psychiatric help when needed for their children.

She said the state needs 24 child psychologists instead of the nine now employed—four by the state department and five on part time by school districts.

Rutledge testified that there is a six-month waiting list at the Hospital for the Mentally Retarded, Stockley, and charged that once a patient is admitted he doesn't get adequate treatment. He also described Governor Bacon as difficult to get into.

Dr. Howie urged that persons entering mental institutions be allowed to leave when they desire—if their commitment was voluntary.

He said residency programs in state hospitals "are too frequently poorly managed, give minimum instruction, and are introduced principally to obtain inexpensive help."

"State hospitals should get out of the grocery, real estate, and laundry business for dependents of their staffs," he said.

The Harrington Special School District Building Commission met in the school office Monday evening with J. Richard Kohler, architect, of the Buchart Associates. Kohler discussed the alternate on the construction contract which the commission had accepted for the removal of the present agriculture and industrial arts shop.

The construction company had decided to replace this building rather than try to remove it. The new building will be of the same size as the present one, will be divided into two large classrooms with each section containing a large overhead door. Steel-panel windows will be used, and a flat steel-beamed roof in place of the shingled shop roof.

During the next school year this building will be used for industrial arts and agricultural classes. However, in the industrial arts department, mechanical drawing will be taught in all classes rather than any tool work.

The commission approved a change order for the addition of a water cooler in the main lobby of Pierre S. DuPont School and minor changes in the cafeteria counter of the same school.

The commission agreed the present Pierre S. DuPont School will be sold at public auction shortly after the close of school in June. Details of the sale were tabled until a later meeting.

The commission met in a special meeting Tuesday and accepted bids for school furniture and library furniture and shelving for the Pierre S. DuPont School, and for drafting tables for the new Harrington High School.

The April school board meeting was held Monday in lieu of the regularly scheduled day of April 9. The following actions were taken by the board:

Purchase of a blanket school bond for all employees as recommended by the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, to be purchased through the B. Norman Hopkins Insurance Agency, was approved.

The superintendent was authorized by the board to prepare a list of persons delinquent in school taxes for two years, and to prepare letters notifying such persons that if the tax was not paid said lists would be published and tax suits instituted against them for collection of the tax.

Resignations from the faculty were accepted from Mrs. Nancy Fleetwood, who is moving to the northern part of the state; Patrick Emigh, who is returning to school for a master's degree, and from Mrs. Imogene Kramedas.

The superintendent reported that negotiations were underway to fill all faculty vacancies and it is believed that such positions will be entirely filled by the next board meeting.

Mrs. Musetta Cox and William W. Shaw were appointed as judges for the school board election to be held May 12, with Mrs. Louise R. Burgess, Harold McDonald, J. H. Bedford, and Mrs. Margaret B. Homewood as clerks of election.

The board gave the superintendent authority to continue negotiations with the University of Delaware with a possibility of conducting an in-service training program in reading at the Harrington School for the 1962-63 school year.

Chemical Sterilants May Wipe Out Insect Problems

U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists have developed certain chemicals that will prevent insect reproduction. Dr. Dale F. Bray, University of Delaware entomologist, reports these chemicals induce sterility in houseflies, mosquitoes, stable flies and other bothersome insects.

By treating insects in laboratory-reared test colonies with small quantities of sterilizing chemicals, the scientists were able to halt normal reproduction.

In a preliminary field test, USDA entomologists nearly wiped out the population of houseflies on a small uninhabited island off the Florida coast. A bait containing a chemical sterilant was applied once a week for five weeks on a heavily infested refuse dump. At the end of the fifth week, only a few flies could be found and 99 percent of those captured were sterile.

Dr. Bray feels that chemical sterilization may be a very effective way to control large insect infestations. Also chemical sterilants could be applied to large areas more economically than present control methods.

Emergency Power Used in Milking

It's getting close to the time of year when electrical power failures are more frequent, says George Vapaa, Kent County agent. Power failures are a serious problem, particularly in a dairy barn. Emergency precautions should be taken now to provide power for the milking machine.

Dairymen can get emergency power from the farm tractor, pick-up truck, or automobile, simply by replacing the plug from the intake manifold, located directly under the carburetor, with a pipe nipple 1/8 of an inch inside diameter. A flexible hose can then be connected to the fitting on the intake manifold and to the nearest stall cock in the vacuum line system.

The agent warns of the necessity to keep the vacuum sanitary trap in the line and to be sure the relief valve is working properly.

Another suggestion, adds Mr. Vapaa, is to notify the power company. They do not always know when the power has failed. They will give immediate service whenever possible.

Agent Vapaa concludes that tired, aching hands and arms can be saved by providing now for future power failures.

More Feed Grain Acres, Lower Yield

Farmers will produce about as much feed grain this year as they did in 1961, according to W. T. McAllister, extension farm management specialist with the University of Delaware. They will probably plant more acres but average yields may be lower, he says.

Fewer farmers across the country are signing up for the feed grain program. And they report they intend to plant more corn and grain sorghum than they planted last year.

Reports from farmers to the U. S. Department of Agriculture in March indicated farmers intended to plant 69 million acres of corn. This is three per cent more than was planted last year. Also, they will plant 15 million acres of grain sorghum, two per cent more than 1961.

Average yields per acre may be less this year, according to McAllister. All of the major feed grain crops produced exceptionally high yields in 1961. Weather conditions may be as good as they were last year but the odds are against it, he says.

The USDA will continue to dominate the corn market. As of mid-March, the CCC still needed to sell enough grain to raise 150 million dollars to cover expenses for the 1961 feed grain program. It can sell at least another 600 million to meet the cost of the 1962 program.

