

CARVEL REPORTS PRIDE, CONFIDENCE

Next year "promises to be a year of great accomplishment, progress, and growth of Delaware," Gov. Elbert N. Carvel said Tuesday in a statement.

Reviewing with pride the accomplishments of 1962, Carvel reported to the people that "we have made progress in all fields of endeavor" and that Delawareans can face 1963 "with a genuine feeling of confidence."

He also expressed confidence that the 122nd general assembly which convenes Jan. 1 can resolve problems "by the placing of the public good ahead of all differences — politics and otherwise."

The governor said that this year Delaware's economic picture "brightened considerably" and that "school and highway construction have surged forward, industrial expansion has continued and there has been a significant advance in retail sales."

Carvel cited as evidence of the industrial expansion a new \$2 million plant of Leeds Truwear at Clayton, the first project under the state's new program of industrial financing through state-backed bonds. The plant is expected to open in March and will employ about 800 persons.

Carvel also mentioned the multi-million dollar General Foods Corp. plant scheduled to be put under construction at Dover next year, and a major electrical appliance manufacturing plant near Christiansa, planned by the Ronson Corp.

Establishment of a new state planning office was among the key accomplishments of 1962.

Much of his message was devoted to the planning office, headed by John A. Bivens, Jr., indicating the importance the governor gives to the agency. Carvel said the office will, during 1963, "provide plans for improvement and more efficient utilization of state properties and open space and recreational land as part of an accelerated program for the orderly development" of Delaware.

He also noted that the Planning Office is exploring the possibilities of a data system for Delaware which he said could "make information immediately available to state officials and other interested parties."

The office, Carvel said, "is concerned with developing and recommending plans and policies for the future of our state, while at the same time protecting our rich heritage."

"In its six months of existence, the Planning Office has already provided services to the citizens of Delaware, to various state agencies, and to the governor. Local communities of the state have also received professional planning assistance."

Unusual Sculpture Added to U. of D. Collections

"The Burning Bush," a bronze and stained glass sculpture by Wilmington artist Tom Ross has been given to the University of Delaware by the 1962 Costume Fair of the Studio Group, Inc.

The sculpture is based on the Old Testament story of God speaking to Moses from a burning bush. It is strikingly created from flame colored glass. A companion piece "Moses," one of Ross' well known bronnages, also has been purchased by the university art sub-committee composed of Mrs. Samuel Lenher, Mrs. Rita Quinlivan, James R. Gervan and Dr. Edward R. Ott.

Bronnages involve the use of paint, collage and a welding torch on the plywood backing to give a combination of surfaces of great variety and interest. The burned and scorched surfaces mellow the colors of the painted and collaged areas to give a warm, overall tonality to the finished composition. Occasionally, a hint of a subject appears within the abstract shapes, but for the most part, texture and pattern in rich variety convey the artist's meaning.

Short Becomes 1st To Be Sworn In

Robert A. Short of Georgetown was sworn in Wednesday as state insurance commissioner. He took the oath at Georgetown from Superior Court Judge James B. Carey.

The ceremony was the first in a series that will take place between now and Jan. 1 when all newly-elected state and county officials take office.

Short's chief deputy, Ralph F. Rago, of Elsmere, was sworn in Wednesday afternoon by Judge A. James Gallo, of Court of Common Pleas.

Judge Gallo administered the oath yesterday morning for Edward J. (Whitey) Michaels, the sheriff-elect of New Castle County.

Leo J. Dugan Jr., who takes office as New Castle County recorder of deeds, will be sworn in by the same judge today. Both Dugan and Michaels are Republicans.

Robert C. Hutchison, of Middletown, the Democratic coroner-elect, has not yet set a date for his oath-taking.

The ceremonies for other state and county officials will be more or less routine because all are incumbents re-elected to office.

