Delaware Food Market Report
Food stores continue to feature meats and chicken for outdoor grilling this weekend with fryers, steaks, ground beef, bologna and frankfurters all on special sale in many places. Many stores are also featuring charcoal and portable grills at prices to appeal to the outdoor cook.

In general, however, meat prices are fairly steady. Beef production is running a little less than a year ago and this situation is expected to continue for the next several weeks. Pork has been in fairly liberal supply and pork cuts are often featured in the markets. Veal and lamb usually in a seasonal price decline, have remained unchanged. The broiler market is up seasonally although receipts will not match those of a year ago. Frozen turkeys from cold storage stocks continue low priced.

Don't overlook fish for outdoor cookery. Fishing operations are now in high gear. Local markets have good supplies of bluefish, porgies, flounder, haddock,
