

Delaware Junior Miss Pageant To Be Held Here, Saturday, Jan. 12

The Harrington Junior Chamber of Commerce will be host to the Delaware Junior Miss Pageant Sat., Jan. 12, it was announced this week in a release by William Kramedas, chairman of the pageant.

The purpose of the pageant is to recognize outstanding high school senior girls in the state who best show qualities of character, citizenship, leadership, scholastic achievement, personal ambition, and lady-like poise and demeanor.

The Junior Miss Pageant is not a bathing-suit competition, but rather a search for the girl who best represents her classmates in her community.

The following rules apply:

1. The contestant must be a senior high school girl who will not graduate prior to May, 1963.
2. She must be 16, 17, or 18 years of age as of March 23, 1963.
3. She must be single and never have been married, divorced, or had a marriage annulled.

The contestant will be judged in three categories:

1. Talent — Each Junior Miss must possess and display a three to five minute routine of talent. This talent may be singing, dancing, playing a musical instrument, dramatic reading, art display, dress designing, etc., or she may give a speech on a subject of her choice.
2. Poise and appearance in sports attire.
3. Poise and appearance in formal attire.

Prizes will be awarded as follows:

1. Local chapters — This is up to the discretion of the chapter.
2. Delaware State winner — Arrangements have not been completed as of this date, however, we are striving toward the following: A scholarship donated by the Coca-Cola Company and clothing donated by Bobbie Brooks. A gift will be presented to all runners up.
3. National Winners — \$14,000 in scholarships will be awarded to the winners.

The following dates apply:

1. Please advise as soon as possible whether or not your chapter plans to participate in this project. In order for us to make the necessary arrangements, your reply would be appreciated as soon as possible.
2. The name of your winner (or winners) Each chapter may send either one or two winners to the state pageant — should be submitted no later than Jan. 10.
3. The state pageant will be held on Jan. 12.
4. The winner of the state pageant is eligible to participate in the National Contest in Mobile, Ala.

Travel expenses and stay in Mobile will be paid for by the American Junior Miss Pageant. (includes chaperone)

Expenses are as follows:

1. Each chapter participating is asked to bear only the following expenses in connection with the State Pageant.
2. An entrance fee of \$10 to cover part of the expense of your contestant. If two winners are to participate in the State Pageant, there is no additional charge for the second entrant.
3. One photo of your winner or winners. (separate)
4. Transportation to the State Pageant in Harrington.

Car Careens Over Barrier, Four Injured

Four young men were injured early Sunday when their car skidded out of control on Route 14, striking guard rails and overturning several times.

All four were listed in fairly good condition at Milford Memorial Hospital.

William H. Rentz, 21, of Frederica, was driving east on Route 14, about four miles west of Harrington, at the time of the accident.

Rentz suffered lacerations of the forehead, ear and chin. Passengers injured were:

Thomas Bernard of Felton, fractured left wrist and multiple lacerations of the right hand and ear; Clifton Dernberger of Frederica, possible fractured skull and multiple lacerations, and George Davidson Jr. of Frederica, multiple lacerations and abrasions.

State police said that all three passengers were young men in their early to mid-twenties.

The car was a total loss, police said, while damage to the guard rails and a bridge amounted to \$500.

State's Agriculture Is Big and Dynamic

Cash receipts from farm marketings in Delaware in 1961 averaged \$19,204 per farm—third highest in the nation and exceeded only by Arizona and California.

This fact plus other agricultural information about the state was released in a booklet, "Delaware's Agricultural Statistics." It is A. E. Pamphlet No. 36 compiled by C. N. Guellow, agricultural statistician in charge of the Maryland-Delaware Crop Reporting Service, and W. E. McDaniel, chairman of the Department of Agricultural Economic at the University of Delaware.

Delaware, scarcely 100 miles long from the northern tip to the southern border, and 36 miles across at the widest part, had a total income from farm marketings of \$105.6 million in 1961. This was \$3.2 million more than in the much larger state of West Virginia, nearly double New Hampshire's farm income; 2 1/2 times the figure for Nevada, and five times as much as Rhode Island.

Commercial broilers, the mainstay of Delaware's agriculture, usually account for about half the annual total cash farm income. Income from broilers in 1961 was nearly \$50 million. Sussex County, Delaware, is the Nation's top broiler producing county. Data from the 1959 Census of Agriculture show that producers in Sussex County sold twice as many broilers as those in the Nation's next ranking county, Scott County, Miss.