Catherine A. Kast, of 214 E. Camden-Wyoming Ave, Camden, underwent emergency surgery in Delaware Hospital for a skull fracture, hospital personnel said. She was transferred to Wilmington from the Kent General Hospital, Dover.

Admitted to the Dover hospital after the accident were: Lois Ann Nuss, 16, of near Dover, broken right leg and face cuts, condition good, and Richard R. Kast, 16, Camden, driver of one car, broken pelvis, broken right arm and face cuts, condition fair.

Treated and released at the Dover hospital was George H. Koptage III, 14, of Camden-Wyoming Avenue, Wyoming. All the injured were in the Kast car, police said.

Extremely dense fog shrouded the road at the time of the collision.

Application Deadline For U. of D. Grad School

Dr. James C. Kakavas, dean of the University of Delaware's Graduate School, announced that applications for the spring semester of 1962-63 must be received by January 4.

Students planning to earn graduate credit for advanced courses during the spring semester must apply and be formally admitted to the school of graduate studies, Dr. Kakavas said.

No one may earn graduate credit in any course, whether on campus or through the division of university extension unless he has first been admitted to the graduate school, he added.

H. F. Turner Tapped As Attache in House

Kent County Democrats have tapped Harrison F. (Hy) Turner, Dover lawyer whose home is near Smyrna, for an attorney's attache post in the State House of Representatives.

The job paid \$75 a day in the 121st General Assembly and is expected to pay at least that much in the next.

Kent County Democratic chairman Vernon B. Derrickson announced the appointment. He said he also expects the 10-member "screening" committee, which advises on political appointments, to back Joshua M. Twilley, another Dover lawyer, for secretary of the Senate.

Buckson Appoints R. H. Richards III, Dep.-Atty. Gen.

Robert H. Richards III of 1108 N. Broom St., Wilmington, was appointed a deputy attorney general Wednesday by Atty. General David P. Buckson.

Richards, who will observe his 24th birthday a month from Wednesday, was admitted to the Delaware bar only 10 days ago.

The appointment rounds out Buckson's staff of seven deputies for New Castle County and two each for Kent and Sussex. The new attorney general and his aides will take office next Tuesday.

A native Wilmingtonian and a graduate of Harvard Law School last June, Richards comes from a long line of Delawareans prominent in the law and public affairs.

His great-grandfather, Charles Fleming Richards, of Georgetown, was a Civil War veteran, lawyer, and delegate to the state's last constitutional convention in 1897.

His grandfather, the late Robert H. Richards, who died in 1951, served as Delaware attorney general from 1904 to 1908 and founded the Richards, Layton & Finger law firm in Wilmington.

His father, Robert H. Richards, Jr., is a member of the firm and a former Republican national committeeman from this state. In the family tradition, he also did a stint in the attorney general's office, as chief deputy to the late Atty. Gen. P. Warren Green in the 1930's.

When the newly appointed deputy was admitted to the bar at Dover on Dec. 17, his great uncle, Charles Sudler Richards, of Georgetown, a former State Supreme Court chief justice and president of Superior Court, who is now retired, was among the well-wishers.

Richards' earlier education was at Tower Hill School and Princeton University, where he was graduated with honors in history in 1959. He is unmarried.

He is a member of Westminster Presbyterian Church, the Active Young Republicans, and the U. S. Naval Reserve.

Aliens Should Report Addresses

Federal Law requires most aliens, presently residing in Delaware, to report their current addresses during the month of January advises the Delaware State Development Department.

The state information agency reminds all aliens that the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 requires that every alien in the United States, with the exception of diplomats and a few other special categories, shall, during January of each year, report his or her current address at the nearest Post Office or Immigration Service Office. The address must be reported during January even though there has been no change in residence during previous year.

According to the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, failure to comply with law pertaining to annual report of address can result in the imposing of severe penalties and adversely affect the status of the violator.

Address Report Cards may be obtained at any United States Post Office or Immigration Service Office advises the Development Department.

