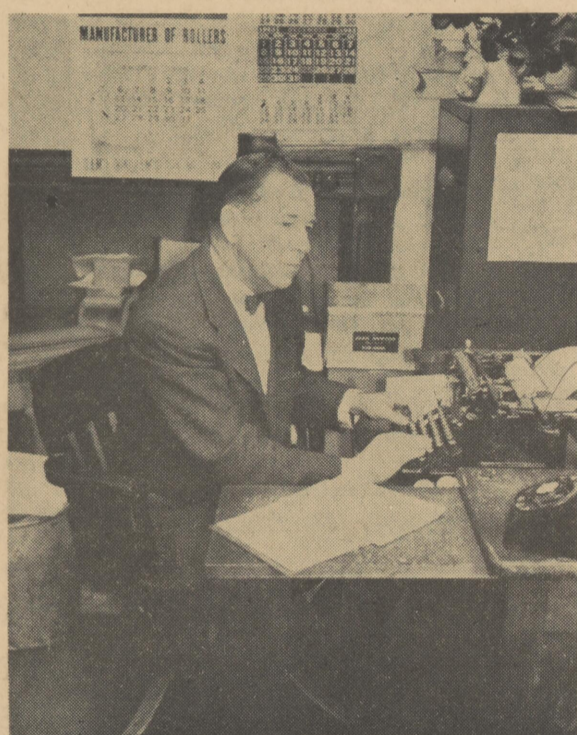

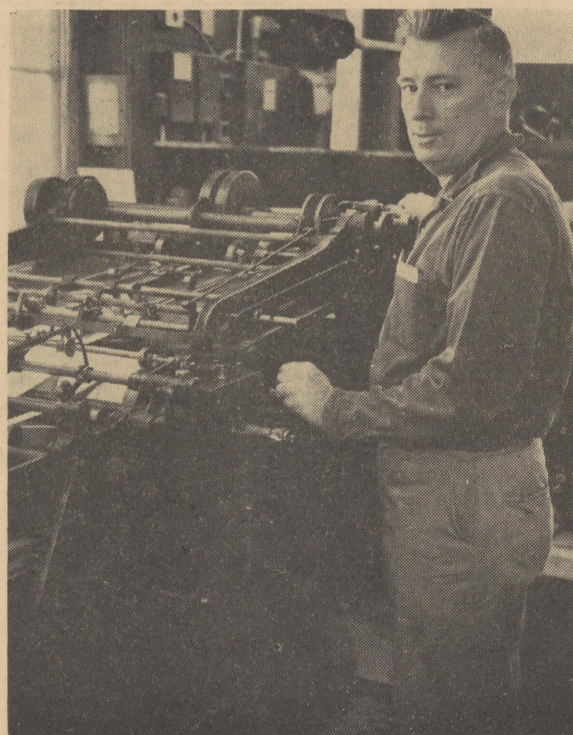

First Winter Dairy Meetings January 6.

The first in a series of Winter Dairy meetings scheduled by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Delaware will start Wed., Jan. 6. Meetings will be held in three locations in the state on that date. The sessions start at the University Station at Georgetown at 10 a.m., 1:15 at the Harrington Fairground and 8 p.m. in the Middletown High School.

Topics for the January meeting include Understanding Sire Data, Selecting the Right Sire, and Building A Top Herd. Program participants are Dr. Dean Plowman, a dairy cattle geneticist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Dr. W. R. Hesselstine, Extension Dairyman at the University and Dr. George Haenlein, a University Dairy Researcher.