Soybeans ranked second to broilers in 1961 as a source of cash farm income, accounting for \$11.3 million. Corn and milk followed in third and fourth places, respectively. Vegetables, melons and potatoes accounted for an aggregate income nearly equal to Delaware's income from soybeans.

Delaware ranks second in the Nation in the production of green lima beans—second only to California.

No candidate had filed from the Fifth Ward where the incumbent, William Smith, has declared he will not run.

No person has, publicly, stated a desire to run for mayor.

At the annual Citizens Meeting tonight, petitions for the candidates for councilmen will be presented. The candidates for councilmen and mayor will be nominated tonight in the meeting at the Firehouse.

New Postal Rates Go Into Effect January 7th

Postmaster H. W. Dill would like to remind all Postal Patrons of Harrington and vicinity that effective next Monday, Jan. 7th., first class mail will increase from 4c to 5c an ounce; airmail from 7c to 8c an ounce; and post cards from 3c to 4c. There also will be slight increases in second and third class mail.

The new 5c stamps and 8c airmail stamps; 5c envelopes and 4c post cards are now on sale at the Stamp Window for your convenience.

Mr. Dill also wishes to remind patrons of the Department's new envelope standardization procedure. Effective Jan. 1st., all envelopes must be at least 3" x 4 1/4" to be mailable. Any envelope smaller than the above dimensions will be returned endorsed "Unmailable."

ELECTORATE TO VOTE TUESDAY ON CHANGES TO CITY CHARTER

Harringtonians will vote on 11 amendments to the City Charter Tuesday in the municipal elections. Heretofore, it was necessary to get these amendments passed by the General Assembly.

The proposed amendments are as follows:

1. Setting forth provisions for extending the boundaries of the City.
2. Requiring candidates for mayor and City Council be freeholders and that no candidate be eligible for election until properly nominated.
3. Adding a method for nominating candidates for the municipal election and changing the composition of the election board.
4. Changing the time for appointing certain municipal officers from the annual meeting to the next regular meeting following the annual meeting and removing the prohibition against increasing salaries during the term of office.
5. Creating the office of vice-mayor.
6. Changing the date of the auditors' report from the 5th day of January to the 5th day of December.
7. An amendment to Section 11 (K) of the Charter omitting the words "at the annual meeting" from the beginning thereof. This relates to the appointment of a City solicitor.
8. Changing fiscal year from January to October.
9. Designing September as the time to appoint assessors.
10. Changing limit on taxation for current expenses.
11. Revising the entire contents of Section 20 in regards to paving, curbing, and guttering of streets and sidewalks.

A copy of these proposed amendments is available at City Hall.

DSEA Offers New Award to Teachers

It was announced by E. Alan Rutledge, president of the Delaware State Education Association, that the Association has added another continuing service.

The Educators Professional Award of the DSEA combines financial assistance with a belief in the need for rich experiences in personal growth for master teachers. The award is designed to assist a Delaware in-service teacher to utilize a sabbatical leave for study or travel. The grant, initiated by the American Education Week Committee, will be awarded by the DSEA Board of Directors.

Rutledge said that over 220 members have already contributed to the growing fund. The recipient must show proof of at least three years' successful teaching in Delaware immediately preceding the award. The award is not subject to repayment. It is not a loan. It was further explained by Rutledge that the recipient must be an active member of the DSEA.

Applications for the award should be sent to the DSEA office not later than February 1, 1963. The award will be made during Teaching Career Month (April) 1963. In the event that the award is not given during any one year, the amount contributed will be added to the fund for future use.

Wesley College Receives Library Grant If Matched

A library grant of \$5000 for purchase of books has been made to Wesley College, Dover, by the Board of Education of the Methodist Church, it was announced at Dover last week.

The grant, on a matching funds basis, was announced from Nashville, Tenn., by Dr. Ralph W. Decker, director of the Board's Department of Educational Institutions. A matching \$5000 must be provided under terms of the grant, for a total of \$10,000 to be used toward the book collection in the Wesley College Library in addition to the regular budgeted amount. This will mean adding \$5000 to the library equivalent to approximately \$14,500 in the 1962-63 academic year.