Holiday Smashups In Delaware Kill Two

Two traffic deaths, both downstate, marred Delaware's four-day holiday.

One of the fatal accidents occurred Christmas Eve, the other Tuesday night. They placed the state's 1962 traffic toll at 93, compared with 63 in the same period last year.

Killed in the Delaware accidents were: Brooks Hart, 61, of Melfa, Va., and Johnny Propes, 47, of 18 Columbia Ave., Milford.

Hart was killed about 8 Tuesday night a mile north of Delmar. Five persons were injured three seriously, in the crash, when cars driven by William Davis, 26, of Melfa, and the Rev. John Cremin, 36, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church, Salisbury, Md., collided at the intersection of Routes 13 and 454.

Father Cremin, who suffered lacerations of the face and jaw, was alone in his car moving east on Route 454. Hart was a passenger in the Davis car, moving south on Route 13. Others injured in the crash, all in the Davis car were: Mrs. Grace Hart, wife of the victim, fractured pelvis and possible internal injuries; Teresa Davis, 3, possible internal injuries and a fractured leg; Jean Davis, 22, possible internal injuries and fractured pelvis, and Davis, fractured ribs.

All but Davis were admitted to the Peninsula General Hospital, Salisbury. He was treated at the hospital and released. Mrs. Hart, Teresa Davis, and Jean Davis are in serious condition. Father Cremin's condition was described as satisfactory.

State police said the priest's car struck the other vehicle in the intersection. Father Cremin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Cremin of 1902 Lincoln St., Wilmington. He was an assistant pastor of St. Paul's Church, Wilmington before being assigned to the Salisbury parish in 1959.

Propes was injured at 6:10 p. m., Monday on Route 284, one and a half miles south of Felton, when the vehicle ran off the right side of the road.

State police said the car swerved back to the left and struck a utility pole guide wire, continued 48 feet and struck a fence, turned over on its left side and skidded 90 feet into a field.

Propes was pinned under the wreckage for 15 minutes until state police pulled him out. He was taken to Milford Memorial Hospital where he died of multiple chest and head injuries. The body was released to the Berry Funeral Home in Milford.

John H. Propes, a tree surgeon, died Christmas Eve at Milford Memorial Hospital of injuries suffered from an automobile accident near Felton.

Mr. Propes was a former resident of Kentucky who lived in Milford before moving to Kenilworth, N. J.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 11 a. m. at the Berry Funeral Home in Milford. The Rev. William E. Tull of the Church of God will officiate.

Interment will be at Odd Fellows Cemetery, Milford. Friends may call tomorrow night at the funeral home.

11 PERSONS SENTENCED IN KENT COUNTY COURT

New Trial Refused Hire-to-Kill

A Milford man's bid for an acquittal or new trial on a charge of soliciting to have his wife murdered was turned down Wednesday by Judge William C. Bush III.

Judge Bush, who heard the trial of James Edward Howlett in Kent County Court of Common Pleas, rejected each of the four reasons, cited by Everett F. Warrington, Howlett's lawyer.

The judge ordered a pre-sentence investigation of Howlett, who was found guilty by a jury on Nov. 27 after a three-day trial.

Judge Bush said the investigation may take a month or so. Howlett, 41, is free on \$5,000 bail. It is possible he may appeal the verdict to the Superior Court.

The state's witness whose testimony was chiefly responsible for Howlett's conviction is still in Kent Correctional Institution.

James Andy Koone, 27, testified Howlett offered him \$300 or \$350 to do away with Howlett's estranged wife "permanently." Mrs. Howlett has since obtained a divorce.

Koone was ordered released as a state's witness on Monday by Judge Bush. But he was kept in prison on a detainer from Texas state police. He is wanted there on charges of forgery and passing bad checks.

On Oct. 6, when he told his story of Howlett's offer to police, Koone was passing through Delaware. The fact he was wanted by Texas authorities turned up on a routine police check, said John H. Maybee, deputy attorney general who prosecuted the case.

