



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

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## Del. Mem. Bridge Traffic on Increase

Delaware Memorial Bridge traffic continued its volume 1,109 more vehicles recorded than in December, 1968. Total

traffic for December was 1,196,594 vehicles compared with 1,195,485 for December. 1968, or an increace of .09%.

These statistics were reported today by Bridge Manager Theidore C. Bright to members of the Delaware River and Bay Authority.

Revenue received from bridge tolls for December, 1969 was \$740,271 compared to \$730,121 for December, 1968, an increase of \$10,150 or 1.4%.

Bridge traffic for the twelve month period ended December, 1969 was 16,063,344 vehicles compared to 15,741,948 vehicles for the twelve month period ended December, 1968, an increase of 321,396 vehicles or 2.0%. Revenue received from bridge tolls for the twelve month period ended December, 1969, was \$9,886,498 compared with \$9,684,175 for the twelve month period ended December, 1968, an increase of \$202,323 or 2.1%.