This is the second such gift to the college library in four years. A similar grant of \$5000 was made to Wesley by the Board of Education of the Methodist Church in 1958-59. The Wesley College Library as present has a collection of approximately 11,200 volumes, excluding periodicals, which represents a basic collection consistent with library standards established for two-year colleges.

Coin-Operated Drycleaning

About \$50 million worth of quarters went into coin-operated drycleaning machines last year. This amount probably will be doubled in 1962, reports Janet Reed, extension clothing specialist at the University of Delaware.

Coin-operated drycleaning appeals to consumers in two ways, Miss Reed says. It's economical and it's convenient. All the home-maker has to do is place her soiled articles in the machine, then remove them completely cleaned at the end of the cycle.

In spite of the growing popularity of the coin-operated machines, professional drycleaning will still be needed, Miss Reed explains. Some spot removal, for example, should not be attempted by amateurs. Many families also will continue to want professional pressing.

As might be expected in a young industry, coin-ops are under going some changes. These changes may speed up the cleaning process but increase the cost.

Two coin-operated drycleaning systems are now in use. The first system on the market, and the one still predominately used, required a time cycle of about 45 minutes to more than one hour for completion of the cleaning-drying. The other system, until recently in the experimental stage, uses a rapidly evaporating solvent that reduces the time cycle to 15 to 20 minutes. The rapid evaporation of the solvent presents a problem to the machine manufacturers. Machines must be air-tight, and this adds to the expense of the machine. The solvent used in the new system is also more expensive. So the cost of cleaning with this solvent may be higher.

Some improvements to look forward to are improved spot-cleaning service—perhaps, attendants who are experts in the art of spotting; more pressing service offered on the premises—at an added cost, of course; and continued effort on the part of manufacturers to make more efficient machines.

Miss Reed says the present cost of coin-operated machines rules out home units now, but one company predicts they are only about 5 years away.

Winter Dairy Meeting Series Begins Jan. 9

The first of a series of four winter dairy meetings, designed to acquaint Delaware dairy farmers with the latest information on ways to cut production costs, has been scheduled in three Delaware communities on Wed., Jan. 9.

Sessions will be offered at the University of Delaware Substation, Georgetown, at 10 a.m.; at the Harrington Fairgrounds, at 1:15 p.m., and at Middletown High School at 8 p.m. on Jan. 9.

Follow-up meetings are set for Jan. 16, Jan. 23 and Jan. 30 at the same three places.

Next Wednesday's session will include the following topics: calf care by Donald Burton, associate dairy and livestock specialist at the University of Delaware; feeding systems by W. R. Hesseltine, extension dairyman at the University of Delaware; automatic calf feeders by G. F. W. Haenlein and Ivan Huff, research associate and herdsman, respectively, at the University of Delaware; pasture for heifers and how much grain, by Carlton Hughes of Ralston Purina Company, and a discussion on whether to raise or buy dairy calves by Burton and Hesseltine.

"Each year dairy farmers are faced with higher costs of production," explained Hesseltine with regard to the meetings. "Yet they get no more for their products than they did 10 to 12 years ago.

"This squeeze has forced dairymen to look for new ways to reduce production costs and increase the amount of milk they sell. These sessions are planned to help Delaware dairymen to make the most of their opportunities in dairy farming," Hesseltine said.

Clean Carpet Spots After Tree Removal

When you took down the Christmas tree, did you find on the carpet some spots caused by sprays of soap, paint or latex that you missed when decorating?

Though it is best to clean spots while still fresh, there are ways to remove those missed during the excitement of decorating.

In the case of latex, water resistant varnish, or oil stain accident on the rug, the removal procedure is to work a small amount of natural detergent (one teaspoon of neutral non-alkaline detergent to one-half pint of water) into a small area and absorb into tissues.

It is best to wear rubber gloves and to use fingers to work in the solution. Using the fingers lessens the mechanical agitation. Continue this procedure until stain has been removed. Place one-half inch of clean tissues on area and weight down for four to six hours.

For accidents involving lacquer, wood varnish, wood enamel, metal enamel or alkyd resin, use a lacquer thinner, brush cleaner or turpentine.

If turpentine is used, a dry solvent (dry cleaning fluid) will probably have to be used to remove the turpentine.