How Koone will be transferred to Texas hasn't been worked out, Judge Bush said Wednesday. It is up to the Texas authorities to come and get him, he said.

Maybee is expected to ask Judge Bush to order Koone paid \$3 a day for his services as a witness for the state.

At this rate he would receive \$240 for his 80 days in jail.

Koone told a reporter at the time of the trial he had been promised \$7 a day as a witness by police.

Judge Bush, in a three-page opinion, disposed of all four reasons cited by Warrington in his motions for either acquittal or a new trial.

Warrington claimed the evidence was insufficient to support the verdict of guilty, that the verdict was contrary to law and the weight of evidence, that the verdict should be set aside on evidence. (Continued on Page 8)

Eleven persons were sentenced and two persons pleaded guilty in a busy day of sentencing and arraignments in Kent Superior Court Friday.

Floyd Flamer, 31, Harrington, who pleaded guilty to unlawful entry last month, was sentenced to three years in prison and costs by Judge William J. Storey.

Flamer, his brother, and another man, were placed on trial last month for four charges each if burglary of Harrington merchants. However the state nolle prossed — dropped — the charges against the other two and Flamer pleaded guilty to a lesser count of burglary to end the trial.

Other sentences were: Marian Anderson, 33, Harrington, seven months and costs for a charge of burglary to which she pleaded guilty in September.

James Little, 18, Cheswold, pleaded guilty Dec. 7 to five burglaries. He was sentenced Friday to costs and one year on one charge and costs and one year suspended on the next four charges. He will serve a year's probation.

William Honey, 23, Little Creek, pleaded guilty to breaking and entering Oct. 5 and was given a two-year sentence and costs.

Mrs. Edith Henry, 47, Denton, Md., pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary Dec. 7. Judge Storey sentenced her to three months prison and costs.

Richard Taylor, 21, Dover, was given one year in prison and costs on a charge of forgery to which he pleaded guilty Oct. 5.

Lorenzo Shockley, from near Milford, pleaded guilty to a charge of burglary committed March 5. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

James D. Bryan, 40, Dover, pleaded guilty to grand larceny of food and other items at the Acme Market Dover, on Nov. 14.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

Janis Coulbourne, 25, Denton, Md., pleaded guilty to burglary Nov. 2 and was sentenced to one year in prison and a year's probation — sentence suspended.

Form to Tell DuPont, GM Tax Windfall

A new pink form to be issued by the State Tax Department will reveal what the state will receive in taxes this fiscal year through the Du Pont-General Motors divestiture.

General Motors stock has already been distributed to holders of Du Pont and Christiana Securities common stock in the court-ordered divestiture of the Du Pont Co.'s GM holdings.

In many instances the stockholders must pay income taxes as a result of receiving the GM stock, and it has been estimated the state will ultimately receive about \$1 million.

E. Hobson Davis, state tax commissioner, said Wednesday that estimate was not made by the Tax Department and that he has no information on which to base an estimate, but he is preparing to gather the information through a new form to be called D-1.

It's a pink form on which Du Pont and Christiana stockholders will report the amounts of their holdings of those stocks, when and how they were obtained, the amounts of GM stock received in the distributions and other details.

Du Pont stockholders received the first distribution of GM stock in July; Christiana stockholders received a distribution in November.

So far, the Tax Department has no information on whether it has received any taxes in connection with the distributions. If any has been paid it would be in the form of an estimated tax and it has not yet been identified.

U. of D. Publishes Hay Bulletin

Ideas on how to grow high quality hay as a cash crop in Delaware are offered in a new bulletin issued by the School of Agriculture, University of Delaware.

The bulletin—"Horse Sense About Hay", Extension Bulletin 78—is based on research made possible through a grant made by Mrs. George Grant from Mr. and Mrs. T. Weymouth, Greenville, and administered by the University of Delaware Research Foundation.

