We eliminated a lot of this with a sanitary sewer 1935. However, this system is outmoded and must be re novated. This is where the taxpayer will come in when he votes in the referendum. Cost of the improvement, however, will come from an increased sewer usage fee. <br> Cost per quarter, for the average householder, for sewer and water, will be only $\$ 19.50$. In Camden-Wyoming, the charge is $\$ 25$ per quarter. Cost, in Harrington, would be only a little more than $21 \phi$ per day for the usual household. |  |  |  |  |  |
