

# K & S Raceway To Offer Two Daily Doubles

Kent and Sussex Raceway will offer two daily doubles nightly during its 1964 program which begins Mon., Sept. 14.

William W. Shaw, director of racing at the Harrington track, said the first double would be, as usual, on the night's first and second races. The extra double will be on the eighth and ninth races each night.

Shaw said the meeting will be for a minimum of 30 racing nights with a possible 10-night extension providing the weather and other circumstances are favorable.

As in the past, there will be nine races nightly Monday through Thursday and 10 races Friday and Saturday nights. Post time for the first race will be 8 p.m.

Shaw also revealed that in the past 12 months 400 tons of stone dust and 400 tons of sand have been added to the Harrington track's surface in an effort to prevent cancellations due to rain.

"Just how much this will work," he said, "we won't know until horsemen test its condition after rain. We are hopeful, however, since this is the same treatment which has been successful at other tracks."

# Dill Praised For Selling Saving Bonds

Postmaster H. W. Dill and the Harrington postoffice staff were praised recently in a letter from William H. Neal, National Director of the U. S. Savings Bond Division, for their efforts in promoting the sale of U. S. Savings Stamps through the Treasury's School Savings Program.

Mr. Neal's letter, announcing the start of a new season for the program, credited the nation's postoffices with helping to increase the number of participants in school savings by five per cent during the past year.

The program will use America's space program as its central theme again this year, Mr. Neal said. Children buying their first Savings Stamps will receive a "Junior Astronaut" membership card, and, upon turning in completed stamp albums for bonds, will be awarded a "Space Minute Man" certificate.

"This association of Savings Stamps and Bonds with our country's space program has been a popular attraction for young savers," Mr. Neal said. "Yet we recognize that the real success of school savings is due to a community partnership of parents, educators, volunteer workers, an very importantly, to the excellent service provided by postmasters and the members of their staffs."

Commenting on Mr. Neal's letter, Mr. Dill pledged the continued support of the postoffice in publicizing and servicing the school program; and said "it is good to know we have a part in developing thrift habits among our young people, and in reminding them of this practical opportunity to be better citizens."

# Kent Asks New Land For Annex

The Kent County Levy Court Tuesday enlisted State Planning Office aid to give the county a better courthouse addition.

The aid, supplied by State Planning Director John A. Bivens, Jr., may mean redrawing the near-final plans for the addition.

Bivens met with the commissioners to examine the possibility of obtaining a small piece of state land at the rear of the courthouse for construction of the addition.

The court asked Bivens to study the proposal, then make a recommendation to Gov. Elbert N. Carvel if Bivens feels the county could make good use of the land for the addition.

Architect Walter H. Carlson suggested acquiring the piece of land, directly behind the building housing Bivens' office. Carlson said the land could be used to "square off the proposed addition."

"The present layoff, based on the available land, creates an inefficient and, consequently, more expensive plan," Carlson explained.

"With the additional land, the situation could be corrected, and a better addition could be built," he said.

The state property would permit the county to construct the addition in a rectangular shape extending almost to the state parking lot.

The addition as now planned, will need zoning variances to permit its construction.

The acquisition of the state property might eliminate setback variances. The three-story height and parking variances still will be needed if the plans are revamped.

Dover Building Inspector Jack T. Roe also met with the commissioners Tuesday to set up a timetable for variance applications. He said the addition already has been granted an architectural review certificate, needed because it will be constructed in Dover's historical zone.

He said the proposed addition conformed to Dover's requirements for Colonial architecture in the zone.

Carlson told Roe the city's parking requirement for new buildings is still "stiff."

The city requires one parking space for every 300 square feet of floor space in the building.

"This is ironic," Carlson said, "because 300 square feet is the amount of space planned to park one car. With the 27,000 square feet planned for the addition, we would need more than half an acre of parking area according to the city requirements."