Field studies and feed investigations were conducted for five years at the Weymouth farm and stables near Middletown, "to determine the market potential and to develop production and marketing techniques."

Over 2,000 tons of hay were grown, processed and marketed during the tests on the 180-acre farm. The average price received for 890 tons of alfalfa and alfalfa grass hay during a three-year period was \$43.89. This returned a net income over costs of \$9.89 per ton. Alfalfa yields averaged 4 1/2 tons per acre for a net return of about \$45 per acre.

Other research data combined with down-to-earth production, harvesting and marketing information are reported in the bulletin.

Entertain With Planned-Over Turkey

Entertaining during the holidays can be carefree and a help-yourself type when you combined that planned-over chicken, some canned ingredients and a chafing dish on electric skillet for the main dish. One of the happiest of New Year's Eve customs is the festive supper served before the clock chimes twelve. Most suppers star one hot main dish. Why not make it chicken a la Queen?

Melt 1 tablespoon butter or margarine in saucepan, add 2 tablespoons green pepper and cook until tender. Stir in 1 can condensed cream of mushroom or cream of chicken soup and 1/4 cup milk. Add 1 cup diced cooked chicken and 1/4 cup chopped pimiento. Cook over hot heat for 5 minutes. Serve on toast triangles, biscuits of Chinese noodles. Serves 4. This can be easily doubled and tripled.

Prepare in an electric skillet and serve from it at your buffet table, or make it in the blazer pan (insert pan) of your chafing dish placed on the surface unit of your range. Keep chicken mixture hot by placing blazer pan on top of pan holding hot water. Your chafing dish is designed to cook small amounts of food quickly in blazer pan over canned heat or to keep large quantities hot over hot water. Small cans of heat will burn 30 to 45 minutes. It's wise to have another can of heat on reserve.

Serve chicken a la Queen with tossed salad or a tray of assorted relishes, herb-buttered sandwiches and meringues topped vanilla ice cream and red raspberry or strawberry sauce.

Farm and Home Notes

The 1963 Farm and Home Week will be held Feb. 5, 6, and 7 at the University of Delaware's School of Agriculture, announced Dr. M. S. Cover, general chairman and director of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The traditional winter event will offer informative sessions for both farm and city people, Cover said.

Sessions on poultry, pesticides, dairy, vegetables, fruit, livestock, home economics and home gardening are included in the packed, three-day program and will include reports of current research conducted by the University of Delaware Experiment Station.

In addition, sessions will deal with the general topic of economic growth in Delaware which affects the use of land, the interdependence of rural and urban people and community changes.

A light horse program, which drew over 500 persons a year ago, is again scheduled during Wednesday evening (Feb. 6).

Cover said that national dairy awards will be presented to top dairy producers and that 15-ton tomato awards will be announced.

Freeze-Drying: A New Marketing Technique

Perishable food products can now be stored at room temperatures up to two years without refrigeration due to a preserving process called freeze-drying.

Though drying is perhaps the oldest system of preserving food, the results of early efforts were not very appealing until this new process was developed.

In fact, promoters of freeze-drying claim that foods can be restored to very closely their normal appearance and taste by simply rehydrating or replacing water originally removed in the drying process.

Freeze-dried foods now on the market include beef cubes and beef steaks, ham, hamburger, pork chops, chicken, eggs, crab, shrimp, asparagus, green beans, peas and mushrooms. All are perishable products and normally require refrigeration. The foods are sealed in packages so that oxygen and moisture is excluded.

In addition to the refrigeration advantage, the new process allows a tremendous reduction of weight and bulk in shipping. The process removes water which makes up about 90 per cent of the weight of most food items.

For example: 100 pounds of fresh and boned chickens weigh only 29 pounds when dried, and 100 pounds of mushrooms are reduced to 11 pounds.

