





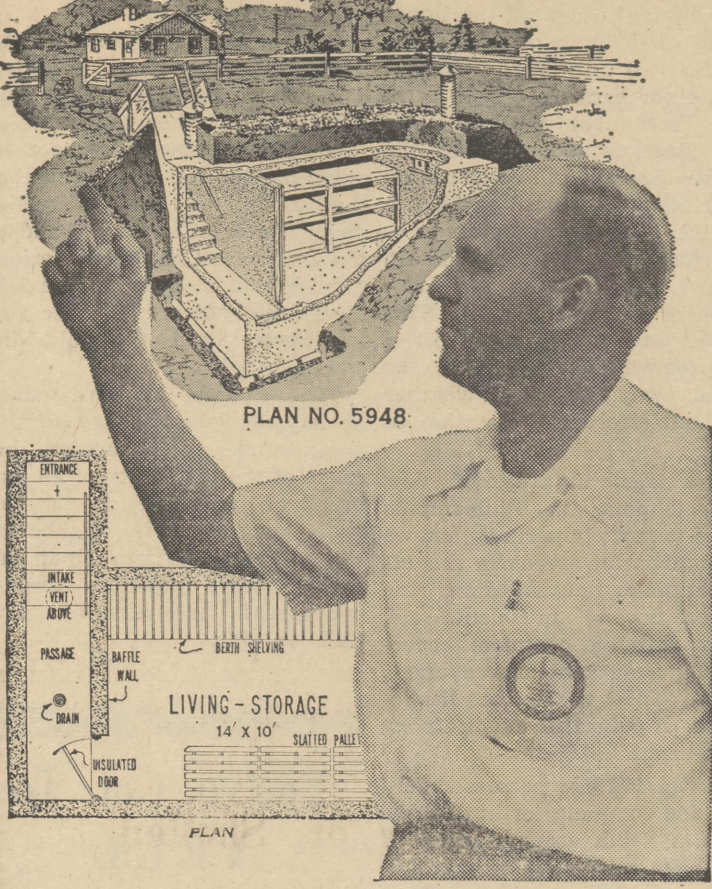








STORAGE, STORM & FALLOUT SHELTER



Storage - Shelter Plans Available

Stephen Green, University of Delaware agricultural engineer points out features of a new USDA-designed fallout shelter plan. The structure also doubles as a storage area for fruit and vegetable crops.

In the event of an emergency such as a nuclear attack or tornado the shelter can be occupied by as many as six people without becoming over-crowded.

Since at least part of the shelter would probably be occupied by stored produce at a time of emergency, this plan allows two and one-third times the accepted minimum space per person.

Other features of this underground home include: a baffle entrance, baffled exhaust vent, and a 2-foot earth cover, this shelter provides a radiation protection factor of 600, which is considered adequate protection.

The shelter should be built on a site with good drainage or one that can be drained. In areas with high water tables, it can be constructed above ground and covered with a minimum of 2 feet of earth.

Chicken Festival To Be Held in Maryland

The Delmarva Chicken Festival, to be held in Talbot County, Md., June 18, 19 and 20, will be staged in the Easton High School. In this large, modern building with spacious grounds, ample space will be provided for the many events and exhibitions which make up the festival.

John W. Noble, general chairman of the 1964 Festival, has announced that Herbert C. Santucci, vice principal of the Easton High School, is chairman of the Site Committee. Mr. Santucci will have charge of assignment of space and all arrangements for use of the buildings and grounds.

In turn, Mr. Santucci states he already has enlisted W. Allen Greiner, Vocational Agriculture Instructor, and Walter F. Rau, Industrial Arts Instructor, as members of the Committee.

The Site Committee's work is in developmental stage, but it has been determined that the nationwide National Chicken Cooking Contest will be held in the school cafeteria, where a battery of ranges will be installed.

The Delmarva Chicken Festival general committee, representing the Delmarva Poultry Industry, Inc., inspected the Easton High School in 1962, before the Festival was awarded to Talbot County for 1964, and pronounced the school property as being fully adequate for the festival.

Robbins Adopts Zero Pasture Program

"I did not like the old method of pasturing my dairy herd, as it was uncertain and expensive," remarked Reynolds Robbins, a Pet patron at Frederica, in the October issue of Pet Dairy Chats. For the past six years he has followed the Zero Pasture Program.

Reynolds raises his own herd replacements, and has about six heifers freshen each year. At present his herd consists of 31 cows and 22 heifers.

Reynolds is also enthusiastic about Sudan for silage. He put eight acres into his upright silo this year. Alfalfa has been a mainstay for his dairy animals.

Three tons of lime per acre were applied to this land four years ago. Reynolds gets three cuttings of birdsfoot each year. Due to the shortage of lespedeza hay and silage this year, he green-chopped the first cutting.

Del. Soil Needs Lime; Short Course Planned

Soil samples coming into the University of Delaware's testing laboratory are showing a greater need for lime than ever before. Some Delaware soil needs lime so badly, according to Dr. William H. Mitchell, extension agronomist, that farmers are questioning the accuracy of the tests.

He says this problem will increase unless farmers do something about it. "We now have the know-how to make our present average crop yield look small in comparison to those that can be produced on properly limed and adequately fertilized soils."

In an effort to solve this lag between the availability of knowledge on the subject and its application on Delaware farms, the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service is conducting a lime short course in connection with its annual crop show.

Highlights of the program include a talk by Dr. John Axley, University of Maryland agronomist on the ABC's of Liming, and a talk by Dr. Joel Giddens, University of Georgia on the effects of molybdenum on soybean yields.

The Delaware Crop Show will be held Nov. 25 and 26, concluding with an awards banquet on the night of the 26th. In addition to crop exhibits from growers, there will be educational exhibits, a 4-H crops and soil judging contest and a color film on the Chesapeake Bridge-Tunnel System.

Entries in the crop show should be made prior to Nov. 1, at the County Agent Offices in Georgetown, Dover, and Newark.

In discussing the seriousness of Delaware's lime deficiencies, Mitchell said a record number of lime deficient plants were sent to the college for examination this past season. And college specialists were asked to visit a large number of farms where lime deficiencies were showing up.

"It's pretty obvious that farmers are not using the amount of lime needed for best crop production. The seriousness of this situation is being compounded by recent trends in tillage practices. The use of larger tractors has resulted in farmers plowing deeper and bringing more acid subsoil to the surface.

Mitchell says lower cost nitrogen materials also encourage farmers to use acid forming nitrogen top dressing material. The use of nitrate of soda, which is basic or neutral, has dropped sharply in the past ten years.

Mitchell says the purpose of the lime short course is to tie all of these factors together and present them in such a way that farmers will realize the importance of adequate lime for maximum crop production.