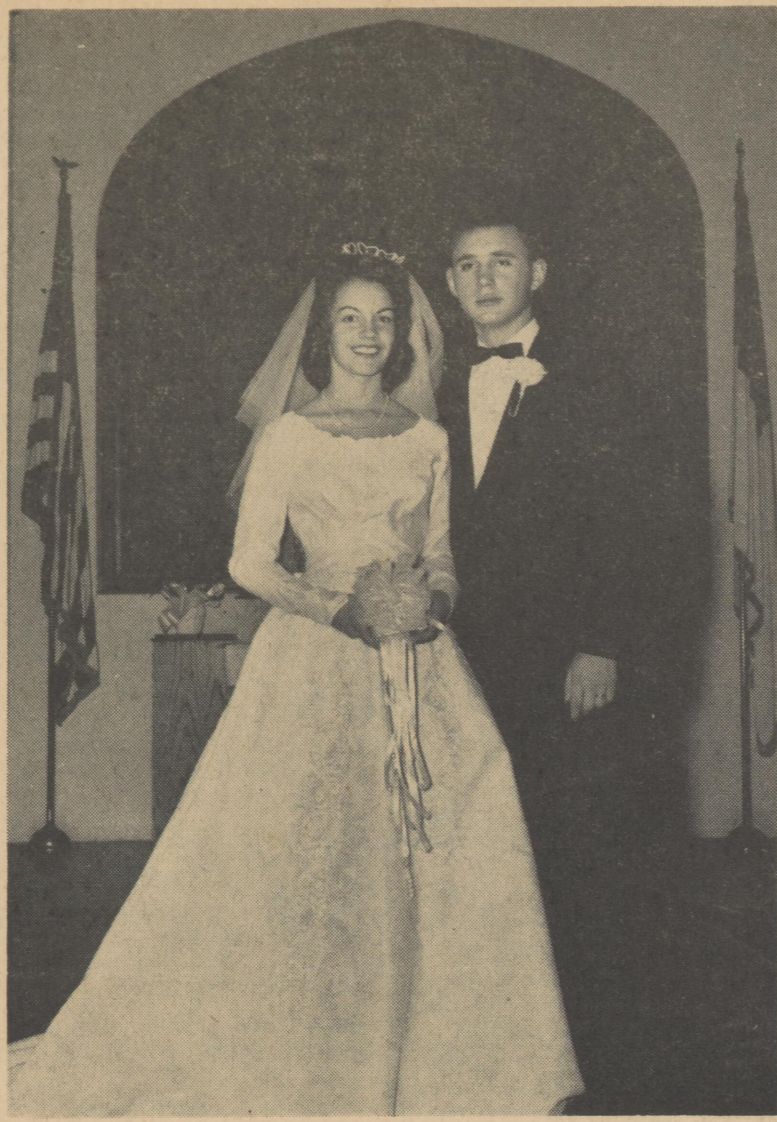
Other meetings in the winter series are scheduled for Jan. 13, 20 and 27 at the Georgetown, Harrington, Middletown locations. On Feb. 3 "open barns" will be held at three locations in the state. Dairymen are invited to visit the dairy production facilities of Earl Sheats, Summit, Woodrow Haas of Wyoming and Walter Mills and Son, Lewes. On Feb. 10 the meeting will shift to the University Farm and Home Week for a special dairy day program.

Specialist Joins Univ. of Del.

Frank E. Boys, a University of Delaware graduate, has been named research assistant in entomology and extension specialist in agricultural chemicals at the University of Delaware, according to Dr. Dale F. Bray, chairman of the department of entomology.

Boys joined the University staff Dec. 1 after 16 years with commercial chemical companies in Delaware. His research projects will deal with the side effects of pesticides. As extension specialist, he will advise on the safe use of all types of pesticides, with special emphasis on those used in commercial farming and those designed for household use.

Boys has a bachelor of science degree in plant pathology and entomology and is presently working on his master of science degree.

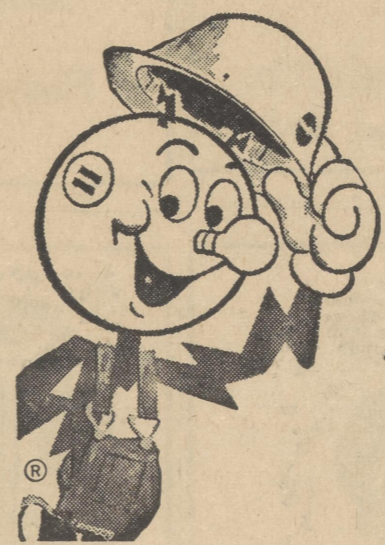
