



### Delaware Food Market Report

Weather conditions continue to improve all over the country and this makes food shopping in our area much brighter.

In Florida last week the harvest of vegetables continues to increase, due to warm, favorable weather. This area receives the major portion of its fresh vegetables from Florida and it's good news to hear future crops are growing and developing rapidly. Soon local markets should be filled with good to excellent quality vegetables at much more reasonable prices.

The picture in California is good too, due to warm and drier weather there. It's possible now to get into the fields and step up the harvest of vegetables, particularly asparagus. Last week this vegetable led the way in price declines and as it looks now asparagus should remain lower priced for the next few weeks. Snap beans and sweet corn supplies have increased, with prices declining. Other vegetables in good supply are cabbage, carrots, onions, escarole and endive. Prices on head lettuce are still moving up and down spasmodically and quality needs to be checked carefully before buying.

The fresh fruit imports are increasing in volume, but prices remain on the high side. South America is now shipping good quality white grapes, nectarines, honeydew melons and plums. Mexico's strawberries are big and delicious, but supplies are decreasing as the season ends and prices are up. Limes are limited in supply and prices are high. The best buy in fruit continues to be citrus fruit, particularly grapefruit. Lemons and oranges are moderately priced.

Beef prices continue to edge up at wholesale levels and special sales remain the only opportunity to buy beef at moderate prices. Due to the increase in price, expect to find wide variations from store to store and be sure to check prices carefully before buying. The same things holds true on lamb and veal products.

Pork prices are continuing to increase as the warm season gets closer. However, there are still some very good buys to be found among pork cuts. Remember if you are buying some extra pork for your freezer, do wrap it properly (air tight) and use it within a six-month period. Pork fat has a tendency to become rancid much more rapidly than beef stut.

### Kent County Family Court

Judge Kelsey Presiding March 25 through 28

Six juveniles appeared before the Court on Motor Vehicle Violations and paid fines and costs in each case; three were placed on probation for an indefinite period of time.

Three juveniles appeared before the Court on charges of Truancy. After hearing the evidence, the Court ordered that each be placed on probation with the understanding that they attend school each and every day unless a medical certificate is submitted for such absence.

Three juveniles appeared before the Court on charges of malicious mischief. Upon the State's application, the charges were dismissed.

One juvenile from Wilmington appeared before the court on a charge of disorderly conduct having occurred at the Hollywood Diner, Dover. After hearing the evidence of the arresting officer, the court ordered that the juvenile pay the court costs and a fine of \$25.

Five adults were before the court for non-support, having failed to adequately support their families. After hearing all the evidence, an order of support was placed in each case.

One custody case was before the court involving three minor children. After hearing the evidence presented, the court awarded temporary care and custody of the three minor children unto the State Department of Public Welfare for foster home placement.

Two juveniles appeared before the court for being incorrigible in their homes and in school. After hearing the evidence presented by the parents of the juveniles and the school officials, each juvenile was placed on probation for an indefinite period of time.

Norman Layton, Jr., recently of the State of Maryland, appeared before the court on a charge of contempt of court, having failed to keep his support order up to date. His support order showed an arrearage of \$1200. After hearing the evidence presented, the court ordered that he be committed to the State Board of Corrections for one year.

Paris Wall, Dover, appeared before the court for failing to keep his order of support up to date. After hearing the evidence, the court ordered that he pay his regular order of support and pay an additional amount each week on his arrearage.

Clifton Mosley, Dover, appeared before the Court for failing to keep his order of support up to date. After hearing the evidence, the court committed him to the State Board of Corrections for two months, suspended the jail sentence, and ordered that he pay his regular order of support each and every week and pay an additional amount on his arrearage.

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**Math Colloquium April 18 at U. of D. Lab**

The persistence of the large-scale structure in disk-shaped galaxies (such as the Milky Way) will be examined in terms of the theory of density waves by Dr. C. C. Lin during a mathematics colloquium at 2:10 p.m., April 18 in Room 219, Sharp Lab on the University of Delaware campus.

Dr. Lin, who is a professor of applied mathematics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will also discuss the basic mechanisms (including gas dynamics and stellar dynamics) and observational consequences of the theory of density waves.

Dr. Lin received his B.S. from the National Tsing Hua University, his M.A. from the University of Toronto, and his Ph. D. from California Institute of Technology.

Before coming to M.I.T., he was assistant professor then associate professor of applied mathematics at Brown University.

A member of the faculty at M.I.T. since 1947, Dr. Lin was promoted from associate professor to professor of mathematics in 1953. He was chairman of the committee on applied mathematics from 1962-66. He has been a member of the National Academy of Sciences since 1962.

Prior to 1960, Dr. Lin worked largely in various aspects of theoretical hydrodynamics, including hydrodynamic stability and turbulence, superfluid helium, and aerodynamic applications. Attention was directed both to the physical applications and to the mathematical problems arising. His current research interests are inclined toward astrophysical problems.

Dr. Lin's visit to the University is sponsored by the department of mathematics.

**MONDAY** — Frankfurter on roll, baked beans or sauerkraut, milk, fruit or sheet cake.

**TUESDAY** — Tomato or chicken noodle soup, peanut butter or toasted chese sandwich, milk, dep dish apple pie.

**WEDNESDAY** — Oven fried chicken, buttered rice and peace, milk, bread and butter, sliced peaches.

**THURSDAY** — Spaghetti with meat sauce, coleslaw, milk, bread and butter, apple-sauce.

**FRIDAY** — Tuna fish, buttered corn, hot roll and butter, milk, sliced pineapple.

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