McAllister indicates the governments isn't going to run out of corn very soon. On March 23, the CCC owned 1,458 million bushels of feed grain and farmers had placed another 700 million under storage.

2, 4-D Controls Garlic in Your Lawn

Garlic seasoning may add interest to your dinner table, but garlic plants are a nuisance in your lawn.

County agent George Vapaa recommends applying 2,4-D now when the clumps are making rapid growth and most easily killed.

A single application of spray will give only partial control. Even if it appears that all garlic plants have been killed with the first spraying, the many small plants that develop from underground bulbets will reinfest the lawn. Annual treatment in the spring and fall will be required for 2 to 4 years to obtain satisfactory control.

The ester form of 2,4-D provides effective control. But this form of 2,4-D can cause injury to ornamentals just from the drifting of the spray, cautions agent Vapaa.

Caution must be used, therefore, when spraying the chemical on the lawn. A sprayer with a coarse nozzle is best because it reduces the danger of spray drifting onto other plants. But by using a stick or bar type applicator, the danger from the spray drifting to ornamentals will be eliminated and satisfactory control of the garlic plant will be obtained.

Delaware Food Market Report

The warm spring weather of the past few days brings the first locally grown vegetables of the year to market. Among those you will find available are greens—spinach, mustard greens, dandelion and turnip tops. Added to these greens are asparagus, leeks, radishes and scallions. Of all these vegetables asparagus is the major item. The season for the vegetable will be at its height in early May and extend until around the second week in June.

When buying asparagus check

on its appearance to make sure of its quality. Shop for fresh, firm, bright green spears with tightly closed tops. Also, seek spears of uniform size so that all stalks will require the same cooking time. Refrigerate asparagus in a plastic bag or in the vegetable crisper soon after you have it home. Be sure to use it within a day or so.

Due to the cold snap of last week in some of the Southern growing areas, vegetable shipments may be affected so check quality carefully before buying. Vegetables expected to be in abundance are: asparagus, artichokes, Iceberg lettuce, broccoli, corn, and cartoned tomatoes. Cucumbers, green peppers, beets and mushrooms are all up in price a penny or so.

Oranges, limes and grapefruit head the list of good buys at the fruit counter. Honeydew melons continue to be reasonable in price as do avocados, pineapples and coconuts. More watermelons are available and prices are beginning to edge down. However, prices are edging up on red grapes. Delicious apples and pears.

Meat supplies show little change this week. There continues to be plenty of beef and pork available. Broilers and frozen turkeys continue to remain bargain meats. This weekend check your favorite meat market for special on beef, particularly roasts.

Grade A and Grade B large eggs are up in price a penny or two per dozen. The medium sizes are unchanged. When shopping this week be sure to check prices and compare as prices change often on eggs.

Dairy products are good buys and expect to find specials on many items in this department as production continues to climb to its seasonal spring peak.

One Cow As Good As Two

Delaware Dairy Herd Improvement Association records for 1961 show that many dairymen are milking two cows when one high producing cow could provide the same income.

George Vapaa, Kent County agent says DHIA averages across the country show that 10 Holstein cows each producing 12,000 pounds of milk per year make as much profit as 20 Holsteins averaging only 7,000 pounds. By the same comparison, 10 Guernsey cows producing 9,000 pounds of milk per year are equal to 22 Guernseys averaging only 5,000 pounds. Other breeds showed similar results.

The agent points out that 10 high-producing cows yields about 20,000 pounds less milk per year than 20 low-producing cows.

Cows with a low milk average do not make enough money over feed costs to pay for labor, interest on investment, and taxes, says Vapaa.

Crops Conference Planned at Hershey, Pa.

Delaware farmers will have an opportunity to see the Nation's largest forage crops demonstration at the first National Grassland Field Days and Conference. The Conference will be August 15 through 17 on the 10,000 acre Milton Hershey Farms, Hershey, Pa., located 15 miles East of Harrisburg, according to George Vapaa, Kent County agent.

Special seedings made last August will demonstrate performance of different species and varieties of grasses and legumes. More than fifty acres of alfalfa and grass will be harvested. An estimated \$1 million in grassland machinery will be in operation or on display.

Forage crop experts, including a farmer panel drawn from a wide area, will address educational conferences. Educational exhibits, most of them from Land-Grant universities and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will fill an entire building.

Mr. Vapaa says added events include the first North American Hay Show. Entries are expected from at least half of the states and Canada. Entry blanks may be had by writing to Dr. John

E. Baylor, 316 Tyson Building, University Park, Pa. Air and bus tours from the grounds to other points of interest will be available. Surrounding towns and cities will help provide housing facilities.

Flying Insects May Not Be Winged Termites

Property owners frequently become alarmed at the sight of flying insects in or around their homes. Their first thought is that these are "winged" termites. However, George Vapaa, Kent County agent points out these insects are just as likely to be the winged forms of one of the common species of ants that invade houses.

These insects are troublesome and annoying in many ways but, with the exception of the carpenter ant, do not damage wood. Mr. Vapaa says one way to tell whether the winged insects you see are termites or merely flying ants is by checking their physical characteristics. The winged termites has wings that extend far beyond the end of its body.

All four wings are of equal length. The wings of the ant, however, extend only slightly beyond the end of the body. The fore wings are larger than the hind wings.

According to the agent, "winged" termites leave their ground nests in the spring and fall to start new colonies. If you should find a colony of these termites, apply a chemical to the soil to make a poisoned soil barrier between their nest and the wood. More complete information on the control of these insects may be obtained by contacting the county agent at the Dover post-office building, telephone 736-1448.

er's eligibility. This holds true, Mr. Fields explained, even though the veteran may have contracted to purchase a home and may have applied to the lender for a GI loan before his entitlement expired.
