fessional pressing. As might be expected in a young industry, coin-ops are under going some changes. These changes may speed up the cleaning process but increase the cost.

Two coin-operated drycleaning systems are now in use. The first system on the market, and the one still predominately used, required a time cycle of about 45 minutes to more than one hour for completion of the cleaningdrying. The other system, until recently in the experimental stage, uses a rapidly evaporating cycle to 15 to 20 minutes. The rapid evaporation of the solvent presents a problem to the machine manufacturers. Machines must be air-tight, and this adds to the expense of the machine. The solvent used in the new system is also more expensive. So the cost of cleaning with this solvent may be higher.

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