The Armed Forces sees in the process an opportunity to supply troops in the field with good tasting rations without the problems of refrigeration and weight. Large quantities could be stockpiled in limited space for emergency civil defense use. World markets could be expanded since refrigeration is practically unknown in many parts of the world. Use by space travelers is certainly another advantage.

The process also has several disadvantages. In their dried form, they do not look very appealing. However, natural color, odor and appearance returns when reconstituted with water. This should not be confused with the dried food process common during World War II.

In addition, the process is still costly. Because the process is new and the market still limited, processing plants and facilities are small and inefficient. If the demand for freeze-dried food grows, costs can be reduced substantially. Those working on the process are confident that the idea will catch on and make a major contribution to the marketing of farm products.

U. of D. Enrollment Increases

Recent statistical reports on collegiate enrollments have confirmed Delaware's position as the fastest-growing state in the Middle Atlantic region in terms of higher education.

The State of Delaware, as shown in a report of the Middle States Association of College Registrars and Officers of Admission, has an 11% increase in freshmen enrollment this year. This figure reflects entirely the growth at the University of Delaware, since both Wesley College and Delaware State College showed a slight decrease in freshmen enrollments.

The number of full-time freshmen students in the State of Delaware in the fall of 1962 was 1,683 compared with 1,511 last year. Delaware's 11% increase was 4% higher than the District of Columbia and also topped New Jersey, Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania and Puerto Rico.

Registrar Robert Gebhardt said that contrary to national trends reported in the publication "School and Society," which show a decline of freshmen enrollments of 5.7% in en-

gineering, Delaware's engineering enrollments are up 16%. The freshman class of 213 is the second largest ever enrolled in engineering at the university. Arts and science enrollments, up 13% at Delaware, rose only 1.4% across the nation. A 1% decline in freshmen education students was recorded at Delaware, however, in contrast with a 3.2% national gain.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Q—Is there a new law changing the disability rating for peacetime veterans to qualify for vocational rehabilitation?

A—One difference between the original vocational rehabilitation law and the new law is that a peacetime veteran with a disability rated less than 30 per cent must have "a pronounced employment handicap" in order to qualify for vocational rehabilitation.

Q—When can I expect the regular and special dividend on my GI insurance?

A—The regular and special dividend checks will be mailed in January. VA officials expect that 75 percent of all dividend checks will be in the mail by mid-January.

Q—Understand income questionnaire forms will be mailed out earlier this year to veterans and dependents of deceased veterans receiving pensions. Does this mean they have to be returned earlier?

A—The forms should be returned to the address in the upper right hand corner as soon as possible. However, the deadline remains January 31.

