Let's tool up and tune up for farm profits in 1965. Many rural communities across the country believe their economic salvation lies in attracting industry to their areas.

If you were to start from the center of any town in Kent County and draw a circle around it with a 10-mile radius, you would find that it contains approximately 200,000 acres of land.

We can make more effective use of this land and its output with increased fertilization and more intensive livestock production.

For example, if adequate use of fertilizer were to boost gross income by \$10 an acre (a conservative estimate), this would amount to \$1 million in extra income for the area.

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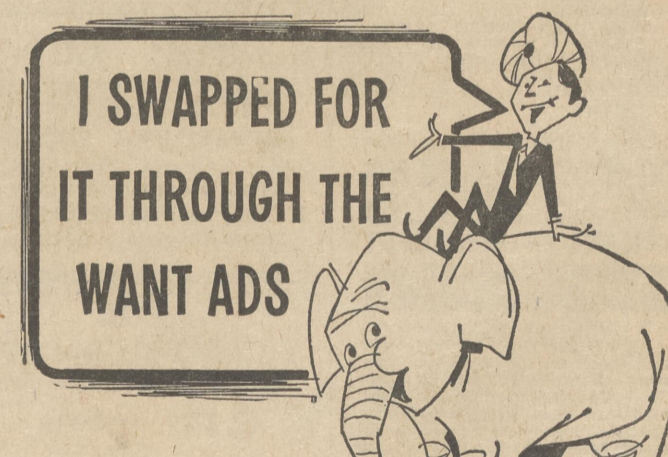
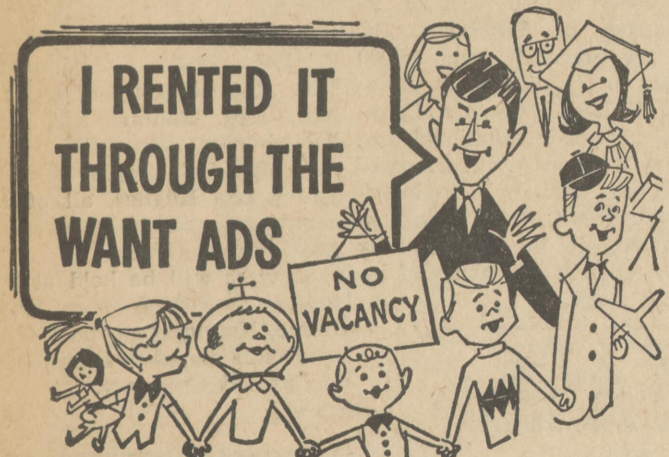
