Potted plants require adequate drainage, be careful | not to let water accumulate in the bottom of pots which are wrapped in waterproff material such as foil or cello-

Keep the flowers watered, but not water-logged. When watering, add enough water to wet the soil to the bottom of the container and do not water again until soil begins to dry out.

Most plants that are a spring flowering bulb or corms such as tulips or hyacinths can be moved out doors soon as they start to lose their flowers. But lilies should not be moved to your garden if you have lillies already planted there. This is because most Easter lilies are infected with a virus that will spread to other lilies growing nearby.

In spite of countless lesson books written by man down through the ages, the human race is just beginning to learn what wild animals have known all along.
