



A - No. Charitable donations are not counted as income in your case.

Q - I am going to resume training late this fall at the same college that I attended in 1967. Do I have to get a new certificate of eligibility from the VA?

A - No, provided that you also plan to resume training in the same program, a new certificate of eligibility is not required. But make sure that you inform the proper offficial at the college that you wish to receive benefits from the VA. They will then send an enrollment certificate to the VA so that an award can be made to authorize training allowance for the current school year.

Q - Can I receive G.I. educational allowance while doing post graduate work on a National Institute of Mentall Health fellowship?

A - Yes, effective Oct. 15, 1968, all grants and awards made by the public health service are exempted from the bar to concurrent payments in the G.I. Bill.

Q - Is there any age restriction with regard to attending school under the G.I. Bill? I am 42 years old and have just retired after 20 consective years on active

duty in the Army. A - No, there is no age limitation. Your letter indicates that you have had the required 180 days of continuous service after Jan. 31, 1955 and that you received an honorable discharge. Now, all that is required is that you are accepted by a school to pursue an approved course. You are entitled to 36 months of educational assistance provided you have not previously used any of your en-

December, January, and February are good months for moving trees, while they are in a dormant stage. The trees you are going to move during these months should have been root pruned at least six months before time of moving. By doing this you have forced the plant to concentrate its root system allose to the trunk. The trees will have a much better change of survival if this simple job of root pruning has been done.

The key to good tree planting is generosity. Be generous in digging a planting hole, in replacing poor soil with good, in expending energy to do the job right.

Moving trees blare rooted is not recommended because the chance of the tree recovering is very much less than if the roots were balled-andburlapped. Doing this is not difficult and is certainly worth the extra time it takes.

Dig planting holes for balled-and-burlapped trees two feet wider than the ball. Dig the hole deep enough so you can set the tree at the same level at which it was growing originally. Replace the poor soil from the hole with a good soil when you fill in around the tree. Pack soil under the tree in a concave bed extending out as far from the trunk as you can manage. After the tree is in firmly, be sure to stake the tree and keep the soil well watered for the remainder of the winter (especially evergreens) and during the next growing season.