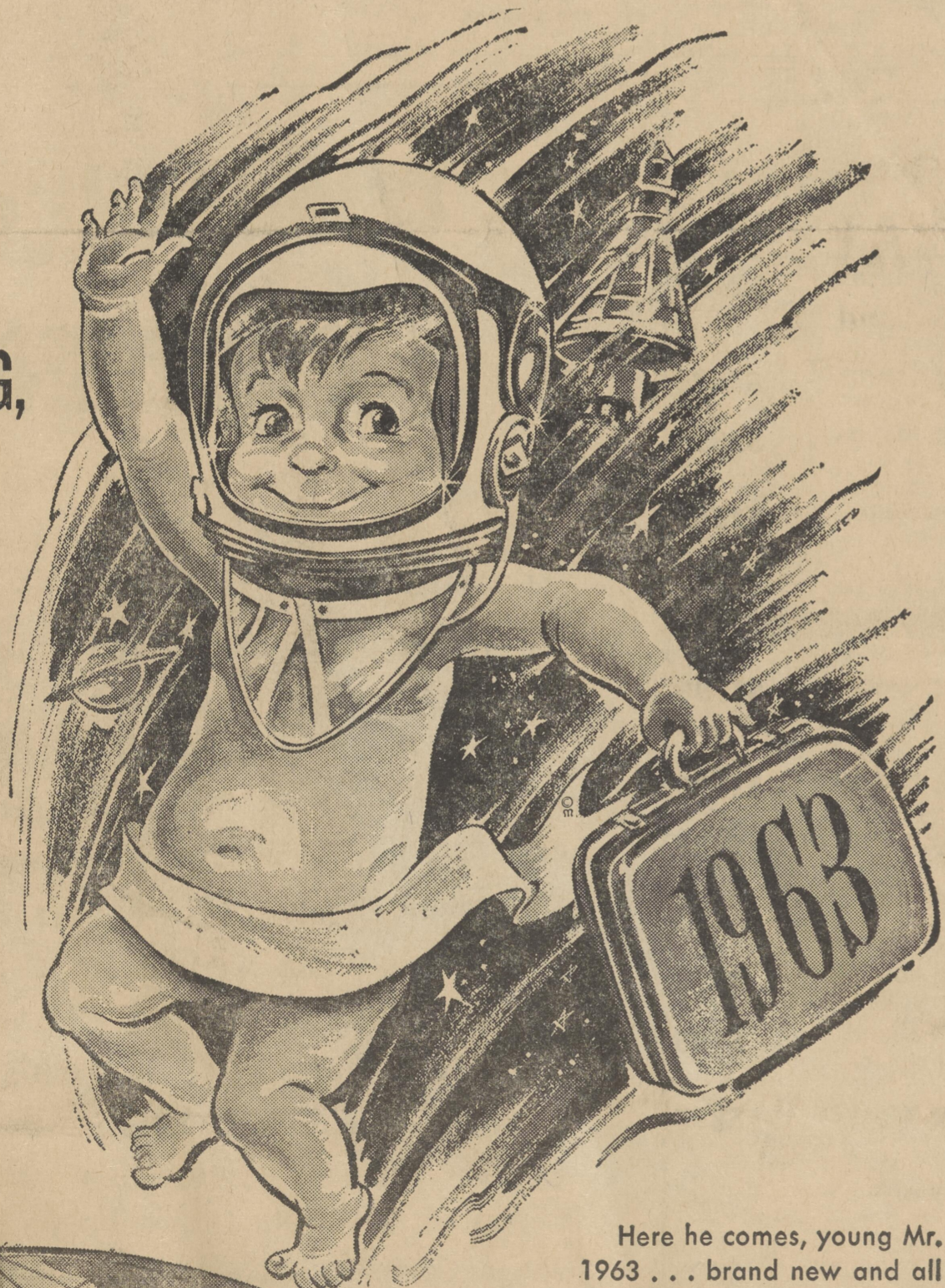

Traffic Club Presents Books To U. of D.

A gift of major works in the field of transportation education has been made to the University of Delaware library by the Traffic Club of Wilmington.

Presentation was made this week by R. F. Meyer, club president; Walter T. Panceo, chairman of the education committee; and Mrs. G. Lloyd Wilson, widow of the club's first teacher, in whose memory the books were given.

According to Mr. Meyer, "The gift was made in deep gratitude for Dr. Wilson's pioneering educational efforts in behalf of the members of the Traffic Club and in appreciation of the university's continued support of transportation education."

The Traffic Club of Wilmington was organized about 1940 when Dr. Wilson, then professor and chairman of the department of transportation and public utilities at the University of Pennsylvania, was persuaded to offer evening courses at the YMCA.

From this group emerged the original chapter of Delta Nu Alpha, national transportation fraternity.

In 1947, following World War II, the Traffic Club resumed its educational work with the cooperation of Dr. Charles Lanier and Professor Paul Hodgson of the university faculty. Mr. Panceo taught courses through the extension division and, somewhat later, the club initiated a scholarship program for outstanding Delaware undergraduates in the field of business administration.

Interest in transportation education, involving land, air and water carriers, has led to the development of a two-year associate degree program in business administration with emphasis on transportation. This program is offered through the university's extension division.