Observe the following precautions:

- Always test solution on inconspicuous area of rug to test for effect on fiber and dyes.
- Work from the outside towards the middle of spot.
- Keep mechanical agitation to a minimum.
- Blot. Don't rub.
- Use small amounts of liquid.
- Keep solvents away from latex back.
- Allow solvent spots to dry with lots of air.
- If the spillage is large or a problem arises, call your professional rug cleaner.

OBSERVE THE NEW YEAR WITH SAFETY

Resolve to do your best to prevent accidents in 1963, the Delaware Safety Council's president suggested yesterday.

J. H. Tyler McConnell urged the people of Delaware to use extra care to protect their own and other people's lives and property this year by doing everything reasonable to keep out of accidents. He and three other safety officials suggested four groups of New Year's resolutions emphasizing safety.

A group of suggested resolutions for preventing accidents in the home was submitted by Mrs. William N. Cann, the Council's vice president for home safety. She urged safety-conscious people to do these things at home:

- Remove rubbish promptly, especially from cellar and attic.
- Correct conditions leading to falls on steps, floors, and rugs.
- Make sure gas and electric appliances and fixtures are safe.
- Use a safe step-ladder when reaching up to high places.
- Keep all medicines, poisons, insecticides, and cleaning fluids out of the reach of young children.
- Have a rubber mat in the bathtub to prevent slipping.

Dorsey B. Binnamon, vice president for public safety suggested that motorists resolve to do these things:

- Travel only at safe speeds.
- Look for approaching vehicles before pulling away from the curb.
- Follow at safe distances and avoid sudden stops.
- Give proper signals before turning or stopping.
- Never pass other vehicles on curves or hills.
- Give the other fellow the right of way if he wants it.
- Be prepared to stop at intersections and railroad crossings.
- Always obey traffic laws, signals, signs, and markings.
- Use seat belts.
- Avoid driving when overly tired or under the influence of liquor.

J. J. O'Driscoll president of the Safety Engineers Club urged these resolutions for people at work:

- Know how to do your job correctly and safely.
- Wear proper clothing, shoes, and protective devices.
- Keep your working place clean and orderly.
- Remove or report all accident hazards promptly.
- If you operate machines, stop them before oiling or cleaning.
- Learn the proper way to lift or move heavy objects.
- Place materials and equipment so they will not cause accidents.
- Watch your step—avoid slips and falls.
- Observe safety rules and regulations.

McConnell urged that people at play or walking resolve to take these precautions:

- Walk on the left side of roads without sidewalks.
- Handle firearms sanely—store in a safe manner.
- Watch out for stumbling and tripping hazards.
- Prevent the spread of open fires.
- Don't jaywalk; never cross the street from behind a parked car or truck.
- Cross streets only at intersections and always with the light.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Q—I have moved and left a forwarding address with the local post office. Will my GI insurance dividend due in January be forwarded?

A—Yes. Postal regulations now permit the forwarding of your dividend check.

Q—I understand a new law provides for GI Bill education and training for peacetime veterans. What should I do to find out if I am eligible to take advantage of this?

A—If you have a service-connected disability, you should register as soon as possible with your nearest Veterans Administration office for an appointment with a VA counselor. This is the required first step.

Q—I am a Korean Conflict veteran. How much longer do I have to apply for a GI home loan?

A—The minimum deadline for Korean Conflict veterans is January 31, 1965, and the maximum deadline is January 31, 1975. For all dates between the deadline is governed by the individual veteran's length of active service.

New Lye Storage Unit Proves Better System For Naylor

Gilbert Naylor, Pet patron of Townsend, is pleased with his lye storage pail. He bought it recently from the Pet Milk Company plant at Greensboro. "We've been needing a better system of caring for our milking machine, and I believe the lye storage system is the answer to our needs," Naylor said. His son, Bob, does most of the washing of the milking equipment. He is also pleased with this system of caring for the milker inflations and rubber parts.

When using the lye storage pails, two sets of inflations, head gaskets and milk hoses are provided and used alternately. One set of rubber parts is stored in the five per cent lye solution while the other set is in use, and each week they are changed. Two sets of rubber parts used in the lye storage system will outlast three sets which are washed in the conventional way.

Sets are available at the plant for \$3. The outer pail is treated with a special coating which protects it from the lye solution. The inner pail is made of plastic with holes in the bottom which make it possible to remove the rubber parts and place them in the lye water without touching the solution.