"Dover isn't alone in this either," Carlson continued. "The same ridiculous regulations exist in Wilmington, Newark and other cities. When you have to fight to squeeze a building in a downtown section, I don't see how zoning regulations can require that much space for parking."

"The regulations just aren't realistic," Carlson said. Carlson said he will wait for a report from Bivens before drawing up new plans for the addition.

# Tile Installation Begins on Bridge On Benjamin St.

Work began this week on the installation of a tile beneath the Benjamin Street bridge which leads into Harrington Manor from Delaware Avenue.

The City Council, at its regular September meeting Wed., Sept. 2, approved installation of a 36-inch tile beneath and adjacent to the bridge. The tile would be 86 feet long and have headwalls at each end.

The ditch beneath the bridge is curving and this has caused undermining of the bridge and washing of private property and beneath a catch basin.

City Manager Alfred G. B. Mann thought the ditch should be straightened and this is being done by Paul Scotton Contracting Company, Inc., which is also doing the work on the bridge.

The project, figured to cost about \$3000, is being done quickly, and at this time, because the dry weather has been favorable.

# COUNCIL PREPARES FOR VOTE ON WATER SYSTEM; ALSO EYES PLANNING PROGRAM

The City Council, at a special meeting Wednesday evening, passed two motions and adjourned early.

Of immediate consequence, was the acceptance of a resolution prepared by the city attorneys, Brown & Brown, authorizing the holding of a citizens meeting at 8 p.m., Fri., Sept. 18, to explain a referendum to be held on an extensive improvement of water mains. (The resolution is published in the classified advertisement page of this newspaper.)

The City's next step will be to publish another resolution calling for the referendum.

Part of the work to be covered in the referendum is nearing completion. This is the installation of a 10-inch water main on Delaware Avenue. The City Council felt this work had to be done at once since the State Highway Department is preparing to let bids on improving the avenue and Center Street, both state-maintained roads, and it stipulates the roads are not to be

turned up within five years thereafter except in an emergency.

Another motion, of long-range consequence, passed by the Council Wednesday night, reaffirmed a motion passed by the Council at its regular meeting, Wed., Sept. 2.

The motion was to sign a letter of intent of the City to apply for federal funds to the Urban Renewal Administration of the Housing and Home Finance Agency, on a matching basis, for a planning program for Harrington.

Under the plan, the federal government would provide \$4600, with the local share as \$2300. However, the local share is defined as \$1150 to be paid by the State Planning Office and \$1150 by the City. The program would take about two years and the City could pay for it in that period.

The State Planning Office hopes to tie in the local request with one for Laurel. John A. Bivens Jr., the director, told the Council he believed the federal government's reply to the request for funds would take about three months. Also attending Wednesday night's meeting was Robert Paslay, of the planning office.

Bivens said the City first needed a planning ordinance, then a planning commission. He added a planning program would probably be needed to secure all federal funds in the future. Furthermore, he explained community planning should be ready for planning by the county.

The State Planning Office serves as liaison between the town and federal government and bears the administrative costs. Director Bivens has said zoning laws may not be legal without a comprehensive plan behind them. Harrington has zoning ordinances.

Background information on a community comprehensive planning program says the purpose of most municipal planning programs is the formulation of policy with respect to the long-range physical development of the town. The Planning Commission is an official body that views future development from a broad perspective, taking into account all aspects of future development, considering the complex influences on physical development and examining the many implications of the town's future.

To assure a coherent set of policies for the community's development, a long-range comprehensive plan is usually prepared. With the plan as the basis, the planning commission advises the mayor and council concerning decisions they must make on a day to day basis.

# Senators Refuse To OK Herrmann

The Senate Tuesday refused to confirm former Superior Court Judge Daniel L. Herrmann, of Wilmington as chief justice of the Supreme Court of Delaware.

The action came during a 11-minute executive session which followed two minutes of open meeting and two hours of caucusing and discussion.

The vote was not disclosed but the word around Legislative Hall afterwards was that Herrmann received only four votes and that all Republicans were recorded as "not voting."

Gov. Elbert N. Carvel, who appointed Herrmann—a close friend and advisor, had no comment on the Senate action.

The governor could reappoint Herrmann and try again to have him confirmed or he could try another name. The Supreme Court begins its session soon and, if there are only two justices, judges from other courts would have to fill in if the court is to handle the case load.

This could cause pressure on the legislature from the other judges, and from attorneys anxious to have their cases heard and decided.

The Senate recessed Tuesday until the call of the chair and there were conflicting reports as to whether they will return. This General Assembly goes out of office on election day, but the governor could call the new assembly into session after that.

Herrmann was named to fill the vacancy created when Charles L. Terry Jr., resigned last month to become the Democratic candidate for governor.

Carvel met with Democratic senators for just over an hour. The Democratic senators then held a caucus on their own.

The Republican senators met with Carvel later in the afternoon.

Many observers have said that the GOP senators would be politically unwise to help get Herrmann, or any other Democrat, confirmed. If the stalemate should continue, their party's candidate might be governor in January and be able to make the appointment, the reasoning runs.

The actual session Tuesday began at 4 p. m. with a message from Secretary of State Elisha C. Dukes, making the actual appointment of Herrmann which was referred to the Executive Committee.

Sen. Earle M. Tull, D-Seafood, chairman of that committee, then called for the executive session. After the brief session, the Senate recessed and left to attend the annual legislators' night at Brandywine Raceway.

No other nominations were considered at the session, it was reported. Besides Herrmann's 17 others are pending. Several groups were in the chamber in support of school equalization and divestiture legislation. But the senators did not consider any matters other than the Herrmann appointment.

# Paradise Alley Fish Cooperative

Last Friday, Tom Clarke's farm was visited by George Vapaa and Lister Hall, Jr., with thirty soil conservative committeemen conducting a special tour on farm practices, and they were highly pleased with improvements in the general surroundings of a recreation pool constructed by this organization last Spring in the back yard of Cliff Miller's residence at the corner of Paradise Alley Road and Route 13.

The pool, 8 feet deep, 65 feet wide and 200 feet long, was stocked with 12 8-inch trout, 25 2-inch trout and 125 1-inch blue gills on June 27th. The bass and blue gills have already tripled in size, while the trout have gained two to three inches due to the healthy condition of the water, which was properly fertilized and is fed into the pool from the fresh cool stream that by-passes the pool.

Several men in the gathering asked for a demonstration of the fishes' presence and were given an eyeeful when Cliff put a cricket on a barbless hook and after two or three casts landed a 12-inch rainbow trout among them. He picked it up hurriedly, held it in the cold water at the "A" stream entering the pool and after stroking it gently and thanking it for co-operating on such a wonderful occasion, allowed it to slip back into the deep.

## Lions Pin Hopes On Stout Defense

Coach Frank Glazier's Harrington High football Lions were hard hit offensively by the graduation of last year's scoring leaders Barry Fry and Bill Adams. The locals last season were strong defensively and have most of the defensive unit back. So it appears that the football fortunes at H.S. this autumn must rise and fall accordingly to the manner in which the defense performs.

Scrimmage with schools from the Diamond State Conference, Smyrna and Dover, seem to support this theory. Smyrna has experience, size and depth, but scored only one touchdown and that came on a long run near the end of a lengthy scrimmage. Richard Black, Fred Parker, Rusty Jack and Charlie Taylor, regulars all, had to be held out of the Dover practice session which came just three days after the Smyrna encounter. Despite the absence of this quartet, the depth-poor Lions gave up only two scores. One of these came against an eleven liberally with reserves.

Rusty Jack continues to be a key performer. Rusty does a real good job at quarterback and is especially quick defensively. Jack is backed up by Larry Garey, another two-way player.
